## **Southern New Jersey**

SECTION MANAGER'S REPORT FOR AUGUST JEAN PRIESTLEY KA2YKN Last month we talked about supporting the antenna bill and not supporting bills that would hurt our hobby. This month we have another threat to Amateur Radio. Now we have the PBL problem that could destroy Amateur radio, as we know it today. BPL is a devastating threat to Amateur Radio spectrum, especially HF. (www.arrl.org/bpl). The very HF bands that were used 9/11/2001 would be severely comprised or just overwhelmed by noise. Putting it another way, if PBL had been in use on 9/11, our ability to operate and save lives would have been impossible. The beginning of us having our own spectrum space is predicated on giving our skills and hours of service in times of national emergencies in exchange for that spectrum space. But if BPL is allowed, we will not be able to keep that promise made many years ago. We need to learn more about it in order to fight against it. As I said last month, we have a lot of causes to fight and others to support. This is just one more to fight. During the blackout, the power companies could not keep the grid up. How can they assure us that they could control the noise levels? The ARRL stated the BPL proponents have failed, as of Aug. 22, 2003, to substantiate their claims that the technology will not cause widespread interference. ARRL also stated that their own field tests lead to the conclusion that BPL will create widespread harmful inference which was manifest and widespread and would be so even to an untrained observer. Recently SCARA ran a special event for the Miss America Pageant operating under the call of K2PR. Amateurs have also been providing health and welfare communications for the parade for many years. Operators come from as far as North Jersey. There was also an opportunity to send traffic messages to friends and loved ones. While Amateurs showed their communication skilled, the contestants showed their shoes. As the deadline approached for this column, Amateurs and riders were gearing up for The Annual MS-150 ride, a 2-day event, which will be held Sept 20, and 21. For the second year a federal Homeland Security grant will be available. This money will assist more hams to take the Level 1 Emergency Communications Course training to become better qualified to join ARES teams. Just as last year, we strongly encourage Senior citizens to share life-experiences and join emergency communications teams. In year 2 CNCS wants to know how certified hams have become actively involved in their communities in drills, in practices and actual disasters. Remember to document all emergency activity to ensure that we meet our year 2 grant guidelines and requirements. Grant funding for year 3 will depend upon how well we do this year. We sincerely appreciate your excellent efforts in helping reach a successful year one and look forward to a successful year two. Remember to sign up as each course opens up for registration. Immagine the phonecall you may recieve from some neighber because Johnny can't connect to the Internet when you're on the radio? Sound like fun? Unregulated "Part 15" devices are already creating

havoc in our 2.4 ghz band and are out of control. High power amplifiers and illegal interference are already a problem in our Satellite downlink slots on that band. Think these Wireless providers care much about who they interfere with? Think again. Want to help in the BPL fight? Support the League's anti-BPL campaign with dollars and letters to your elected representatives. BPL will change our hobby forever and once established will present a nightmare that may or may not be dealt with by FCC. Information about Hurricane Isabel preparations will be sent out in a separate message. It is with great sadness that I report Wayne Ross, WD4JPQ of Winterville became a Silent Key on September 5th. Wayne was the District EC for Area 2 and has been an outstanding contributor to ARES for quite a few years. He will be greatly missed. The Simulated Emergency Test is coming up soon. The purpose of the SET is to evaluate strengths and weaknesses in our equipment, techniques and served agency relationships, and to encourage broader participation in ARES and NTS activities, especially by newcomers. In some ways I like the SET even more than Field Day because I believe it is a more realistic simulation of activation scenarios. The statewide SET will take place on Saturday, October 25, 2003. In addition, many local and area SETs will be taking place in October and November. Most are organized on a county basis, but some combined SETs such as Area 12 in the Piedmont and Four County ARES in Eastern NC are able to expand the concept to include some regional communications. Contact your county EC to find out when and how to participate. This is a great learning opportunity, and we can't wait until the real thing happens before we start figuring out what to do. North Carolina always does very well in the SET statistics because we have good participation and we report our results. I hope you will be involved. It's always better to have more tools in the toolbox. This is especially true for disaster communications, where things may not work like you would expect them to. If you have capability for modes that you have not used, make some effort to learn how to use them. If you don't have capability for nonvoice modes, consider adding them to your station. Even though voice modes will remain primary for as long as I can see it, other modes are useful during disasters too. Sometimes nonvoice modes get through better. Also, some sensitive information simply should not be transmitted using voice modes that can be easily intercepted by the general public. CW and digital modes can do the job well here, but only if you have practiced them. On the other hand, take a balanced approach - use technology if available, but be flexible. Computers are great assistants, but they are not very rugged, and you may not always be able to spare the amp-hours needed to keep them going. If you use them to assist you with net operations, make sure you can do things the old-fashioned way also. I work as a computer networking consultant, so I know from my own experiences that a lot of things have to go right for computers to work properly.
