A number of ARES groups have their local SET in conjunction with a Halloween Patrol, Goblin Patrol, etc. Any time between September 1st and December 1st is acceptable for the Emergency Coordinator in your county to hold the SET. If your ARES group has not conducted an annual SET, contact your Emergency Coordinator. Our Section Emergency Coordinator has placed a copy of the Indiana Section ARES Plan online. Visit the INARRL.ORG website to get a copy. Additionally he has links put on the page for the FSD-98 and FSD-212 forms. These are there for your convenience and are not required to be used. However, if you make a copy of the FSD-98 Station Registration Form and mail it to Dave N9YNF, he will forward it to the appropriate EC. Dave reports that he has been talking with the Indiana Homeland Security. They are very interested in having Amateur Radio Operators available as a resource. This will require re-districting the DEC Zones in the Indiana Section to match the State Homeland Security Zones. This change will become effective January 1, 2005. The re-zoning maps are on the Indiana Section ARRL Website. (www.inarrl.org) Also, it will become necessary to start collecting the ARES station information on the FSD-98 forms and putting them into a centralized Section Database. KD5GSP, Franklin County EC, reports that members of the Franklin County ARES team assisted Franklin County Search & Rescue with communications for their annual fall exercise/drill and pre-planning session. This is within the Ozark National Forest and is a somewhat remote area with many communications challenges. Flash flooding occured in Ozark on Oct. 27. Participating in disaster response to the event were KD5NFJ, KD5MXV, and KD5GSP. Nevada County EC KB5ILY is experimenting with ATV for ARES and RACES. DEC K1ARK reports that the SET saw very good participation in his area. N2YV is the new EC for Stone County. CLUB NEWS: KX5N gave a program for the Ozark Wireless Society on the Global Positioning System. Benton County Radio Operators club assisted in the Tour de Cure 100 mile bicycle race. The BCRO club repeater was used to keep contact between race officials and 7 check points. 17 amateurs took part, and assisted with routine traffic as well as several incidents. Cross County Amateur Radio Club supported a Marathon race on November 6 ADXA member AI5P has been on the air from Australia and New Zealand but conditions haven't allowed many stateside contacts. Bill, W5SJ, was active at VP2EJ - Anguilla -And actually checked into the Razorback Net from there. ARVARF is recruiting prospective new hams for a January licensing class to be held at Arkansas Tech as part of their community education program. HAMS SUPPORT 100 MILE RACE Over 120 runners from around the country (and 3 from Japan) assembled in the Ouachita National Forest for the Arkansas Traveler 100, a 100 mile crosscountry "ultra" race, held this year on October 2nd & 3rd. Nearly 60 radio operators were stationed at 15 remote locations along the course. The Central Arkansas Radio Emergency Net (CAREN) spearheaded communications arrangements, with operational assistance provided by the Diamond State Communication System. Operators were required to bring everything they would need for operating for the extended period, including food, water, shelter, and power source. Amateur Radio served a vital function for the event, because no other commercial radio communications or telecommunications covers the race route. Medical teams were requested several times during the event, which would not have been possible without ham radio. WINLINK: KB5WBH reports good progress with the Winlink 2000 system. EMA SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST: Eastern Massachusetts ARES conducted another successful SET on October 30. The drill was an "add-on" to another planned drill that Cape Cod ARES put together for their group. According to Assistant SEC Rob Macedo, KD1CY, "the original Cape Cod ARES drill was designed around an immunization scenerio with the Centers for Diseases Control and Prevention involving flu vaccinations." However, the drill was cancelled by the CDC due to a lack of vaccine. The modified drill/SET instead tested message relay between Cape Cod and various points in the section. It utilized HF, 6 Meters, Packet and 2-meters. NASHOBA VALLEY ARC HELPS CHARITY WALK: The Nashoba Valley ARC provided communications for the Groton-Pepperell Rotary Charity Walk on the Rail Trail between Groton and Pepperell on October 4. Seven members provided end-to-end communications as well as four bicycle sweeps to monitor the walkers and sweep the last walkers. The support was organized by Stan KD1LE. Participants included: KB1ESR, KD1SM, WR1Y, KB1HDO, K1KEY, N1MNX, and KD1LE. It was a nice fall day and all walkers returned safely. -Nashoba Valley "Signal". EMA HAM TO SET UP INTERNET REMOTE BASE IN IRAQ: An Easton, MA Amateur has announced plans to install a remote base system in Iraq. Keith Lamonica, W7DXX has obtained the call sign YI9DXX and identified a location to house the installation. In addition, Lamonica has recruited willing Iraqi Amateurs to help maintain the remote base. "A group of us: Stan, W4MQ, Pete, W6PJ, George, K4GM, and I have gotten together with the idea of installing an Internet remote base in Baghdad, Iraq," says Lamonica. "Working with the kind help of Diya Al Asadi, President of the Iraqi Amateur Radio Society and Mr. John B. Lyons, Chief of