Please encourage new Hams and those who have not been active in traffic handling to participate in this phase of the hobby. ORS appointments are available. Net operation is fun. In 2005, there were 2.414 formal NTS net sessions in our section. Those nets checked in 41,259 stations and passed 28,211 pieces of formal traffic. Compared to 2004, when we had better conditions and better reporting of 2,463 net sessions, we checked in 43,083 stations and handled 25,966 pieces of traffic. So check-ins are down (by 1824) and traffic is up (by 2,245). Does that mean fewer Hams are doing more work? Maybe. Please help. This award has been given annually since 2003 by the Tokyo International Amateur Radio Association to one licensed amateur radio operator in the world who most exemplifies the dedication and personality of the late W7BX/7J1ABV. For 20 years Roberto has struggled to keep four repeaters on the air in the New Orleans area with little assistance from other users. One of his repeaters was the only link to other relief and emergency centers for a critical period following Hurricane Katrina. Roberto's repeater did not lose power because its location at the Ochsner Clinic Foundation had its own auxiliary power plant. The FCC is now inviting comments on petitions submitted by the ARRL and a group calling itself the Communications Think Tank (CTT). The League's "Regulation by Bandwidth" petition, designated as RM-11306, asks that the FCC regulate the bands by necessary bandwidth rather than by mode. The CTT petition (RM-11305) requests that the FCC discontinue mandatory segregation of emission modes and the activities using these modes by substituting a voluntary system of coordination. The deadline for submitting comments on these two petitions is February 6. I encourage everyone to carefully read both of these petitions and then file your comments with the FCC. In last month's report I asked Emergency Coordinators to assist me in determining the total score of their local ARES group for the 2005 LA Section ARES Award Program by submitting reports to me by mid January. It is now mid January as I prepare this section report and I have not heard from a single EC yet! Michigan

I am very pleased to report that the proposed changes to the "Michigan Scanner Law" have moved to the next phase in the legislative process. A draft version has been completed which now includes a specific exemption for licensed radio amateurs. Members of the Michigan House and Senate have been working to produce this final version for several weeks. The next step is a review by the Senate Judiciary Committee and if no further changes are needed, it will be sent to the Senate with a recommendation for passage. It would then go to the Governor for her signature. This is the bill about which I testified before the House Judiciary Committee last fall and then, as recently as last week, debated again when I was informed that the amateur radio exclusion clause was going to be deleted. I advised the committee representative that we radio amateurs would oppose the bill if the clause were to be eliminated, as we already have an exemption based upon the existing federal preemption in PR docket 91-36. Based upon my communications about our concerns with the exemption being removed, Rep. Elsenheimer decided to keep the language in place. The intent of this law revision is to eliminate a significant workload in the issuance of scanner (receiver) permits and make legal the use and transportation of scanners by the general public. As an example, under present law, persons traveling to a motor sports event where they intend to monitor racecar driver conversations were in fact in violation. My personal thanks goes to Rep. Kevin Elsenheimer and his staff for their diligence in sponsoring and strongly supporting this bill. On Friday, December 16, the Steelcase Foundation informed The Grand Rapids Amateur Radio Association (GRARA) that they will be the recipient of a \$5,000 grant towards the rebuild of the W8DC Supersystem Repeater. This timely announcement brings to a total repeater fundraising amount of \$15,000 for 2005! The Steelcase Foundation grant, in addition to a \$10,000 Grand Rapids Community Foundation grant, well in obtaining the remaining funds for their project. As required by the terms of both grants, GRARA will issue press releases to the local press and the national Amateur Radio press as well. These releases will be issued for the first week of 2006. Greetings fellow Rhode Islanders: To lead off this month, I wish to remind everyone about the free license renewal service that is provided to every ARRL member. Of course, you may also renew your license on the FCC website by yourself. It's a 60 second task and is totally free and simple. I just helped another ham in renewing his ticket on-line and it reminded me to include mention of the process here in my monthly report. W5YI VEC sends out propaganda mailings deliberately too early, about 120 days before license expiration date. It is clearly designed to alarm you that you will lose your license if you don't take action immediately. THIS IS NOT TRUE. ARRL normally mails its members necessary paperwork 90 days before their expiration date. All it needs is your signature and mail back to Newington. W5YI tries to get to you 30 days sooner than you're even permitted to renew with FCC. Apparently, that's enough time to scare up business for him before people realize that it's a racket and they've been taken. In his mailing, he provides an order card to fill out and send to him with your check or credit card number so that he can renew your license for you and collect \$8 for his effort. Folks, it's a one minute task and it's free from FCC! Don't ever send money to W5YI. It's not necessary. Please either call ARRL or me for help. We're happy to help you with your renewal or address change process while you wait and our help is absolutely FREE! During a chat on our .94 repeater in Lincoln before Christmas with an old friend, W1TEM, Ron told me of something he suggested to the ARRL several

years ago, to appoint someone on the SM's staff to gather all the information within the section of new Silent Key events and pass the information along to HQ for publication in QST. Great idea, I thought! Especially since that's a job I have tried to do myself since I took this SM post on Jan 4, 2001. My Goodness! It's been five years already? Anyway, I'm willing to continue to submit obituaries of SK RI Amateurs but I need your help to expand it to the level Ron would like. There's no way that I, or anyone else for that matter, can possibly be aware of every new SK Amateur from Westerly to Newport to Burrillville to Cumberland. Starting now, when you learn of the passing of anyone who holds an Amateur license, please notify me with as much information as you have. My contact information is on page 16 of any QST. A newspaper obituary with date and newspaper name is ideal. Please use regular mail, e-mail, telephone, fax, wig-wag, smoke signal or whatever means is most convenient for you. Don't worry about duplicate reports. Of course, you may submit the dated obit material to ARRL HO (ATTN Silent Keys) directly if you prefer. As I said to Ron, the call sign's appearance in QST Silent Kevs is the final dignity we can bestow on our brother or sister Amateur and we must take the responsibility very seriously. Thanks very much for your help. While thinking of section appointment duties, I have a vacancy to fill as Asst Section Manager. If anyone is interested in helping me by working in this post, please contact me so we might talk about it. There's no glory to it and no pay either but helping fellow hams is a great kick. You'll love it. I won't appoint anyone who only wants the post. I will select someone for the post who is ready on a phone call's notice to take over as Section Manager. That's how I became SM, incidentally. If anyone has thoughts of becoming Section Manager, this would be a perfect and painless way to prepare. The manual scanning of DXCC records I've undertaken has produced 28 active and inactive RI DXers who have 100 or more confirmed entities, including nine Honor Rollers and two Top of the Honor Roll place holders. I know there must be more who haven't stepped forward. I plan to include them when I can figure out how to do a merge of the DXCC data base with the data base of all RI Amateurs. Doggone it! In my columns I have discussed many facets of Amateur Radio, but there are two which are most responsible for the general public's awareness of us: antennas and disaster communications. While antennas are a sore subject for some, our role as backup communicators has time and again proven important to our communities. Hurricanes and ice storms are the largest (but not the only) hazards we face in North Carolina. The ice storms in December 2002 and February 2003 caused power outages for well over a million people, myself included, for many days. Hurricane Isabel caused power outages for many weeks for those in the northeast part of the state. Hurricane Ivan caused flooding and landslides in the west. No part of our state is immune from severe weather. Are you ready? To answer yes, you must make sure that: 1. You are personally prepared for disaster. 2. You have regular contact with your county ARES EC. 3. You and your EC have identified specifically how you can help. 4. You have prepared to do so. All of the items on the list are dependent on the first. Even those who are well-prepared for disaster can't anticipate everything; and if you have not prepared at all, then chances are you will not be able to help with Amateur Radio communications, you will be dealing with personal issues instead. I like to be prepared for disasters for three reasons: so I am as safe and comfortable as possible, not a burden on relief efforts, and able to help with disaster communications if we are needed. I have more information on personal disaster preparedness in an article I recently revised: http://www.ncarrl.org/ares/prepare.html Regular contact with your county EC is important also. How often is regular? Well, certainly often enough that he would remember who you are. Registering for ARES once and never following up means you are out of the picture pretty soon. At the very least, as an ARES volunteer you are expected to contact your EC at least once a year, let him know the status of your station, and exchange contact information (which changes more rapidly than ever these days). The better your EC knows you, the better you both will be able to determine where you fit in. Your interests, capabilities and availability will change over time this will affect where you fit in, so keep your EC posted. Disaster communications is not limited to shelter and EOC deployment, there are lots of ways to serve before, during and after a disaster activation. For example, hams who work in public safety are otherwise deployed during a disaster, but can help with equipment maintenance, training or other "before" tasks. If your home station can operate during a disaster, you can serve as a net control without leaving your home. The possibilities are too numerous to list here, but keep in mind that almost everyone has something to contribute. Once you have identified how you can help, make sure you have prepared to do so (especially if it is a "during" task). If something happened NOW, do you know how quickly you could be ready to go? Test your equipment periodically. Participate in drills and training so you will know what to do. If you are in charge of making coffee, then clean the coffee pot! Even after all this preparation, there will be some disasters for which we are simply not needed. Remember that we are a backup communications resource, and if regular communications continues to work, our deployment may be brief or not at all. This will be a disappointment once your adrenaline gets going, but if it happens accept it with grace and leave a good impression behind. Keep in mind that this is presently the most positive manner in which the general public is exposed to what we do - make sure you are a good ambassador for Amateur Radio. We don't really train for this, but probably should. Last month, I recognized ARECC graduates in North Carolina by listing those who have reached Level 3. ARECC graduates at any level have put in a lot of time and effort to improve their skills and knowledge of emergency communications. This month, I list the NC Level 2 graduates: KD4YTG, KD4ZOE, KE5ABB, KU4GZ, K4BMH, KG4AWO, N4YMO, KI4HFN, KE4JT, W4JBP, N4JBP, WD4LSS, ND4MR, KG4MYD, K4DJW, KD4ITI, N4XBF. Also, KI4AHA has just completed Level 3. My congratulations and thanks to all of you. Next month I will list the Level 1 graduates. For more information about ARECC, visit http://www.arrl.org/cce/ Just a reminder that official ARRL Field Organization appointees at all levels are required as one of the conditions of appointment to maintain current ARRL membership. Your appointment is not cancelled immediately, but after about a three-month lapse in membership your appointment is dropped from the database. Affiliated clubs must file an annual report each year. After two years without an annual report, your club's affiliation will expire. We have several clubs in the section that are in jeopardy of losing this

status right now. If you're a club officer, please file an annual report if your club has not done so lately. ARRL HQ needs this info to refer prospective hams to nearby clubs!

