Look for a special event to be held on Nov. 29 and 30 (weekend). The Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) will hold a Special Event to commemorate Roy Neal, K6DUE, who died Aug 16. ARISS requested that the ISS Expedition 8 crew communicate fro space with earthbound radio amateurs. Those contacting the ISS by voice (NA1SS) or packet RS0ISS) through the end of December will be eligible for a special anniversary event certificate. Neal, a noted NBC new correspondent, producer and executive, had a vision to make Amateur Radio a permanent feature on human

spaceflight missions. He was instrumental in convincing NASA management to fly Amateur Radio onboard the space shuttle. This vision was realized on Nov 28, 1983. It is requested that contacts be kept short. The latest word on the PBL came out of a meeting Nov7, 2003. The National Assoc of Broadcasters hosted the gathering at its headquarters in Washington, DC. Representatives from short-wave broadcasting, public safety, and aeronautical and scientific communities joined amateur and amateur-satellite to discuss the threat of BPL and avenues to combat it. Military and consumer electronics reps participated as observers. Chris Imlay, W3KD, General Counsel noted that more than5000 comments were filed with the Commission with most of them being from Amateur Radio operators. Chris also noted that a number of non-amateur organizations support ARRL's position on BPL. Your comments are also needed and valued. EASTERN MASSACHUSETTS ARES JOINED FORCES with its counterparts in the western portion of the state and with RACES to conduct a unified Simulated Emergency Test on November 8, 2003. The exercise began with an announcement from the National Weather Service in Taunton: "THIS IS A DRILL. This is WX1BOX... the National Weather Service in Taunton. We have a Winter Storm Warning for interior sections of Southeastern Massachusetts. A High Wind Warning is in effect for interior Southeast Massachusetts and Cape Cod and the Islands. [Expect] heavy wet snow with possible accumulations of 1-2 feet in the Winter Storm Warning area. Also expect strong, damaging winds of 40 to 50 mph with gusts to 60-65 MPH. The combination of strong gusty winds and heavy snow will cause power outages due to trees and power lines being knocked down..." Station WC1MA at the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency in Framingham liaised with Regional MEMA headquarters across the state, and with the ARES Metro headquarters station, W1MSA, at the Salvation Army in Boston. Several dozen pieces of message traffic were sent and received on HF and VHF. Operators at WC1MA included: State RACES Officer Tom Kinahan, N1CPE; RACES Operator Dennis Brothers, KE6DPL; Eastern MA Section Emergency Coordinator Mike Neilsen, W1MPN; EMA SM Phil Temples, K9HI. "As many as 20 or more individual communities across the state opened their local EOCs and simulated a response to a winter storm," said Tom Kinahan, N1CPE. "Even though Massachusetts has two ARRL sections, communities, ARES groups and individual hams from both sections took part in the SKYWARN, ARES and RACES components of the drill as though it were a single event—as would happen if it were real." During the SET an actual incident requiring ARES assistance occurred, according to DEC Rob Macedo, KD1CY. "A major gas leak in the Town of Bridgewater caused an evacuation of a 3-4 block area." N1FY was already at the Town of Bridgewater EOC along with N1XTB. A shelter was opened and another amateur was dispatched there. THE HARVARD WIRELESS CLUB WILL JOIN with a Cambridge public school in filing an application for a "Stations in Schools" grant under the League's Amateur Radio Education & Technology Program (a.k.a. "Big Project"), according to Mike Manafo, K3UOC and Tim McBride, N1QZY. "The application was authored by Dr. Peg LeGendre, Science Mentor Teacher for the Cambridge Public Schools," said Manafo, a Harvard alum and former HWC station manager. McBride, who is HWC's current station manager, is coordinating efforts on behalf of Harvard Wireless Club. BOSTON ARC MEMBERS WILL OPERATE W1BOS/MQE on December 6th from 9 am to 4 pm on 20 and two meters from the Blue Hills Observatory in observance of SKYWARN Recognition Day. According to Mark Duff, BARC Executive Committee member and ARES DEC, "For several decades, hams have assisted the National Weather Service by providing real-time reports of severe weather and storm conditions. Many NWS Offices including NWS Taunton have

About 100 people signed the register. Most agreed it was a successful event. Special speakers included Taylor Smith (from Hawaii Electric Light Company "HELCO"), Kevin Bogan, AH6QO, and Jerry Hill, KH6HU. Kevin Bogan announced he will be running for Section manager. He also spoke about the Oahu RACES organization. Jerry Hill spoke on the "Big Project". Taylor Smith is the new safety director of HELCO and emphasized the 10 foot rule. "Stay at least 10 feet from any energized lines". This includes any line you are in doubt about. The exception is if a hot line is on the ground, then stay 100 feet away. FIRE WATCH: While Southern California has had several Fire-Storms, North CA has been fairly quiet. As I write, we are having light rains. But, as an example of how things can get out of control – Rick, W6SR, was using a torch to solder ground radials for a vertical antenna, then

SM Article for November 2003 This is going to be a very controversial article so I will begin. First of all if you have not heard by now, The Arizona State Hamfest normally located at Fort Tuthill in Flagstaff will be moving to a new location, the Williams Arizona Rodeo Grounds, and

the new date will be the first weekend in July the 2nd through the 4th. The city of Williams is located 33 miles west of Flagstaff on Highway 40. After you get over the little fits and the four letter words on why we are moving the best Hamfest in the Southwest to a new location, please read on. As you have seen over the past years, the grounds have not changed (they are getting worst) but the cost of putting on the Hamfest has risen very fast. The fair grounds charged ARCA (Amateur Radio Council of Arizona) almost \$9000 for the weekend Hamfest in 2003. They stated that the fees will increase next year but we will not get any improvements and a few of the buildings that we use for presentations will not be available. The ARCA web site, "www.arca-az.org/arca", has a financial chart showing increased cost of the last 10 years. Many people have complained about the high cost of a selling space and if we stayed at Flagstaff this cost would increase. The city of Williams has offered ARCA the use of their Rodeo Grounds at a lower cost and is willing to give other incentives to the people who attend the Hamfest. This means that ARCA will be able to maintain the present cost of selling spaces (maybe lower the cost) and each selling space will be larger in size because there is more room available. ARCA is presently talking with the city officials about discount cost for motel rooms, RV parting spots, and Grand Canyon Railroad tickets. The RV part is located next door to the ground and has full hook-ups and there are several motels close by (Fairfield, Holiday Inn, etc). This move is for financial reasons only. Look up the financial reports on the ARCA web site so you can see for yourself what has been happening. The next order of business is the 2004 ARRL Southwestern Convention that will take place at the Sheraton Wild Horse Pass Resort located near Chandler on 27-29 august 2004. The Central Arizona DX Club is putting on this event and they do everything first class. There will be many presentations on almost every subject of amateur radio plus many top companies showing you their new products. This event will have everything indoors (except Saturday morning swap meet) so you need not go outside for anything except the boat ride to the casino for other entertainment or go swimming in the large pool. All presentations and vendor areas will be in air-conditioned comfort. The hotel has many rooms available for \$91.00 a night and this rate is good for the week prior to the event and the week after the event. Where else can you get resort treatment for standard motel prices. Make your plans ahead of time to be at this event. The convention web site is "www.hamradio2004.com/swdc2004".