Staff, Office of Communication, Iraq Reconstruction Office, I have been able to obtain a license and a home for the remote base... Our group will donate [the equipment] to the Iraqi Amateur Radio Society." The list includes: a Kenwood TS-2000 transceiver and power supply, a Dell computer, an allband antenna and coax, an uninterruptable power supply, "rig blaster" and other items. Lamonica says he'll personally assure funding to pay for a static IP for the Internet server. "Once all the equipment is delivered we will set it up here in the U.S. to completely test it out. Then it will be sent either by military transport of DHL to Baghdad," Lamonica adds. The group will be constantly tied into YI9DXX Remote by PC-Anywhere so that password files and software can be updated. The YI9DXX Remote Base System will be a closed system, available only to those control operators who have participated in the group's existing remote base operations and have shown they can operate in a responsible manner. "There will be Iraqi amateurs using the system of course," says Lamonica. "Most of these fellows are in situations where they have no antennas, or dare not to erect any." W7DXX adds that his group will be sending more information on the project as it develops. The ARRL awarded co-awarded Keith Lamonica, W7DXX, Bob Arnold, N2JEU, and Stan Schretter, W4MQ its 2001 Technical Innovation Award for their development of Internet control of remote HF stations with new and unique software and a hardware interface. Their efforts were recognized in an article, "Remote-Controlled HF Operation Over the Internet," by Brad Wyatt, K6WR, which appeared in the November 2001 issue of QST. FORMER LOWELL HAM LOSES LIFE IN EXPERIMENTAL AIRCRAFT ACCIDENT: The Billerica Amateur Radio Society reported in its November newsletter that Charles Schwartz, W1TE, of Shirley, MA was killed when his experimental aircraft crashed in Leominster on October 26. The former Lowell, MA ham is survived by his wife, Lorraine, N1ZRO. "Over the years I came to know him through my contesting activities," commented Billerica ARS newsletter editor Ken Caruso, WO1N. "During the mid-90s Charley and I swapped first place SOLP Massachusetts finishes in the 160-meter contests. I asked him how in the world he could beat me on 160-meters living on a small lot in Lowell. [Charley] revealed he would go to his in-laws farm in Shirley and he would lay out beverage antennas and phased verticals supported by helium balloons. We had a good laugh over that." According to Caruso, W1TE was instrumental in revitalizing the NEDXCC

club; he also published the club's newsletter. Details of the October 26 crash were reported in a Lowell Sun article the following day. -Billerica ARS newsletter, "Lowell Sun." BELMONT "HAMSTERS" HELP BRING HOLIDAY CHEER TO HOMELESS CHILDREN IN FLORIDA: The "HAMsters" of Ms. LaRoche's First Grade Class at Winn Brook School in Belmont are just one of the many groups throughout the country who are helping to bring a little Christmas cheer back into the lives of Florida children made homeless by this year's hurricane damage. "My little ones, their families and my colleagues here at Winn Brook loved participating in the Toy Drive for Homeless Children in Florida," said Donna LaRoche. LaRoche, who is a member of the Framingham Amateur Radio Association, has integrated Amateur Radio into her teaching curriculum in innovative ways. The ARRL Toy Drive will fold into the United Way's White Doves Holiday Project. Thanks to a disaster services grant from the State of Florida, the Volunteer & Community Resource Center has been developing a strong relationship with local amateurs. "We have been so impressed by the skill and dedication of the ham radio volunteers," said a United Way spokesperson. "The way ham radio operators nationwide have embraced the White Doves Holiday Project reinforces our already strong opinion of hams." The past week we have been experiencing the aftermath or a solar storm and an Aurora. Chasing DX is one thing but when you are involved in traffic handling and can't clear the traffic for a few days, everything starts to back up. That is the situation that occurs when we have an Aurora for a few days. Thinking back, when we had no satellites and other forms of communications and was dependent on the HF bands. what would be the result of these conditions. One classic example was December 7, 1941. Can you imagine being involved in military communications and the bands die. This was the problem that presented itself the days prior to the seventh of December and may have occurred at other times. We should have an alternate means of communications other than high frequency. We have, in Western Mass. There are a number of repeaters that can be pressed into operation to handle our needs for communications throughout the section. If we utilize them during an emergency, we have a path from one end of the section to the other. During a widespread emergency situation you can forget about the telephone, cellular phones, and the web. Our only means will be through HF or VHF communication and if HF is not working because of propagation we will have to depend on VHF. Relaying messages more than once is not uncommon to amateurs. In fact, we have our licenses as a result of the 'Old Man', HPM, arranging with the Navy to relay a test message to the West coast. The same message was given to the amateur relay system and the Navy. When the smoke cleared, ham stations handled the message reliably and faster than the Navy. It probably was the first contest. During those days, on 200 meters and spark operation, the maximum distance would be about 200 to 300 miles. Each station copied and relayed to the next station until the destination and delivery was made. This operation showed the Navy that we were capable of handling traffic in an emergency and justified our use of the spectrum. The emergency coordinator will be calling upon the various repeater owners for cooperation during an emergency situation .