The Scammers Are Out In The McCloy Case According to "The Checkout" column of The Washington Post, federal and state authorities are warning consumers about a bogus e-mail seeking donations for McCloy's aid. "The Checkout" reports that e-mails claiming to be from Dr Lawrence Roberts, McCloy's primary physician, describe the 26-year-old miner's condition and seek monetary donations for his treatment. "The Checkout" editor Caroline Mayer advises those who have received such e-mails to consider contacting the Internet Crime Complaint Center. Over the weekend, McCloy's condition was upgraded from critical to serious, but he remains in intensive care in West Virginia University's Ruby Memorial Hospital in Morgantown. "SuitSat" Now Tentatively Set for February 2 Deployment Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) has announced that the International Space Station crew is tentatively scheduled to deploy "SuitSat" Thursday, February 2. Possibly the most unusual Earth satellite ever, SuitSat consists of a surplus Russian Orlan space suit converted into a transmit-only satellite with an FM downlink frequency of 145.990 MHz. Using the call sign RS0RS, it will transmit voice messages, telemetry and an SSTV image on a nine-minute cycle as it orbits Earth. The batteries powering the satellite are expected to last about a week after deployment, and SuitSat's free-floating, decaying orbit should cause it to re-enter Earth's atmosphere after some six weeks in space. The SuitSat signal should be strong enough to hear using a VHF transceiver or scanner and a simple antenna--thus making it an ideal project for students to monitor and track. SuitSat's payload also includes a CD containing hundreds of school pictures, artwork, poems, and student signatures. Hope the new year has treated you well so far. For this first midmonthly summary of 2006, we have a few items of interest to pass on to you. First, this coming Thursday, the 19th, students at GA Tech are scheduled to make a formal contact with the International Space Station, at 10 AM EST. As far as I know, this is the first scheduled contact between GA students and airborne astronauts since March, 1995, when a group of hams from the Atlanta ARC and MATPARC (Metro Atlanta Telephone Pioneers ARC) facilitated a contact between Renfroe Middle School students and astronauts aboard the Space Shuttle Endeavor. So, this is a big deal! Astronaut BILL MCARTHUR, KC5ACR, received his doctorate in aerospace engineering from GA Tech in 1983, and he specifically requested this contact with his alma mater. While Tech aerospace students will be the primary participants, the GA Tech ARC ham shack, located on the 5th floor of the Van Leer building, will likely be bursting at the seams with other observers and local media. (Talk about great incentive to clean up the shack!) There are three possible ways to monitor this great event: on the ISS downlink of 145.80 MHz, on the WREK simulcast on 91.1 FM, and via a live internet stream on www.wrek.org (GA piglets, betcha your teacher would welcome the opportunity to have your class monitor this contact!) When you go to your local tag office to renew your ham tag this year, it'd be wise for you to carry along a copy of your ham license with you. Word has it that the state is now requiring that the tag offices attach a license copy to each application for amateur license plate renewal. Although some hams have indicated that they didn't encounter this request when they went for their renewal, hey! it'd be a lot better to have it and not need it than to need it and not have it... The ARRL's most recent petition with the FCC, regarding the proposal to regulate by bandwidth, will be open for comments until February 6. To file your comments, go to http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/ecfs and click on the "submit a filing" link, which you'll find on the right-hand side of the page. The House Environmental Matters Committee heard testimony from Tom Coates, N3IJ, Bob Rose, AA3RR, son Ryan Rose, AE3RR, Al Fitzsimons, W3YRS, and Bob Martin, KC3FI. Twenty hams were in the hearing room to show support for our bill, which, if passed will not allow any homeowners association formed after September 30, 2006 to include language that would prohibit amateurs from erecting an antenna, subject to normal municipal zoning and land use regulations (for more info on the bill go to http://n3ij.home.comcast.net). ARRL MDC Section members have received several notices by section-wide email from Tom through me regarding information about the process and contacting delegates. The procedure is for me to send the email, which is then reviewed by staff at HQ to make sure it is within their guidelines, and then it is sent. Kudos go to Jon Bloom, KE3Z, who answered my plea and used his Sunday afternoon to release our email from HQ, and also to those of you who took the time to send an email to the committee member in your district. This has been a great example of teamwork from all levels. The League got out our message on very short notice on a non-work day with a blizzard raging. BARC initiated the legislation and has done massive amounts of preparation towards securing its passage. And finally, but certainly not least, those of you at the grassroots level who took the time to send the suggested email, personalized it with your knowledge of your delegate or your special story, and those who arranged their schedules to go to Annapolis on a work day to sit in the committee chambers and lend support. We are learning valuable lessons for future legislative efforts. Stay tuned, because the Senate committee hearing is coming. ASM KZ3AB and I had an initial meeting with the Antietam Radio Association to propose holding a one day state convention on Saturday, July 29 in the Hagerstown area. I'm hoping that they will be able to join with other western counties and put together the convention. It may consist of keynote speakers, several tracks exploring different topics in amateur radio, demos, and possibly a graveside visit to Hiram Percy Maxim's final resting place. It's not associated with a hamfest, just pure ham radio. More about this as it develops. We envision moving the convention site to various parts of the state in the coming years. Please get out the word in your clubs

and to any college age hams that you know (not necessarily in MDC) that the Foundation For Amateur Radio administers 54 scholarships that are available to licensed amateur radio operators who are attending or plan to attend an accredited school of post-secondary education in 2006. Many of these scholarships give preference to students in MD and other states. Okay, maybe that's not a frequently asked question - but the answer brings to mind an important concept in sending traffic. The answer? Old story. A cat has claws at the end of its paws, but a comma's a pause at the end of a clause. Pauses are critical in sending traffic - in any mode. There are pauses between words, pauses between parts of the preamble, pauses after each line of an address. Pauses may also be used to listen for interruptions while sending a message. Use of break-in keying on CW (OSK) or VOX on phone makes it easy for the receiving station to ask for clarification. When a receiving op hears pauses, he or she can anticipate what's coming next. On FM repeaters, where VOX would be difficult, the breaks before and after the text are considered mandatory. Taking a short listening break after each five words of the text can make things flow more smoothly, too. Remember, if you speak only as fast as you can write (try it), the copying station can keep up. Pauses are more than refreshing. The most success realized through last year was that a PRB-1 bill passed the House and died in Senate Committee or passed the Senate and died in House Committee. On January 31 (death day for bills to come out of committee), Section Government Liaison AB5WF reported that this year's House and Senate PRB-1 Bills were both out of committee. HB 736 came out of the Public Utilities Committee and SB 2709 came out of both the County Affairs and Municipalities Committees (bill was double referred). Both bills were placed on their respective chamber's calendars for floor vote. HB 736 was introduced by Dr. Chester Masterson (Vicksburg), Dr. Sid Bondurant (Grenada), and Rep. Bill Denny (Jackson). SB 2709 was introduced by Senator Walter Michel (Jackson). Special thanks to Representatives Tyrone Ellis (Starkville) and Senators Tom King (Hattiesburg) and Videt Carmichael (Meridian) for moving these bills out of committee. SB 2709 passed out of the Senate to the House on February 2nd. HB 736 passed out of the House to the Senate on February 7th. Both bills will be assigned to committees. The last day to be brought out of committee for floor action is February 28. Never give up! Speaking of 'never giving up,' State RACES Officer AB5WF reports that the State RACES Plan was signed by the MEMA Director on December 20, 2005. It was passed by the Judiciary Committee unanimously and then passed by the full Senate 37 to 0 on February 14th. You may view this legislation at: http://www.legislature.mi.gov/documents/2005-2006/billengrossed/House/pdf/2005-HEBS-4544.pdf. As you will recall, this legislation will replace the existing MCL 750.508 and continues to exempt ham operators from any restrictions on carrying a receiver capable of monitoring Public Safety frequencies. We are expecting the Governor's signature around the end of February. Congratulations to Lyle Willette AB8CB as he changes roles in the Michigan Section. For the past several years, Lyle has served as our Assistant Section Manager for Training. A retiree from the National Weather Service (Marquette), Lyle will be returning to familiar turf as he accepts the position as District Emergency Coordinator for the Marquette and Alpena NWS offices. With this change, Michigan will now have specific DECs assigned to coordinate amateur radio efforts with each of the Michigan-based NWS facilities. Lyle's former ASM/Training position will be reevaluated in light of the following paragraph, where we now have very specific needs. For ARES/RACES, in Michigan (and elsewhere) the requirements from our served agencies are the basis for us to implement a phased program to offer advanced levels of training for all of our volunteers. As this plan is just now getting rolled out, ECs and local members will have ample time to examine their needs and look at the various training options available to us. While this may appear at first glance to be a difficult requirement for some to fulfill, the need is there for us to all understand the growing communications needs of the agencies we serve, how the Incident Management System works and how amateur radio fits into the overall picture. None of it is difficult, and your old SM has plodded through all of the requirements that are in the forecast through 2006. I found the courses enlightening and interesting, so I am confident that with the available options for on-line, classroom and personal training, we can easily step up to this challenge. Amateur Radio helped coordinate a simultaneous rifle salute in Hartford, Connecticut, The request came from Alex Parley of Windsor, CT, who was a member of Atkins' crew during WWII. Their destroyer, the USS Melvin, sank the Japanese battleship Fuso in the battle of Surigao Strait, the only destroyer known to have sunk a battleship. Retired Admiral Atkins was a long-time resident of Connecticut. Mr. Parley contacted Allen Pitts, W1AGP, at ARRL HQ. SM Betsey Doane, K1EIC, passed the request to Mac Harper, W1FYM. The Arlington Public Service Club responded to Mac's email seeking volunteers. Arthur Feller, W4ART, proposed using VHF from Arlington, and communicating via IRLP to Connecticut. Following the bugle playing of TAPS, Joe Carcia, NJ1Q, station manager of W1AW, transmitted the C.W. message on 40M: "THE RIFLE SALUTE FOR REAR ADMIRAL BARRY K. ATKINS WAS FIRED AT ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY AT 12:15 LOCAL TIME ON MONDAY, JANUARY 30, 2006." The clarion tones of Morse Code were audible to all present, and were reminiscent of the Morse messages used during World War II. Master Chief Charley Williams read the Governor's Proclamation and delivered remarks upon the life and history of the admiral. Old Spacesuit Turned Into New Ham Radio Satellite. What can you do with an old spacesuit? On Friday, February 3, Expedition 12 Commander Bill McArthur, KC5ACR, and Flight Engineer Valery Tokarev aboard the ISS will show the world how hams will make a radio out of just about anything as they release "SuitSat-1"-a surplus Russian spacesuit that's been outfitted with an Amateur Radio transmitter. It will go into low orbit and transmit greetings to hams and others around the world via radio. SuitSat is a project of the Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) program. "SuitSat is a Russian brainstorm," ARISS International Chairman Frank Bauer, KA3HDO, at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center explained. He credits ARISS-Russia's Sergei Samburov, RV3DR, and his colleagues with coming up with the concept of turning the old spacesuit into a novel satellite. SuitSat is a first test of that idea, Bauer says. The uninhabited space suit will contain a one-half watt radio transmitter, three batteries and internal sensors to measure temperature and battery voltage. "As SuitSat circles Earth, it will transmit its condition to the ground," Bauer says. SuitSat's 145.990 MHz signal should be able to be heard with a handheld ham radio transceiver or a common scanner with a modest antenna. It will identify itself by saying "This is SuitSat-1 RS0RS" in several languages. SuitSat's telemetry will include mission time, temperature and battery voltage (28 V is nominal). It will also beam down a picture, similar in resolution to a cell-phone quality picture. To conserve its battery, SuitSat's temperature controls will be turned off. This means the suit, which may spin when it is let loose, will be exposed to the sun's intense heat with no way to regulate its internal temperature. If all goes as planned, SuitSat will transmit its messages on a nine-minute cycle as it orbits Earth. Its batteries should hold out for about a week after deployment, and SuitSat itself will re-enter Earth's atmosphere after some six weeks in space. Will the suit overheat? How long will the batteries last? Can we earthlings get a clear signal if the suit tumbles? Lessons learned from this inaugural SuitSat deployment will help ARISS in planning future SuitSat ventures -and at least one more surplus space suit remains aboard the ISS. The hams are already looking at it and dreaming, de W1MPN