-- In past issues of the Sections News, I have mentioned a past member of CMARA, Dave Fortin, V73UX, and his experimental underwater video camera. It is made out of a piece of weighted PVC pipe and sealed at both ends with the coax attached to a tag line to take the weight of the camera. Now Dave has a link between his boat in the harbor and his home. He suspends the camera from the boat to a depth of about 50 to 70 feet looking for wrecks in the harbor. The coax is attached to an ATV transmitter and 10 watt amplifier that is assembled in ammo box. Superimposed on the transmission is the GCA coordinates received from an on board GCA receiver indicating the position of the boat. This information is transmitted back to his home on shore and received and then recorded by a VCR. On board he has a LCD monitor from the camera so he can position it. He is having a slight problem with adjacent channel reception from the local TV station at his home but with filtering he hopes to cure that problem. He has found relics of WW2 and shipwrecks. Now you know what Dave does when he is not operating. Just another facit of our great hobby. If nothing else it might bring up some discussion. "Emergency Net Activation We asked our experts what frequencies we in BSN should go to in an emergency .Here are their answers: FROM DICK, K7DDI: Check 3993.5, a dedicated frequency for ARRL activities. Then go to normal traffic nets from there. Anyone familiar with our net knows who to contact to get traffic to certain areas. Handle all you can on two meters. Leave HF for long haul stuff. On 2 meters, we plan on high level repeater 146.85 for check ins, then lower level 146.61 to handle local stuff. (Simplex 146.44 local) FROM SCOTT, W7IZ, STM We have several HF emergency net choices, OEN, OARES, BSN, and OSN. OEN is a resource of people from little towns who can deliver traffic. Like we who check into BSN and OARES, checking in everyday helps to let others know they are available. We can explain traffic handling to those who do not handle traffic regularly (the "check" etc in the message when the emergency happens) Vic, W7VSE, said in past emergencies, the stations originating traffic at the scene don't have time to put messages in correct form.. So, the first

receiver of that traffic must put it in correct form, acceptable to NTS. Actual Emergency Traffic is not generally handled on NTS, but by Red Cross. If no other means are available, NTS will do it. Hams don't like to handle death messages. In a widespread emergency, like the California Quake a few years ago, all services will be confused, not just ham radio. Nets are territorial, so there is resentment when a net that generally is over at 6 PM runs 24 hours for 3 or 4 days. Then other nets that normally use that frequency later in the evening (plus "ten up" or "ten down") for moving and handling) are not able to. 3927 works great for BSN before 6 PM to move off and handle traffic, but other nets are there later. We can start there, modify things as needed. Some questions are: During an emergency should BSN-ers tune in to 3920 or 3993.5? Answer: Go to 3993.5 first. We have limited numbers of traffic handlers. Everyone should go to 3993.5 and get that net going first. If only one net is up and running, it should be OARES. Many of the NTS people are also ARES people. So, fire up 3993.5 ASAP. Would we get directions on 3993.5 to go to BSN, OSN, or RN7 freqs? Answer: After enough folks are on OARES frequency, the OARES net control should ask some of the NTS stations to move to BSN and move traffic. NTS does not work FOR the ARES, but NTS cooperates and supports ARES to get OARES functional. When BSN is activated it can be held open for several hours, or days, depending on the traffic and the number of operators present. After BSN is up and functional, OSN people can bring OSN up and keep it going as long as necessary. We should recognize that during an emergency in Oregon, OUTGOING traffic will be the priority, NOT INCOMING. For a large number of messages to come out and be routed around the country, our Oregon nets have to be functional and our regional ones as well Questions Continued: Where would NTS traffic be handled? At present, NTS traffic should be handled at any NTS traffic net, which would be OARES, BSN, OSN and NTTN. If the only net running at the beginning of the emergency is OARES, then the traffic can be handled either on frequency or up/down from that frequency. Liasons would take that traffic to DRN7. If BSN and OSN are running, the OSN liason would take that traffic to RN7 (cw). We hope a lot of traffic will be sent out on Packet via NTTN & N7YSS. Bottom Line, Remember: In an emergency, tune up on OARES, 3993.5. After OARES is fully staffed, BSN and OSN will be activated. And: Number 1: Don't Panic! Don't become a victim Number 2: Be sure your family is OK! You can't help if you are worried about your family members.