summer, and there is not much to report on. But rest assured, our SGL Dave Cain W1DEC has been working hard in the background, keeping our Bill in the forefront of our elected officials. Our Bill has a name. It is called MUNICIPAL REGULATION OF AMATEUR RADIO ANTENNAS. In the House, it is referred to as H.12, and in the Senate, there is an identical Bill called S.65, Last year when we introduced the Bill, it was assigned to the House Government Operations Committee. There were some hearings, and support for the Bill to be abundant. However, the Vermont League of Cities and Towns (VCLT) expressed opposition to the Bill. At the end of the Legislative season, our Bill was Put on the Wall, which means that the issue is not dead, but we're not going to visit it again this year. The committee told the VCLT to spend the summer educating the towns about our Bill. That did not seem to happen. Here is an update from Joe Frank W1SOV (former SGL), who is helping Dave. The situation with H.12, a state version of PRB-1 with teeth in it, is up in the air. (Pardon the metaphors.) The House Government Operations Committee (HGOC) heard Dave Cain W1DEC, State SGL, and Joe Frank W1SOV on February 2. Jeff Spencer W1RL also came. The Committee chastised VLCT for stonewalling and demanded that VLCT resume negotiations with us. As a result VLCT met with us on February 7 and presented a draft of what it would be willing to recommend to its members for model zoning provisions to conform to PRB-1. In response to criticisms of the VLCT draft, VLCT subsequently made some revisions to its draft, but the revised version is still not satisfactory. Another session with HGOC was scheduled for February 17, but it was postponed because of a dire weather forecast, with no definite rescheduling. If HGOC will meet again soon on H.12, we'll probably be pressing for getting H.12 through the House before the cross-over deadline coming up early in March. What does all this mean? We are hoping that the Bill gets voted favorably out of committee. When this happens, we all need to write to our local Legislator to ask them to vote yes on the Bill on the Full House Floor. If that goes well, it will cross over to the Senate side, and we will need to write and call our local Senators. This is very important to our hobby! I will let you know by e-mail, if and when the time comes to act. This is our third year trying to get this important legislation passed. I will provide a link for you to find out who your local elected official is, as well as other useful information. If you are not familiar with the term, PRB-1 states that local governments must reasonably accommodate amateur operations, but they may still zone for height, safety and aesthetics concerns. This is from a 1985 FCC Rulemaking. It still applies today. Even though it is a Federal ruling, the government still wants the states to pass their own law to both personalize it, and to give the small towns a nearby place to look for guidance. In local ARES News, on Saturday, February 18, 2006, an impromptu statewide ARES Net was held. The purpose of this net was to test communications ability using linked repeater systems. IRLP and Echolink. A similar net was run in December 2004 during the statewide Simulated Emergency Net. A number of problems were uncovered that were hoped to be resolved this time around. I participated in the Net, and it drew a lot of check-ins. I forget how many, but there was no doubling, and everything went very smoothly. Mitch Stern W1SJ was the Net Control Operator and did an excellent job of explaining the transmission delays involved when working with linked systems like this. Mitch is also our Technical Coordinator for the Vermont Section. That's about it for this month. My big push in the coming weeks will be getting Bill H.12 passed! I will need your help, so be on the look out for email from me, calling you to arms. Pretty soon, I'll get back to telling you what our great clubs have been up to. See you at Milton! Sorry for missing last month's report but I got real sick just at the time I needed to get the report ready and really couldn't get out of bed. J.Bruce Prior, N7RR from Bellingham Washington sent me an e-mail about his hike from Mexico to Canada on the Pacific Crest Trail. It will start in April and finish in September. I will let him tell you about it. I will put just a portion on. The entire article will be on my web site which is www.kz7t-oregonsm.org. This will involve HF, VFH/UHF and APRS. I will leave it on the web site until April. You can find it on the PIC portion. Here is Bruce' article "From early April through September, 2006 I will be thru-hiking the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail (PCT) from the USA/Mexican border near Campo, California to Manning Provincial Park in southern British Columbia. To other hikers, I'll be known as "Doodad," my very appropriate trail-name. Operation PCT will include HF and VHF/UHF components. I will be using an Elecraft KX1 transceiver. I built my KX1 from a kit and I wrote a review of it in the April, 2004 QST. I praised the radio highly, but I complained that it really needed to operate on the 80 m band, since that is where hams meet, mostly in the evenings, to chat and to pass message traffic. Amateur radiograms are a great way for wilderness trekkers to stay in touch reliably with folks at home.

Radiograms can be delivered by telephone, by mail or by e-mail to the addressee. They can also be relayed via the same radio traffic system directly to the wilderness trekker. Spurred on by my plan to thru-hike the PCT this year, Wayne Burdick, the full-time design engineer at Elecraft, figured out how to add 80 m capability into the already very small and light-weight KX1 box, principally by adding a combination module for 30 and 80 meters which replaces the KXB30 module with one which enables both bands. I expect to be building my optional module soon, leaving plenty of time to test it in the field before my April PCT departure. With the brand-new KXB3080 adapter installed, the KX1 transmits CW on the 80 m, 40 m, 30 m and 20 m Amateur Radio bands, but it receives LSB or USB or AM transmissions from 1000 kHz in the AM broadcast band all the way up to 16.505 MHz, so cross-mode OSO's and shortwave listening are also lively possibilities. Those of us involved in public service communications don't do it for publicity, we do it because it's the right thing to do. We show up, do our job, and go home, knowing we have done our part to help in our community. Likewise, most of us operate our radios at home and try not to bother our neighbors with it. As a result of our being such good neighbors, most people have NO impression of Amateur Radio whatsoever, or believe that it is an activity that people did 50 years ago but not today. While that's better than having a bad impression of us, it fosters the idea that there are very few of us left and we don't need to be accommodated any longer. The goal of public relations is to create a favorable impression with the public. Specifically, we want the public to know that Amateur Radio is a worthwhile activity, both enjoyable and a benefit to the community. This impression is important for the very survival of Amateur Radio, because we need the support of the public so we can have two components critical to getting on the air: spectrum and antennas. Our spectrum is a resource that is scarce and highly desirable to others, and we must show constantly that we are worthy of keeping our frequencies. Antennas are an undesirable resource in the eyes of many; but the willingness of our neighbors to tolerate them is greatly improved if we can show our value to the community. How can we improve our relations with the public? There are several ways to approach this. First, keep in mind that we are ALL ambassadors for Amateur Radio. Even if all you do is have an Amateur Radio license plate, you are letting the public know you are a ham. If people identify you as being a ham, then their first impression of Amateur Radio will be based in large part on their impression of you. If you're a good neighbor, or a bad driver, then chances are their impression of Amateur Radio will be influenced by that. Group activities such as Field Day, JOTA and public service events offer excellent opportunities to tell the public about what we do, and the ability to reach many more people. However, this is harder in some respects than being a good neighbor, because your window of opportunity is very short. As a result, a well-considered plan to reach the public is essential. For direct contact with the public at such an event, having an official greeter and some literature will help. Remember, the goal is to develop a favorable impression, not necessarily recruit new hams (it takes the former to do the latter anyway). Dealing with the news media is more complicated, but offers a chance to reach the largest audience. In both cases, having a short, easy to understand explanation of why someone would want to be a ham is needed to take advantage of the opportunity. I saw a TV news report of a Field Day visit a number of years ago where the reporter asked several people why someone would want to be a ham, and nobody gave a very convincing answer (plenty of "how" and "what." but

no "why"). It was a slow news weekend with lots of airtime, but an opportunity was missed. Since then, I came up with a short "sound bite" answer that works for me: "Amateur Radio is an enjoyable activity that allows you to explore science and technology, make worldwide friendships, and be of service to your community." (and if they are still listening) "For most people who try it, It becomes a lifelong activity." Come up with your own sound bite to tell anyone why you are a ham, and you will use it more often than you might expect. Field Day is just over four months away, and it is not too early to start thinking about how you will approach public relations. The ARRL Public Information Officer program has many resources available to help. For more information, contact Bill Morine, N2COP, ARRL NC PIC or visit this web site: http://www.arrl.org/pio Finally, public relations must be an ongoing activity it never stops. There will never be a point where you can say you've done all that needs to be done. because the public's memory of good deeds fades quickly. However, if you develop a habit of being a good ambassador for Amateur Radio, then it gets a little easier and you become more effective at it. Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Course (ARECC) graduates at any level have put in a lot of time and effort to improve their skills and knowledge of emergency communications. They are free to all who attend. The only cost is for your time. Please check with your local Emergency Coordinator, or Emergency Management Agency office for the time/date of the training seminar. From Dave Pifer N9YNF, Indiana SEC: A series of storms rolled through central Indiana on February 16th. The storms caused numerous damage reports and some "small" tornados. Terre Haute had one of the tornados go through at night. While it was categorized as a F1, it does point out the dangers of night time spotting. A spotter less than 6 blocks away didn't hear or see it happen. Fortunately, other than some roofs and other damage, no one was injured locally. In other news, everyone is Strongly encouraged to take the NIMS (National Incident Management System) IS-100 and IS-700 courses As Soon As Possible. If you have questions or concerns about taking this training, check with your local served agencies and determine their requirements. There is nothing wrong with having the training regardless of local requirements. I am most pleased to see the number of Appointees reporting their ARES group's activities to our Section Emergency Coordinator. 24 Emergency Coordinators reported 534 active ARES members. These members performed over 436 Person-Hours of Public Service activity in 93 ARES operations during February.. The Goshen ARC's DX group is planning a DX pedition to Puerto Rico this fall. At this time, I'm not sure whether they will be operating Phone or CW. In any case, they have done well in the past, and I wish them well in their travels and operations. Have you converted your DC connections for your radios and other equipment to the suggested standard of Anderson PowerPole connectors? These connectors are available at most hamfests, by mailorder, and via dealers through the Internet, I was a bit dubious about them at first, But, now that I have started using them, in my opinion, they are First-Class. The most common form of emergency power for us hams seems to be "battery back-up", and my VHF rigs are set up this way. As soon as I can, I will have the HF equipment set up on battery backup. Currently, my back-up battery isn't big enough to run my 100-watt transceiver. However, it does very well with a QRP rig. In another vein, do you have any kind of back-up antenna(s) that you can put up in the event of damage to your existing ones? Also, what about supplies to keep you and your family fed and warm in the event of a commercial power failure? There are dozens of emergency supplies lists available from the ARRL, Emergency Management, and from the Internet. There are some easy steps to gaining this appointment with all of its rank, privilege, and fame. (1) Be an ARRL member and have a license of novice class or above. Be active in traffic handling. That doesn't mean you have to handle a lot of traffic each month. Just know how to do it correctly and be willing to do it when the occasion arises. Check in to a few nets to offer your services as an outlet for traffic to your community. (2) Follow standard ARRL operating practices (message form, ending signals, abbreviations or prowords, etc.). (3) Transmissions, by whatever mode, must be of the highest quality, both technically and operationally. For example, cw signals must be pure, chirpless, clickless, code. Sending must be well spaced and properly formed. Voice transmission must be of proper modulation percentage or deviation, precisely enunciated with minimum distortion. (4) Handle all record communications speedily and reliably and set the example in efficient operating procedures. All traffic is relayed or delivered

promptly after receipt. (5) Report your activity to the STM each month. It's easy, and you'll be in great company. BPL Discussed in State Legislature From the Stephens Media Group Article dated Friday, Feb 24, 2006 by Aaron Sadler- LITTLE ROCK - Electric lines may some day add new lanes to the information superhighway and, when widely used, enhance Arkansas' economy, legislators learned Thursday. Officials with Entergy Arkansas and the Arkansas electric cooperatives said they are researching new technology that transmits high-speed Internet data across power lines. High-speed Internet, called broadband, is a key cog in economic development, said John Ahlen, president of the Arkansas Science and Technology Authority. Expanding broadband to all areas of the state benefits Arkansas economically, Ahlen told the Joint Committee on Advanced Communications and Information Technology. "For rural places to compete in a world economy, the infrastructure they need is broadband connectivity," Ahlen said. Though broadband over power lines seems like a logical way to reach rural areas, electric company officials consider it experimental technology. They said transmitting broadband over electrical lines has worked well in densely-populated areas of foreign countries. However, it may be too costly to install rural areas, said Paul Means of Entergy and Doug White of Arkansas Electric Cooperatives. "At least in theory, it's a very good idea," Means said. Implementing a broadband network over power lines would require placement of "repeaters" along the line every 3,000 feet to strengthen the data signal. Means said utility companies would have to purchase "jumpers" for transformers in order to descramble the signals. Equipment costs are a major obstacle, the utility company officials said. The last statement has regarding costs as the major obstacle have been confirmed by K5UZ's inside sources. Also, W1RFI, W5ZN, K5UR, K5UZ, N5RN and SGL KD5LBE are watching this very closely. We don't need to let BPL become a politicians "great idea" and force the Public Service commission to mandate BPL in Arkansas. Please be ready to act if or when the time comes. Arkansas ARRL State

February 8, 2006 CONGRESSIONAL RECORD Extensions of Remarks E105 A SALUTE TO HAM RADIO OPERATORS "Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize the contributions of American citizens who are members of the Amateur Radio Relay League, known as HAM radio operators. Citizens throughout America dedicated to this hobby-a hobby that some people consider old fashioned or obsolete-were true heroes in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina as they were often the only line of communication available into the storm rayaged areas. Amateur radio operators are often overlooked in favor of flashier means of communication. As communities across the gulf coast and America learned this year, technology can be highly vulnerable. HAM radios, entirely self contained transmitters, require no cell towers or satellites, simply a battery and a strip of wire as an antenna. Just as after major earthquakes, tornadoes, and the terrorist attacks of 9/11, HAM operators around the country received an alert to stand by their radios to listen for calls for assistance. Following Hurricane Katrina, when cell phones and e-mail were useless, a HAM operator located in Connecticut alerted authorities about a woman trapped for 4 days without food or water and a Coast Guard Auxiliary in Cleveland arranged for a med-evac for a woman in labor in New Orleans. These are just a few examples of the many lives that were saved with the critical intervention of HAM operators throughout the country. Now more than ever, I am proud to be a licensed amateur radio operator. It is important to realize that every HAM radio operator in it! The Amateur Radio Emergency Service is a volunteer. This year, when disaster struck, hundreds of HAMs moved to the gulf coast to help in every way they could. Every one of which did so on a volunteer basis and their only goal was to assist in what became one of the worst natural disasters in America. The education displayed by HAM radio operators in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina sets a tremendous example for us all. The people whose lives were rescued as a result of the tireless dedication of HAM radio operators will forever be grateful to these selfless public servants." You can click on the "LA MS STX Emergency Communications" and the "AR LA MS TN Emergency Communications" links on the LA Section home page www.laarrl.org to read our two MOUs. ARES members and traffic handlers should review both of these MOUs well before the official start of the 2006 Hurricane Season on June 1. All hams interested in emergency communications are encouraged to pursue additional training whenever possible. If you aren't already receiving the excellent EMCOMM Monthly newsletter, you can sign up for a free subscription at www.emcomm.org The FEMA Independent Study Program at http://training.fema.gov/emiweb/IS/crslist.asp has dozens of free online courses. The two FEMA courses that probably all ARES members should take are IS-100 Introduction to the Incident Command System (ICS 100) and IS-700 National Incident Management System (NIMS) an Introduction. Each of these two courses requires approximately three hours. Many, if not most, of our served agencies may require us to have NIMS/ICS training in order to be deployed in future emergencies. It's been decided that the local starting times of the LA Traffic Net (LTN) and the LA CW Net (LCW) will remain at 6:00 pm daily and 6:30 pm daily, respectively, year round. As a reminder, if you participate in any public service activities (checking into traffic or ARES training nets, handling formal traffic, working with your local ARES group during emergency drills or public events such as parades, etc.), you are urged to submit a monthly Public Service Honor Roll (PSHR) or traffic report (or both!) via email or radiogram. The rules for determining your PSHR "score" are described in the monthly Public Service column in OST. KB5SAR is the new Emergency Coordinator for Morehouse Parish. With his knowledge and experience, Jeff will be an excellent EC for his local group and the LA Section is very fortunate to have him as an ARES leader. N5FJ, K5GLS, and N5NVP have agreed to serve on the 2006 LA Section Field Day Awards Committee. Thanks to AB5WF, KB5KKI, AK5J, and W5XX for hanging in there in spite of multiple adversities and to the many hams around the State who contacted their legislators in person, sent emails and letters, and made phone calls to rally support for the bill. And special thanks to Senator Tom King (Hattiesburg) and AB5WF, who really put their shoulders to the wheel in the last minute push. In spite of a solar flare on Friday and torrential rain on Saturday, the Third Annual Mississippi OSO Party was a resounding success according to comments received from out of state. Because of the flare 20 was really spotty, at best, but 40 was great. It sounded like 20 should be all day long. The rain was especially tough on the mobiles, who were activating rare counties. Thanks to W5WMU, W5PFR, KK4TA, WB5BNV, KK5K, and W5XX, who braved the elements on the road and portable operations by the MDXA (W4HOZ, KD5RHB and W5VK). Seems like the QSO Party gets better every year. More info next month's section report after the logs have come in. By coincidence, the CUSEC (Central US Earthquake Consortium) Exercise was conducted on the same day as the QSO Party. The objective of this exercise is for state EOC's in earthquake prone states to check communications circuits among themselves. AB5WF represented Mississippi operating from MEMA. The Mississippi Section is now a party to a disaster response Memorandum of Understanding with Arkansas, Louisiana, and Tennessee (the ARRL Delta Division). The purpose of this MOU is to pool communications resources in the event of a wide area weather event such as an ice storm, hurricane, outbreak of tornadoes, etc. The MOU with Louisiana and South Texas remains in effect. Congratulations to WA5TMC on being appointed to the ARRL National Emergency Response Planning Committee. The goal of this Committee is to develop a comprehensive national/regional emergency plan such that more effective response to events such as Katrina can be more systematically dealt with. Repeater Trustee KB5W reports that the Jackson County ARA Repeater Antenna that was destroyed by Katrina has been replaced, and W5WA is back on the air. The original antenna was mounted on the Jackson County EMA communications tower. Insurance considerations required that licensed/bonded personnel climb the tower to put up the new antenna which represented a major expenditure. Fortunately, due to the efforts of K1MMH at ARRL Headquarters, grant money was secured to fund the replacement antenna and tower crew. Thanks, Mary! Mississippi Baptist Hams Fellowship President KB5JN reports that the Mississippi Baptist Disaster Relief Communications Team is reorganizing. Two complete "jump kits" for portable operations have already been assembled. Plans are to outfit a communications trailer and to offer a Technician Class in April at the Central Hills Baptist Assembly in conjunction with scheduled Church and Association Disaster Relief Training. DEC/EC WA5TMC reports that Congressman Roger Wicker sat in on an emergency preparedness meeting at the Tippah EOC. Congressman Wicker was not only briefed on ham radio communications capabilities, but also heard high praise by the MEMA representative attending the meeting regarding our Katrina response. Congressman Wicker has been invited to Field Day. Jackson ARC VEC Coordinator reports that the VE Team (AC5SU, AB5WF, KD5FUY) served 20 candidates at the VE Test Session conducted during the Jackson hamfest. Here is a special note from Mark NU8Z. As written, it simply defies any editing and most importantly, it announces a fun annual event for everyone: Attention Michigan Hams. Do the low sunspot numbers and worsening HF conditions have you feeling down? Do you find it difficult to conjure up the energy needed to get on the air and have some fun like in the old days? Do you shy away from participating in ham radio related group activities? If you have any one of, or all of the above symptoms, you may be suffering from Amateur Radio Dysfunction Syndrome, also know as ARDS. Fear not! ARDS is a condition that can be treated with proper corrective actions. It is a fact that 9 out of 10 doctors agree that the best treatment for ARDS is a good dose of Radio Activity. Doctors also agree that the most efficient delivery method for ARDS treatment comes in the form of

participation in the 2006 Michigan QSO Party. The number of ARDS patients seeking treatment in the MiQP has been growing every year. Remember, this is a yearly condition, and yearly treatments may be needed. Treatment may be administered in single exposure doses taken in the comfort of your home (Single Op), or when you travel in your car (Mobile). If you are apprehensive about taking the treatment when you are alone, you may be treated within a group session (Multi-op), or as single treatment member of a larger support group like your radio club. Your treatment support group can compete against other ARDS support groups. Warning! Dosages should not exceed time periods of over 12 hour. Exposure times of less than 12 hours may be appropriate depending on the severity of your condition. Remember, even short exposures to MiQP ARDS treatment will be of benefit to you. If at any time during the MiOP treatment period you experience excessively high fun levels, you should consider terminating or reducing the level of treatment. In rare cases excessively high Fun levels have been known to last for days after the treatment. If these high levels should persist, see your family doctor. The Michigan OSO Party ARDS treatment should only be taken as prescribed below. Date /Time: Michigan QSO Party, sponsored by the Mad River Radio Club, from 1600Z April 15th until 0400Z April 16th. Stations may operate the full 12 hours. (12 noon to 12 midnight local Michigan time on April 15th) Modes and Categories: Phone and CW on 80/40/20/15/10 meters. Single-op, multi-op, and mobile categories. Single-op entries are categorized by output power, QRP (5W or less), Low Power (100W or less), and High Power (greater than 100W) Multipliers: Work stations once per band and mode. Work other states and Michigan Stations. MI to MI OSO's are allowed. Work portables and mobiles again as they change county, state or province. Exchange: Exchange QSO number and location (county for MI stations, state/province or "DX" for others). Scoring: One point per phone QSO, two points per CW OSO. Count multipliers once per mode. Multipliers are MI counties for all entries, plus states & provinces for MI entries only. Final score is total QSO points times total multipliers. Freqs: Suggested frequencies: CW-3545, 7045, 14045, 21045, 28045; Phone-3850, 7225, 14250, 21300, 28450. There have been more than 3800 comments, both supportive and not submitted to the FCC in their public commentary following that 30 page NPRM&O, FCC 05-143, http://hraunfoss.fcc.gov/edocs_public/attachmatch/FCC-05-143A1.pdf. In bureaucratic speak, this means that FCC has put out an idea for public commentary. They have not acted to make any changes to the rules. So, keep studying the code if you're working to upgrade. Code may be dropped in the future but with the other issues it has before it, any revision to that segment of the rules appears to be a while off. Oh, yeah! have to get everything packed, and into car-trunk -we're moving tonite to house where some mental health staff are staying (way out in the country on lake – some doctor offered use of his fishing cottage as shelter for them) – time to grab equipment for day, and get to car with other nurses – glad Kim drives, 'cause it's some distance & complicated. 0630: buffet breakfast @ Sheraton, 2 blocks from River Center – hotel graciously offered free buffets for RC volunteers – we're here for breakfast, lunch, dinner, whichever we can grab time for. 0700: in clinic – report from night staff – 1 client transported during nite to hospital with cardiac event – 4 more lying on cots with IVs infusing – dehydration, nausea&vomiting, diarrhea – no real dysentery yet to report to public health, thank goodness! – people from the upstairs unit who were moved at 1430 yesterday to special needs facility offsite were returned last nite @2030 when other facility decided to close!! some of those people are so fragile – must find out what went wrong!! in addition, 2 new people were admitted there during night – 24 hour coverage is difficult – need more R.N.s – phone is continually busy with so much stuff – they've said we're to get a 2nd line today – installation 2 days ago failed! – need to confirm transportation to get our amputee to hospital for his dialysis today – oh, yeah, and try to find out status of order for his special wheelchair to replace his own, stolen in first 2 days – he's big man – also needs elevation for legs (btk, and diabetic as well! a disaster within a disaster!) – must remember to tell mental health people again how much they're appreciated – they are doing such great work here, with clients, and staff as well! 0945: donation of new reading glasses has come in – eye docs are coming with special 'clinic-van' today to see more difficult problems - what'll we do with man who's had heart transplant? he needs some kind of isolation - he's with wife who can provide care—now problem-solving for space; — Kim's OB ed. class for the expectant mothers is going well, and much appreciated by the families and the doctors – the respiratory therapist volunteer is wonderful – doing so much so well – but she's so swamped, and has no relief 24/7 – must find some help for her somehow – II40: where does time go when you're having fun? I've always believed that studying for your first ham license should be the beginning of the learning process, not the end of it. Even if you have passed the Amateur Extra exam, there's plenty left to learn. Continuing education will improve your enjoyment of being a ham; you will learn new things you can have fun doing! Whatever your individual interest areas are in Amateur Radio, I encourage you to learn what you can about it and share it with others. Public service communications requires this continuing education more than almost any other area of Amateur Radio. That's due primarily to changing expectations of our served agencies, brought on by an increased ability to communicate instantly in our day-to-day lives, but also due to a greater awareness of the impact of technological (i.e. man-made) disasters. One way we serve the public is through the NWS SKYWARN program. To be an effective part of this program, you must complete spotter training and participate in SKYWARN nets regularly enough that you understand the procedures. You need to repeat spotter training from time to time, too. For the NWS, time is of the essence when storms appear, and if you haven't trained and practiced, you are probably in the way rather than being helpful. Most agencies using volunteers require them to undergo training. Whether you are an American Red Cross volunteer, a volunteer firefighter or a member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary, there is some level of training required, and in many cases, you have to repeat this training once in a while so you understand the latest procedures and techniques. Career professionals are sometimes wary of volunteers. Sometimes this is due to a bad first impression with a volunteer leader; sometimes they are

concerned volunteers will cause them more problems than they solve. This is especially true of spontaneous volunteers - people who just show up in the aftermath of a disaster offering to help, but have never been trained or even involved before. These volunteers present management challenges that most agencies simply do not have the time to deal with during a disaster. An article in the recent ARES E-Letter discussed the remarks of one Emergency Response Coordinator in Mississippi who stated that he didn't want "a bunch of yahoos with walkie talkies" running around, getting in his way. As SM I am certainly glad this did not take place in North Carolina, but he illustrates something we need to think about. Being trained and practicing regularly improves our credibility and inspires confidence in the eyes of those we serve. They know they can depend on us to do our job without interfering with theirs. It also builds relationships that can survive turnovers in leadership; theirs or ours. Those of us who work with Emergency Management will need some additional training in the near future. The Department of Homeland Security is requiring all first responders, including volunteers, to complete training in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) by 2007. There was some question about whether this requirement also applies to radio operators, and Ron Breitwisch, KCOOX, a DEC in Iowa recently contacted FEMA to ask for a clarification. Here is the response, also from the ARES E-Letter: "Thank you for contacting the NIMS Integration Center. The short answer is: Yes. In a response scenario that extends beyond local government, there needs to be common terminology and doctrine that everyone can follow so that personnel and resources are feathered in a seamless manner. This is especially true for radio communications. Radio operators need to understand what is being said and asked of them during an incident so that they can convey this information effectively and efficiently. Please let me know if I can provide further assistance. Regards, Paul F. Ganem, NIMS Integration Center" The specific courses recommended for entry-level volunteers are IS-100, Incident Command System; and IS-700, National Incident Management System. Both are available free of charge at the FEMA Emergency Management Institute Independent Study web site. There are also instructor's materials available for download, so if you wanted to conduct an in-person course for members of your ARES group, they have done a lot of the work for you! There are lots of other courses that you may find helpful also. The home page for the Independent Study Program is: http://training.fema.gov/EMIWeb/IS/ I have taken several of these FEMA courses myself. If you have completed an ARECC course, you already have a head start and it will only take a few hours to complete them. If it's new material to you it may take a bit longer, but it is not a long time commitment at all and well worth the effort. While there is value in independent study, it's also important to train with your local ARES group and practice regularly so you will know what is expected locally. You will be better at what you do, and there's great satisfaction - and fun - in belonging to a group that works well together. Greetings to all Amateur Radio Operators. This is Dr. Jim, N2ZZ with the March 2006 South Carolina Section Manager's Report! Please remember that the SC Section website can be found at: www.arrlsc.org/ where my full SM report will be listed as well as up-to-the-date information on Amateur Radio in South Carolina! Amateur Radio was favorably mentioned in a report to the White House this past month. On February 23, "The Federal Response to Hurricane Katrina: Lessons Learned," http://www.whitehouse.gov/reports/katrina-lessons-learned/index.html was submitted to the White House, Over the last four months, at the direction of President Bush, a team of White House staff members and colleagues across the country at all levels of government reviewed the Federal government's role and performance in preparing for, responding to and recovering from Hurricane Katrina. Amateur Radio is specifically mentioned in Appendix B of "The Federal Response to Hurricane Katrina: Lessons Learned," under the subheading "Non-governmental Organizations." http://www.whitehouse.gov/reports/katrina-lessons-learned/appendix-b.html "Other organizations worked tirelessly to assist emergency responders that, due to the storm, did not have the equipment and means to effectively carry out their duties. Amateur Radio Operators from both the Amateur Radio Emergency Service and the American Radio Relay League, monitored distress calls and rerouted emergency requests for assistance throughout the U.S. until messages were received by emergency response personnel. A distress call made from a cell phone on a rooftop in New Orleans to Baton Rouge was relayed, via ham radio, from Louisiana to Oregon, then Utah, and finally back to emergency personnel in Louisiana, who rescued the 15 stranded victims. Ham radio operators voluntarily manned the amateur radio stations at sites such as the National Hurricane Center, Hurricane Watch Net, Waterway Net, Skywarn and the Salvation Army Team Emergency Radio Network." I regret to report that on March 2nd, John Hennessee, N1KB became a silent key at age 42. John's hometown was Cheraw, SC where he was first licensed as KA4AUR at age 14. In 1986, after he graduated from Wingate College in NC, he joined the ARRL Headquarters staff. He worked in the Field and Educational Services branch of the ARRL as a Regulatory Information Specialist, and was the primary author on the ARRL FCC Rule Book. Survivors include his mother, Carole Hennessee, two sisters and his beloved cat, Darlene. A service was held Thursday, March 9, 11 AM, at First Methodist Church, Cheraw, South Carolina. We will all miss John. I can't open my first monthly section news without once again thanking my predecessor, John Covington, W4CC, for his six years of outstanding leadership. John was one of the hardest working, most traveled, and most effective section managers in ARRL history. During his three terms, John devoted innumerable hours to our section, visiting countless club meetings, hamfests, and special events. John drove over 10,000 miles/year on league business and visited all 100 counties in the state. John brought a wealth of expertise and professionalism to this volunteer position and set a high standard for me and the others who follow him. I'm especially grateful that John recruited such an excellent section cabinet and I'm honored they've agreed to continue to serve North Carolina hams as I begin my term. In my 30 years as a ham, I've held numerous elected and appointed positions, but I've never held a section-level job. So I'm glad John will still be around to offer advice and I appreciate your input (and patience) as I learn the ropes! WHO ARE WE AND WHERE ARE WE GOING? Of the 675,274 amateur radio operators licensed in the US, North Carolina has 18,539. We're the tenth largest state in terms of ham population. But only 3,792 of those hams are ARRL members, and that's probably a good estimate of the number of active hams in the state. There are 91 ARRL affiliated clubs in North Carolina, but only 51 are current in the ARRL database. There are currently 11 ARRL-affiliated hamfests scheduled in the section. Our section also has 210 volunteer ARRL appointees, not to mention hundreds more who have leadership positions in local clubs. There's a lot to be excited about, but also challenges to be faced. Our hobby is threatened by pressure on our bands from commercial interests and the interference threat of BPL. Restrictive covenants that prohibit antennas are almost ubiquitous in newer subdivisions. But the biggest threat is in the numbers I listed...they're dropping every year. We're not recruiting enough new hams to replace the silent keys. The average age of an amateur radio operator is somewhere around 50 and for an ARRL member, its approaching 60. Those averages are going up by 1 every year. So where will our hobby be in 20 years when I'm ready to join so many of you as a retiree and full-time ham? And will my 6 year old daughter, who is learning Morse code, be able to have a CW QSO when she's my age? Over the next two years you're going to hear me talk (and listen) a lot about this problem and I'll be sharing some of the great things clubs across the state are doing to spread the magic of ham radio. PRB-1 PROGRESS REPORT Our PIO, Bill Morine, N2COP and former Wilmington mayor Ham Hicks, KB4BR are

keeping up the momentum as we try to get a PRB-1 bill passed by the North Carolina legislature. Ham is scheduled to testify before the legislature's Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Management Recovery Study Committee on April 20. Write your state legislator to educate them on the problems faced by hams who try to install antennas in areas with restrictions. These restrictions not only threaten our hobby, but also affect our ability to provide emergency communications after a disaster. First – connectors, emergency power sources, rigs that are not used daily, more batteries, portable antennas, feedline, etc. Second, your local ARES organization. Are you a member of your local ARES organization? Yes. When was the last training session or meeting you attended? Who is your EC? Who are the assistant ECs? Can't answer those questions? You are not prepared. Not a member of your local ARES? Why not? Active in local ARES? If not, why not? Have you ever been NCS for the weekly training net? No weekly training net? Offer to help organize one. Want to be more active in ARES? Get out of that chair and contact your EC http://www.sflarrl.org/ARES,%20SOUTH%20FLORIDA.htm - and offer to assist. Your EC has volunteered for a huge job. He/she is responsible for organizing, training and helping deploy responders. This entails phone calls, record keeping, training plans, meeting with county and municipal officials, meeting with served agency officials, and long hours at EOC during an emergency event. Pitch in and help out. Organize the phone call-up tree. Keep a record of training completed by individual members, teach a subject needed by ARES members. Pick up the net control one week a month. Offer to be an assistant in the event that the EC is ill, at work, or out of town when the emergency occurs. There are tasks you can do without leaving the comfort of your home. Your EC will thank you, your fellow hams will thank you, your community will thank you, and Jeff WA4AW, our Section EC and I will thank you. On 27 April 2006 we were successful in installing a new Icom AH-710 terminated folded dipole high frequency antenna system and repairing an existing Diamond 2m, 1-1/4 m, 70cm tri band antenna at the Delaware Emergency Management Agency, Emergency Operations Center in Smyrna, Delaware. We were granted at 2 hour window to complete the repairs and installation it took us over 3 hours to complete. In addition to AD3M there was Jim Friel K3SXA Delaware State Communications manager, John DiGiovanni N3LUD and Justin Kates KB3JUV. On 2 May 2006 Justin returned to the DEMA location during a Hurricane Workshop and filed this report: Also today, while I was at the facility for something else, I tested out VHF and HF at the new station during my lunch break. I tested both antennas using an MFJ Antenna Analyzer and the SWR was very good. I was able to hit the Millsboro 2 meter repeater from Smyrna now that the antenna is a bit more elevated. Also I made contact with an Ohio station on 40 meters HF. By the time I had everything cooking, It was time for me to shut down and get back to my meeting. Hopefully, we will be able to go back to the station in a while to do some more on the air tests. I am pleased that the station works and that our hard work has payed off! For the past two days, I've been attending a Hurricane Workshop that was originally designed by FEMA. The basis of the class was to get emergency management officials better prepared for the process involved with managing the response to a hurricane. We talked about everything from readiness, hazards, evacuation studies, decisions, re-entry, as well as the all important Hurricane Readiness Checklist. One of the major things that these state agencies are realizing (we have already realized it and are working hard to get our members to) is to get our responders (first, second, third, or hundredth) PREPAIR THEIR FAMILIES FIRST then to worry about the agency. Myself as the Training officer for MARS (as well as Lewes RACES, and Kent ARES) have been beating this in peoples heads with FEMA IS-22 "Are You Ready?". Finally we have support from the government who says the exact same thing! We need to get these people ready with go kits, plans, evacuation and sheltering information plus whatever they need to know about KEEPING THEIR FAMILY SAFE !!! How will we contact our communicators for deployment? This was asked in many different ways. As it turns out each agency at this meeting did it a different way, some using phone, some using pagers, emails, loudspeaker, you name it. None of them were happy with it either! We need to work that out. The ARRL has updated its Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Course Level 3 New topics include: * National Incident Management System (NIMS) * National Response Plan (NRP) * Key NRP Emergency Support Functions * Department of Homeland Security Citizen Corps and Community Emergency Response Teams * National Disaster Medical System (NDMS) Communications Support * Hospital Emergency Communications * ARES Management and the Incident Command System (ICS) Registration for EC-003 Rev 2 opens Monday, May 15 and will remain open through June 4. The inaugural class begins Friday, June 16. To learn more about this and other online educational offerings from ARRL, visit the CCE Course Listing page or contact the CCE Department. If you need more information about FEMA courses please visit the Emergency Management Institute at http://www.training.fema.gov/EMIWeb/IS/crslist.asp It appears that in the future that some of these

training programs will become mandatory from the Federal level in the not so distant future. Our neighboring state Pennsylvania, NIMS [National Incident Management System] training is now a requirement for ALL first responders by decree of the Governor. There is also a requirement from Homeland Security to put NIMS in place (or lose federal funding opportunities). Currently in Pennsylvania the requirements are the IS-100, 200, and 700 courses. IS-800 (National Response Plan Intro) will also be required soon. It's of note that the Pennsylvania requirement explicitly applies to volunteers. This week the League began getting out the word via e-mail to members in states with Senators on Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee. The letter to members in targeted states asks League members to urge their Senators on the committee to support language addressing the BPL interference issue when the Senate bill is marked up in committee on June 8. The language the League wants to see in the Senate amendment to the telecom bill would call on the FCC to "conduct, and submit to the House Energy and Commerce and the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation, a study of the interference potential of broadband over power line systems leading to improved rules to prevent the deployment of systems having a potential to cause destructive interference to radio communication systems." The ARRL plea includes a sample letter http://www.arrl.org/tis/info/HTML/plc/files/BPL-Amendment-SenateSampleLetter0506-Rev2.doc which members are encouraged to personalize as much as possible. The League wants members to fax their letters to the number indicated in the e-mail to members plus a copy to ARRL's government relations firm Chwat & Company, ATTN: Eric Heis, KI4NFC, 625 Slaters Ln -- Suite 103, Alexandria, VA 22314. Fax 703-684-7594. The sample letter points out the value of Amateur Radio's role in recent disasters, such as Hurricane Katrina. "The reason we need your help is that the FCC continues to resist growing evidence that its rules are inadequate to protect radio communication systems, including those relied upon by First Responders, from radio spectrum pollution caused by BPL systems," it says. "The FCC needs to objectively and carefully review this evidence and adopt rules that will keep interference from BPL within reasonable bounds." The sample letter notes that not only has the FCC shown no inclination to do that, it's so far failed "to enforce its existing rules in specific, well documented instances of harmful interference." "Remember that it is not BPL that we oppose, but BPL interference," Sumner emphasized this week. "Some BPL systems are designed not to cause widespread interference, but many are not. The problem is that the FCC rules don't distinguish between the two. This is unfair to licensed radio services that must deal with the consequences of spectrum pollution." Congratulations to the winning stations and a special thanks to the Thibodaux ARC for sponsoring this year's OSO Party. Whereas, There are over 20,500 amateur radio operators in the State of Michigan and over 85 amateur radio clubs who have demonstrated their value in public assistance by providing, at their own expense, free emergency radio communications; and, Whereas, Many of the Michigan radio amateurs - who are on volunteer status to assist in any emergency local or worldwide - will demonstrate their radio communications skills during the American Relay League's (ARRL) Annual Field Day Exercises: and, Whereas, In cooperation with NASA and its astronauts, Michigan amateur radio operators and the ARRL provide additional public service by setting up portable amateur radio communication links between astronauts in space and Michigan students in their classrooms, opening the eyes of young people to the realities of space, science and engineering; and, Whereas, The ARRL and the National Association for Amateur Radio, headquartered in Newington, Connecticut, provides internationally broadcast bulletins, training programs and a staff of professional engineers, technicians and legal counsel for its members in Michigan and throughout our Nation; and, Whereas, The ARRL's broadcasts via amateur radio reach over two million licensed radio amateurs plus uncounted numbers of electronic engineers, technicians and experimenters; and, Whereas, This years Amateur Radio Field Day, taking place June 24 and 25, 2006, will be a 24-hour, round-the-clock operation under emergency power where radio amateurs will test their own skills and the readiness of their equipment from the Michigan fields, hillsides and woodland clearings; and now therefore be it, Resolved, That I, Jennifer M. Granholm, Governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby proclaim the week of June 19, 2006, as Amateur Radio Awareness Week in Michigan. We will be posting the full document to the web site very soon. You will then be able to download it for local use in conjunction your club's Field Day activities. The amendment is now part of HR 5252 the House Telecommunications Bill. As you may have read on the ARRL Home page, the League is now turning its focus to the Senate where the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee will conduct its own hearings under S2686. New Jersey Senator Frank Lautenberg is a member of this powerful committee. We are asking all New Jersey amateur radio operators to take a few minutes to write to the Senator asking him to support language similar to HR 5252 requiring the FCC to formally address BPL interference issues. A sample letter went out to all NJ hams and can also be found as part of the lead article on the ARRL Home Page. Please feel free to personalize the letter and remember that the issue is not BPL but the interference it causes to licensed radio services (not only amateur radio). Also, a FAX or mailed letter has more meaning than one sent via e-mail. If you have not received the bulletin please be sure that your member status page is checked for division and section mailings. Remember, nothing will happen unless we let our representatives know how we feel. Amateur radio is not losing licensees! That is evident by the addresses of 66 newly licensed hams in NNJ that were downloaded from the ARRL website. This number is, obviously, the result of recent VE classes/sessions that have been held by groups throughout NNJ. Thank you all for keeping the amateur radio service growing! Here is Jim's article and the second article is too long for my report so it will be on my web site www.kz7t-oregonsm.org under PIC. If you are going to write a letter please be diplomatic. You can catch more flies with honey. I know that this is repetitious but it is important and the more that ask should bring more letters. "To: ARRL Northwestern Division Members: In my March 2006 letter, I briefly noted a need for hams to become politically astute as we look to the future. Due to certain political forces and "market demand", good engineering technology is sometimes put aside in lieu of programs that are not compatible with our service. In order not to be overrun by these forces, we must become more aware of

the political environment and be mindful that our privileges, operating environment and frequencies are not subrogated. In the past, the ARRL has encouraged members to write or e-mail federal legislators asking for support for bills and initiatives. But, how do we both gain a better understanding the legislation that needs our support and how can we better understand the political process? Gaining knowledge of and participating in this legislative arena is soon to become more formal and very important. The announcement that House Resolution 230 sponsored by Rep. Mike Ross WD5DVR is now an element of the House Telecommunications Bill (HR5252) provides this opportunity. A section of this bill requires the FCC to investigate and report on interference on the HF and VHF frequencies. For some inexplicable reason, the BPL industry wants this item deleted from the bill! In support of Representative Ross, each Board member and officer was asked to write his or her House of Representatives member in support HRes 230. We achieved 100% participation and we believe our support helped foster its inclusion into HR5252. During the ARRL Board Meeting last January, I was asked to participate as a member of the Grassroots Legislative Action Committee. The charge to this committee is to oversee the development and enhancement of the legislative process including: 1) A user-friendly process that will enable ARRL Members to receive timely notification of pending legislation. 2) A structure within each ARRL Division and State to oversee the Grassroots process. 3) A Definition of training activities that increase the knowledge and participation of ARRL members in the political process. The recommendations of our committee will be presented to the full ARRL Board in July. As a part of this process, I am charged to identify and appoint politically astute members to serve as Northwestern Division Legislative Action Coordinator, State Legislative Action Coordinators, and State Legislative Action Assistants to fulfill this process. So, as an individual ARRL member, what does this mean to you? As noted earlier, hams cannot rely on others to maintain the privileges we currently enjoy. We must become active and communicate the need for an active, viable, and trained cadre of radio communicators to serve the United States during natural and man-made disasters or in times of crisis. Our ARRL founder, Hiram Percy Maxim, participated in this political process and we now must continue to follow in his footsteps. Our survival is partially dependent on the amount of effort we put into this activity. When a bill or activity requires our support (or criticism), we must respond. In the future, you will receive information requesting you to communicate with your legislators in support of bills that will directly or indirectly affect amateur radio. In addition, if you have an interest in serving as a division-level appointee in this exciting process, please contact me expressing your interest. Thanks in advance for your support and participation in this effort. Your participation can certainly result in continuing the lineage we had as new hams and insure our frequencies and ability to serve our fellow citizens is maintained well into the future. Note: A letter was sent to ARRL members in AK, WA, OR and MT on May 12 requesting you to write Senators serving on the Telecommunications Committee. We need their support to add language to S2686 similar to language in HR5252. This need surfaced while this letter to the Northwestern Division was being written. This is an example how things happen in "warp-speed" urgency as we deal with our elected officials. This legislation will have a profound effect on the amateur radio service. We must make our wishes known! In this manner, we can influence our destiny. I'm happy to report that the HF antennas on the roof of the South Carolina State EOC were successfully replaced on April 18th. Marc Tarplee, N4UFP, TC led the antenna replacement team of Tony Sealy N4ADM, TS; Ron Twining W4RET, EC; and Charlie Miller AE4UX, SEC. Early in the afternoon they were joined by Phil Shreves, N7GZT. There were 114 registered attendees from 18 states in attendance. This 3 day event was jam-packed with activities for the 50 MHz thru 47 GHz enthusiast! ARRL President Joel Harrison, N5ZN, opened the conference at noon Friday by welcoming the attendees and speaking for a few minutes about the League's latest efforts concerning BPL. Earlier Friday, attendees went out to the antenna range set up in the hotel parking lot to measure the performance of their commercial or homebrew antennas. The range was set up to measure antennas from 50 MHz thru 2304 MHz. Many participants were able to optimize the performance of that HB antenna! At the same time inside the hotel, measurements were made on HB or commercial pre-amps and RX converters. This year we were able to measure noise figures on pre-amps up thru 24 GHz with the latest Agilent Technologies test instruments. In addition, over 14 hams were on hand to make presentations on a variety of subjects from Microwave Rain Scatter to the latest 903 MHz transverter design. AMSAT was present in force and demonstrated the new Eagle SDX (Software Defined Transponder) which will likely be the basis for most future satellites carrying amateur radio. Flex-Radio was present to update attendees on their wildly successful SDR-1000 Software Defined Radio. Homebrew transverters for 10 GHz, 24 GHz, and 47 GHz were displayed and demonstrated! Section Report- Virginia Section April, 2006 Glen Sage, W4GHS Virginia Section Manger As Virginia Section Manager, I have continued with my efforts to visit clubs across the section. I had reported on my visits to the Virginia Mountain ARC, and the Franklin County ARC in the March report (the visits took place in April). I visited the Roanoke Valley Amateur Radio Club, the Briarpatch ARC, and a combined meeting with the Massanutten Amateur Radio Club along with the Valley Amateur Radio Association. Interest was excellent at each of these visits with packed meeting rooms and lots of questions about future plans for the section. We discussed the ARES program, traffic handling, mentoring, special event stations and an assortment of other interest items. I want to thank the Massanutten and Valley clubs for combining their meeting and allowing my travel to be more fruitful. The section is over 609 highway miles from Cumberland Gap, Virginia to the Eastern Shore. In the future, it would be helpful to meet with multi-clubs to conserve on cost and time involved in travel. With this combined meeting we had between 60 and 70 hams present Renewed interest in traffic and messages handling has grown from these meetings. I have received a message from one EC following a meeting and he plans to focus on traffic handling in future ARES nets. To arrive on site at a disaster and not have a level of comfort in traffic handling and message passing is a real problem. To be a licensed Amateur Radio Operators is not all the qualifications needed to assist in emergencies. I have heard people say, "If we ever have a disaster here, we will have plenty of help, people will be coming out of the woodwork to help out." Warm bodies that are untrained can be part of the problem rather that part of the solution. One major project that is to be a yearlong event is special event stations for the 400th Anniversary of the settlement of Virginia. It is our hope that we can have a special event station at historical sites across the commonwealth throughout 2007. A special event has been planned for Jamestown and Poplar Forest, the second home of Thomas Jefferson. We have enough sites of historical importance that we could operate from a different site every weekend of the year. Our Assistant Section Manager, Woody Thompson, W4TU is coordinating these events. You may contact Woody at 540-254-2770, or Woodyw4tu@ntelos.net if your club or special interest group has an interest in operating. The section is planning to have certificates for a certain number of sites worked in addition to the QSL or certificates offered by those sponsoring the event. There are two good ways to earn bonus points with traffic on Field Day. Rule 7.3.5. allows for 100 bonus points for originating a message to the Section Manager (W9IXG) or Section Emergency Coordinator (KB9ENO). The message should be in National Traffic System (NTS) style. It should include the club name, number of participants, Field Day location, and number of ARES operators involved with your station. The message must be transmitted during the Field Day period and a fully serviced copy of it, in standard ARRL NTS format, must be included in your submission,. Not only that! If your FD station handles a FD message during the event, you can add 10 bonus point for each message you relay up to 100 points. That means handling a message is equal to working ten more stations! Copies of those messages should be included with your log as well. Obviously, trained traffic handlers will do this more easily, but it could be an excellent learning opportunity - especially for newer Hams. I hope to hear lots of traffic being handled on Field Day. After all, one of the main objects is to operate in abnormal situations in less

On a 321 to 101 vote, the US House of Representatives on June 8 passed the Communications Opportunity, Promotion and Enhancement (COPE) Act of 2006. The House-passed bill, HR 5252, leaves intact language that required the FCC to study the interference potential of BPL systems. US Rep Mike Ross, WD5DVR (D-AR), one of two radio amateurs in Congress, sponsored the BPL study requirement, "Study of Interference Potential of Broadband over Power Line Systems". HR 5252 now goes to the US Senate, where a separate and very different telecoms bill, the Communications, Consumer's Choice, and Broadband Deployment Act of 2006 (S 2686) is still in committee. The ARRL has e-mailed members in the 22 states with Senators on the committee, urging

them to write seeking support to include similar BPL study language in the Senate bill. Ed. Don't speculate on anything on the air during an emergency. Other amateurs and the general public are listening and any incorrect information could cause problems for those coping with the disaster. If you must give someone information on damage, etc, make sure you make it clear whether your information is confirmed or an estimate. Messages must be passed exactly as written. It is best to check with the author if you think the message is not clear or is incorrect. However, the message content is the responsibility of the author. Ham radio is not a secure means of communication and this should be kept in mind by the served agencies. For example, death notifications are generally never sent by amateur radio. ARRL numbered radiograms are a standardized list of often used phrases. Each phrase on the list is assigned a number and identified by the letters ARL. For example, ARL SIX means "will contact you as soon as possible". These ARL standard texts are included in the text of messages and make transmission time much quicker. The list can be found on www.arrl.org Logging is very important in a disaster operation. The net control should keep a log of

stations on the net and traffic handled. Each station on the net should keep an "event log" of important tactical messages handled, operator changes, and other events. All ARES members, traffic handlers, and anyone else interested in emergency communications (emcomm) should familiarize themselves with the plan and keep a hard copy handy. I want to thank AE5V and WA5LQZ for assisting K5GLS with the revised plan. The latest issue of the LA Section Net Newsletter is now available at www.laarrl.org/netnews.html The ability to send and receive formal written messages via one or more modes is a fundamental skill that every emcomm minded amateur should possess. Although you can learn much by reading about the subject, you have to do it on a reasonably regular basis to be a competent traffic handler. As pointed out in the ARRL's Public Service Communications Manual, a primary objective of the National Traffic System (NTS) in general, and our section's traffic nets in particular, is training amateur operators to handle written traffic and participate in directed nets. At the risk of belaboring the importance of traffic handling, I want to quote from another League publication, The Radio Amateur's Operating Manual: "...Although message handling is as old an art as amateur radio itself, there are still many amateurs who do not know how to handle a message and have never done so. Thorough familiarity with traffic handling is the mark of an all-around operator, even though he may devote most of his time to other amateur pursuits. No amateur's operating education is complete unless he is a capable traffic handler. Traffic work need not be a

complicated or time-consuming activity for the casual or occasional message handler. Amateurs may participate in traffic work to whatever extent they wish. The basics of traffic handling are simple and easy for any operator to conquer." Even though these words were written over 35 years ago, they are still relevant today. I am very sorry to report that KB5RKO, K5HFE, and WD5FDD are now Silent Keys. And lastly, congratulations are in order for Candice, KD5VDV, of Wiggins who has been selected to attend the ARRL 2006 Teachers Institute on Wireless Technology in Roseville, California, on June 19-23. Candice teaches at Stone County Middle School and is the daughter of WZ5Y. She is the first teacher from Mississippi ever selected for the ARRL Teachers Institute which is an all expenses paid five-day session covering such topics as wireless technology literacy, bringing space into the classroom, introduction to micro controllers, and basic robotics. Field Day is here already! It's time to prepare. Gather up your transceivers, push up masts, dipoles, and coax and be ready to charge off into the hot and bug infested Mississippi boondocks for 24 hours of fun and fellowship. Complete rules are on page 105 of the May QST. Thanks to the efforts of SGL AB5WF, Governor Haley Barbour has proclaimed the week of Field Day as Amateur Radio Week in Mississippi in recognition of our contribution to the state's emergency preparedness. Speaking of emergency preparedness, the Simulated Emergency Test (SET) is conducted annually by the ARRL to promote served agency interaction with the ham community. For a given section, the SET date can be scheduled anytime between September 1 and November 30. This date range presents a problem for the Gulf South and East Coast which are potential hurricane impact areas during this time as well as being 'fire season' in the western states.

Further, by not having the SET on a national single date the National Traffic System for all practical purposes is cut out of the participation loop because it cannot be brought up in extended session to accommodate each section SET date. In the past eight years, two of the scheduled Mississippi SETs have had to be moved because of hurricanes and last year the SET was cancelled all together due to Katrina. One apparent solution is to have the SET in the late spring on a single date well after tornado season. This concept has been proposed to ARRL Headquarters. Let's standby and see what happens. As noted in an earlier Monthly Section report, Mississippi has entered into an MOU with Arkansas, Louisiana, and Mississippi to handle tactical communications during wide area storm events. In addition, the managers of the Magnolia Section Net (AD5J) and the Mississippi Section Phone Net (K5NRK) have developed a Joint Emergency Operation Procedure such the 3862.5/3862 can be manned 24/7 during storm events. The nets will meet at their regular time after which the nets will maintain an 'open net' with an NCS always on frequency until the next net starts to handle primarily health/welfare traffic and tactical communications, as necessary, Further, RN5 and Mississippi Traffic Net Manager KB5W has organized the Gulf Coast CW Guard Net which will maintain watch on 3711 or 7111 24/7 to handle emergency related traffic. Hopefully, with all of this preplanning, nothing will happen this year. Another helpful form of emergency operations assistance will be ready to deploy 'Go-Kits' that will be available from ARRL Headquarters. These 'Go Kits' are fitted into Pelican Cases and can be shipped overnight from ARRL Headquarters. Several types of kits are available: HF, VHF HTs; VHF HTs with base station, repeater, and several support kits including power supplies and batteries, tuners, antennas, digital gear, and amplifiers. Currently seven of each type of kit are available to deploy. Jackson ARC VE Test Team Chairmen AC5SU and K5BLL report a record VE Test Session on June 4. Mississippi has 30 new technicians and two new extras. This record number of new hams resulted from a Thursday-Friday-Saturday Class taught by K5BLL and W5GEJ for Mississippi Department of Health first responders and IT personnel. There was so much paperwork flying around that it took 10 VE's to process all of the required administrative requirements during the test session. Ham Radio was well represented at the annual Mississippi Civil Defense Emergency Management Agency annual conference held at the Convention Center in Gulfport June 5 through 7. State RACES Officer AB5WF chaired a break out session and was assisted with presentations by W4WLF and W5XX. The weather cooperated at Dayton this year with three days of sunshine in the Flea Market. Forum Room logistics (space and temperature) were greatly improved as well as bus transportation from the off-site parking area. The operators gained valuable experience and will use that to improve their response to future requests for aid. If you have a radio station in the county, great! Get on their events list.-email them today. And don't forget about fliers at convenience stores. Keep them simple and use large print so they can be read while waiting in line. Have you invited your emergency manager or fire chief out? (Bonus points) Be sure to feed them. These are basics but they can work effectively if you'll do them. When you advertise for your class this fall someone might remember the guys set up at the park. Have fun at Field Day wherever you may be. ---------- Pilot Knob's express class graduated 13 students. They scheduled a follow up to re-enforce operating protocols and help the newly minted operators get on the air. Kaw Valley ARC helped out with communications for the Topeka Downtown Cruise Night car show. A local broadcast station was a sponsor of the event and acknowledged the clubs support on the PA at the event as well as on the air the following week. The Meriden ARC had fun at their April meeting listening to a talk and demo of Slow Scan TV by "Telescope Bob" KB1FYL. Here's an excerpt from their newsletter: "Bob brought a complete computer (notebook) setup along with a transceiver and used the club's G5RV to receive slow scan TV images from various stations around the country. He explained how easy it is to set up with just a few interconnecting cables using a freeware software program. He mentioned that most of the slow scan activity is on 20 meters around 14.230 MHZ.. Generally the signals can be found in 300 kHz segments above and below 14.230. He demonstrated the various ways to ID your station and how the communications also uses SSB for voice. Generally the picture will be as good as the signal. A good S-9 signal with no interference can look quite good. He used pre-saved Jpeg images, which were in a 4:3 aspect ratio and approximately 4-500 pixels on the computer screen. The image we saw was very much like a CIF video image which is nominally 320x240. Bob mentioned that one way to initiate a SS QSO is to call "CO Slow Scan" using SSB (upper side band on 20 meters of course) Once contact is made with a fellow Slow Scan Ham, you then continue using video. The bottom line was that all you need is an HF rig; a computer and a few interconnecting wires and you too can enjoy sending and receiving pictures all over the world." Elmer, KA1EAJ ran a radio merit badge station at the Boy Scout Camporee in Bethany. Will report more about that effort when I get more info. Thanks for your time and congrats! Something new has just been released by Allen Pitts, W1AGP, ARRL's Media and PR guru. Tuesday, June 20th has been designated "Take Your HT to Work Day". One day, I'll tell you an absolutely 100% true story about my experience in putting on a demo just like this. A ham co-worker and I demonstrated 10 meter AM from my mobile in the company parking lot during lunch hour for several non-ham co-workers. We made a very unusual contact. It was fifty years ago but absolutely true. You may have seen in the news that a new country (referred to as an entity) is likely to emerge in the very near future. As soon as Montenegro is voted into the United Nations, its independent standing from Serbia will be recognized in the DX community and the pileups will commence. This new one for everyone, from the top Honor Roller to the DX novice will count exactly the same as the recent 3Y0X operation at Peter I Island in the Antarctic or any other rare DX operation in a remote part of the world. But this new entity will carry many advantages for the DX world, however. Montenegro has over 600,000 permanent residents which doubtlessly includes many hams. Unlike dozens of distinct sand bars and reefs which have absolutely no one living there, Montenegro will be on the air every day, not just when some expedition decides to spend a small fortune to activate it for a week. Montenegro will eventually be simple for even the most casual DXer to add to his or her DXCC total. Whether a new DX entity is the most remote uninhabited reef in the ocean or a major country with cities and highways, they all count exactly alike, for just one more. Soon there will be 336 of them. On a somewhat related matter, the DXCC desk announced on June 15th, a somewhat more generous change will be enacted that will affect the way "Political Entities" are recognized for entity credit. Once the interested parties have had a chance to review the maps of the world's eligible land parcels to see how the revised rule may affect the entity status of a long list of previously unqualified places on earth, one or more additional entities may emerge, possibly just in time to participate in this fall and winter's DX contests. As I said above, they all count for one more entity added to your DXCC total. As the real estate agents always remind us, the world is not creating any more land. What is here now is all we'll ever have. But the DX fraternity continues to find new ways to divide it up to make it look and be counted as if it is more. The 2006 Dayton Hamvention is now history. Attendance was approximately equal to last year, just over 20,000 hams. ARRL presence was very strong through ARRL Expo. See http://www.arrl.org/announce/nc/2006/ on the Internet for details of this major investment of staff personnel and exhibit space. All major services of the ARRL were showcased and many forums offered. Even in a show as huge as Dayton, very few people could possibly say that they didn't notice the ARRL and their programs. New England's biennial ARRL Division Convention will take place on August 25-27 in Boxboro, MA. We should all make a strong effort to include it into our busy schedules and be sure that we attend. One needs to remember that lightning need not strike directly on your antenna or tower structure to cause tremendous damage inside your home. Induced currents from nearby strikes can be enough to damage your transciever or amplifier, should they be left connected. A good source of information on lightning protection can be found at Polyphaser's site on the web. They specialize in modern, well constructed surge and strike mitigation. Would you know who you could talk to on which channels or talk groups? Are there any different protocols, traffic-handling procedures, etc? Marina, N7LSL, ASEC for District M reports Reg. 2 had an exercise on May 18, in which all the hospitals participated. It was a beneficial learning experience for all. On 5/22-24, Regions 1, 5, 6 participated in a huge, multifaceted exercise (Evergreen Sentry) that

involved many Federal, state, and local public safety, emergency management agencies, as well as many of the hospitals. They are still writing the After-action report for that. In preparation for the exercise we had a training session on Radiation Safety. Several members supported Special Olympics at Fort Lewis. From the SEC, Ken, K7TAG, would like to add to Kirk, N7UK's comments on being asked to run the 800 MHz Trucked radio system in an exercise. This is a common thread that I have heard from many sources including teams deployed for the hurricanes as well as public service exercises.. We are typically viewed as communicators and can be asked to operate many different types of radio systems, not just our own radios. It is also important to note that amateur radio being invited to participate in the Pacific Peril Exercise is an important tribute to the contribution that we can make to a major disaster. It was a multi-state, multi-nation exercise with participants from California, Oregon, Washington, British Columbia and Alaska simulating a major tsunami off the West Coast. Everyone who participated helped to show the valuable communications skills we bring to a disaster.

Don't forget to setup your "GOTA -- Get-On-The-Air" station as an opportunity for Novice, Technician or generally inactive hams to have a chance to operate, adding points to your overall total without changing the number of transmitters in your class. ARIZONA SECTION NEWS June 2006 PRB-1 and CC&R's With all of the new homes going up it is no wonder why I have had a rash of phone calls and emails on PRB-1 and CC&R's. There are two types of antenna restrictions, local government zoning ordinances and Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&R's). PRB-1 was written to make sure local governments reasonably accommodate Amateur Radio installations. Arizona is doing pretty good with local governments allowing antennas. However, CC&R's are controlled by your home owners association. If you want more info on CC&R's check out the ARRL website at http://www.arrl.org/FandES/field/regulations/local/ccr.html EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS Arizona has a new ARRL website and it can be found at http://www.az-arrl.org On this website we have developed a new secure database for Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) operators. This site has 128 bit Secure Socket Layer (SSL) encryption similar to what the banks have. The secure portion of the site is located at: https://az-arrl.org/secure We put this site together so that in the event of an emergency, we would have more of an idea of the capabilities and equipment of each operator. Even if you have filled out the paper registration, we ask that you take a few minutes and complete the online registration process as it allows your DEC's to have a much more complete picture of your capabilities and will be searchable when needing to fill specific requirements. Registration is a simple process where you create your login in, password and enter an email address. The system then sends an email with a validation link that you must respond to in order to continue the registration process. At that point you can enter your name, address, phone numbers, email and latitude / longitude etc. There is a text box that you can tell the Emergency Coordinators information that might be useful such as "can't stand long periods" or "Committed to County SAR team". We would also like you to enter an emergency contact person and phone number(s) in case of emergency. If you are comfortable with doing so, you can enter acute medical conditions you might have such as diabetes etc. (which is completely optional). We ask for your birthday in case of a medical emergency. You will then proceed to forms for the types of equipment and training you have. When you complete your 3 registration forms, an email will be generated and sent to your county District Emergency Coordinator so that your information can be reviewed and the DEC can get to know you. The data we collect is strictly for the use of Arizona ARES management personnel. We do not permit the dissemination of this data outside Arizona ARES. We are looking for you to complete the form as completely as you are comfortable with. Any member will have access to other's email, but ALL the rest of the data is only visible to ARES management (EC's and above). If you have concerns, email Rick Aldom at natecf@gmail.com and I will answer your concerns as completely as possible. Emergency Coordinators will have tools that will allow them to identify operators that meet certain requirements such as having a dual band mobile or live within 50 miles of downtown Flagstaff. Automated tools will allow us to send out activation notices to hams during times of need as well as to select operators who meet the needs of the host agency. We would ask that all Hams interested in participating in ARES emergency activations and drills to go to this website to create an ARES profile. If at some time your profile changes (you know like when you get the XYL's permission to go to Dayton to buy that new rig) you can then go back to the site and

update your profile. If you are a winter visitor or are planning on leaving Arizona, drop your DEC an email and your data will be deleted or inactivated until you return. Thank you for your willingness to participate in the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES). The Emergency Communications Forum, moderated by David Pifer N9YNF, was attended by about 45 interested individuals. I believe that this forum had the greatest number of attendees. www.ready.gov. The Web Site is to educate and empower Americans to prepare for and respond to emergencies. The campaign encourages individuals to learn how to put together an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan, and be better informed about the types of emergencies that are most likely to occur in their area. Many amateurs who are active ARES members already have a "jump kit" or an "emergency kit" of some kind prepared. If you haven't already done so, perhaps now is an excellent time to put a kit together. In the event of a local, or area emergency, you can then be prepared for what might occur, and be able to help your community instead of being a "victim". At the Jasper County Field Day site, 9 CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) individuals visited the site. I received several messages relating to Field Day this year. These messages sent from your Field Day Site are always good for extra "points" when sending in your Field Day scores. I had one individual who attempted to pass me a FD message. He did not know proper message format, and when I requested that he use the proper format, he said "it's not worth it"..... I don't mean to be hard on another operator, but proper ARRL message format is not difficult, and using it makes certain that when passing formal message traffic, we are all "on the same page". Public Service activities need to be reported on FSD-157 (available from the website), and the completed form is to be sent to the Indiana Section Emergency Coordinator, David Pifer N9YNF (n9ynf@arrl.net). ARES activity is running higher that ever in Indiana. SEC Dave Pifer N9YNF reports 21 active emergency nets, and 17 of them have NTS liaison. Introductions in a new position are sometimes difficult, especially when following talented and capable people (and personal friends) like Rod Lane, Chuck Rexroad and Allen Pitts. So while I am enthusiastic about ARES and its future and look forward to working with all of you, I know these particular SEC shoes are hard to fill. It is fortunate for all of us Rod and Chuck will remain in key roles and will be working with us. ARES makes serious and valuable contributions to the public good. But while performing its role it is important that we have some fun while contributing our time. The most important asset of ARES is you and the time you have devoted toward making it such a great organization. Thank you sincerely for your past support and efforts. I hope that working together we can create the enthusiasm and enlarge our talent pool so ARES can move to an even higher level of operating excellence. To change gears a bit, let me give you some of my background as an initial introduction to those I haven't yet met. I've been active in emergency communications for about 15+ years. All this is just to let you know that the ARRL training (and as one of the contributors to their emergency training courses), and FEMA, DHS. Red Cross, etc. courses, have been paired with some reasonable real-world field experience working directly with valuable served agencies under difficult conditions for extended periods of time. You haven't lived until the situation is chaotic, everything appears totally confused and no equipment or systems work as they are supposed to. In emergencies, you don't always rise to the occasion, but you definitely fall to the level of your training so training is something I support: not as a rigid and enforced arbitrary requirement but as a learning experience and a way to build knowledge and confidence. The more you know, the better off ARES and you will be when things go terribly wrong because, as Katrina vividly demonstrated, things do and can go wrong. I'm obviously a strong supporter of ARRL. On a personal and professional level, following the pursuit of mathematics and physics (and some other things) at Princeton, etc., I've spent most of my time in the global financial and management world, initially as a technology research analyst, technology investment banker and finally as a manager of venture capital, private equity funds and investment banking firms, largely operating in the technology and alternative energy arenas. I've also served as a consultant to a number of government agencies on global technology, organization, and financial policy/operational issues. My wife of 30+ years is a lecturer in medieval art, a classical goldsmith; we have 4 children. The door to my virtual office is open pretty much 24/7 via e-mail (phone if you prefer) and I'd like to invite you to let me know if you have suggestions for improvement, ideas we should explore, etc. I'd like to hear your input. Also for those who are not aware of it, a couple months ago Walter Cooper WA7VGR was appointed DEC for District 6. All districts are staffed with a DEC now. Recent EC appointments include Marsh Johnson KK7CW as Wasco County EC to replace Hugh Flint KF7LN. Also Martin Anderson KC7ILK had been continuing as Columbia County EC since his DEC appointment in District 1. He has found a new EC to take on that responsibility. A simulated loss of communication with Neah Bay resulted in a Clallam County ARES/RACES ham radio operator (Bill, W7WEC) being deployed to Neah Bay via Coast Guard helicopter, Communications were established with emergency radios and messages were passed between Neah Bay and Port Angeles. Communication was also established with Forks, WA (Howard, AC7TZ) and Diamond Point, WA (Dan, N7DWA) simulating additional isolated communities. CCARES Training Manager Paul, W6IAM also participated in the exercise and noted that the professional handling of communications and net control functions on non-amateur radios may be required by our served agencies and will be the subject of cross-training for CCARES members and served agency staff in 2007. On June 6th ARES/RACES members participated with Emergency Management Department staff in the County's Safety Day event, manning the EMD tent and demonstrating Field Day-style setups of HF and VHF equipment. District Emergency Coordinator, Owen Mulkey, NOWO visited our June monthly meeting, answering member's questions and presenting former EC Richard Edes, WA6CUE with a certificate of appreciation for his service to the group. In Kitsap County on June 24th, 24 volunteers provided communications support to the South Kitsap Volunteer Fire Department's Hotfoot 5K Run, making the run safe and successful, and then many headed straight to Field Day sites to start operations. The South Kitsap, Bremerton and North Kitsap clubs each ran successful Field Day operations, enhancing our preparedness for providing emergency communications. It's the second year they've tried this and they think it makes for a more realistic emergency exercise. Many of us have "go-kits" ready to be deployed on short notice. But a couple members of the Lenoir ARC have built "go-carts" -- four wheeled self-contained carts with radios, antennas, batteries, power supplies and an operating table. The Forsyth ARC had a US map on the wall at their site. For each contact, a star was placed on the location of the other station. This gave visitors a good visual indication of the wide range of contacts made by W4NC. Don't think your club is big enough to put on a great Field Day? Brad's resignation was due to accepting a new job, effective the first week in August. This will involve increased travel and training requirements. We wish to thank Brad for his tireless efforts on behalf of emergency communications within the Virginia Section. We want to also wish Brad well in his new position. We will have a new Section Emergency Manager after August 1st. Our new SEC is Herny Wyatt II, K4YCR of Forrest Virginia and the

following is information on Henry and his extensive background. Henry L. Wyatt II, Extra Class, was first licensed as KN4YCR in 1958, having held each class of license except Conditional. He held a Second Class Commercial license before passing the General code test and installed and repaired twoway mobile equipment during high school, when there were "synchronous vibrators, dynamotors and real hot tubes." He is an Eagle Scout, attended the Jamboree at Valley Forge, Philmont, and worked as a camp counselor at Camp Monacan in Nelson County (where Wintergreen is now). He was operating his station at the camp when lightening hit the tree to which his antenna was tied! (End of OSO!) Henry got started in radio with a one-tube Boy Scout Radio Kit (and it didn't work!) His "Elmer" was P.L. "Andy" Anderson, N4AE (then W4MWH, on the ARRL Board of Directors). "After I saw those mercury vapor rectifiers that glowed and danced to the microphone, I was hooked. Andy set me straight on which side of the tube socket was up and the radio worked. Later, he was my examiner for the Technician class." After high school, it was off to Virginia Tech (then it was actually VPI) and three years of electrical engineering before switching to Industrial Arts to become a teacher. The Army ROTC flight training program yielded a private pilot's license and ONE career was started. Commissioned as a 2LT, Signal Corps, starting active service at The Southeastern Signal School, Fort Gordon, GA; flight school at Fort Wolters, TX and Fort Rucker, AL; then off to Fort Knox to train with the 3/17th Air Cavalry and a slow boat ride to VietNam. The 187th Assault Helicopter Company was next where he flew over 800 combat hours in the UH-1 (Huey) serving as Air Mission Commander on many flights. Being the only Signal Corps officer assigned, Crypto Officer's duty was a natural extra. After finishing his active service, then CPT Wyatt, moved to Lynchburg, VA and began his SECOND career as an Industrial Arts and Vocational teacher. Henry remained in the Army Reserves, flying for 14 years and promoted to Major, before becoming a garrison (post) signal officer, where he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel. He retired from the reserves in 1994 with 28 "good years". His highest award was the Purple Heart. Teaching was natural after working with the Boy Scouts and the Army. He taught almost everything from woodworking to computer repair over the next thirty years. He is a member of Epsilon Pi Tau, honorary industrial education fraternity. He also earned a Master's Degree in Industrial Education. He maintained the Army career with one call-up as a Public Affairs Officer during Desert Storm. He has numerous former students with ham licenses. He is a life member of Alpha Phi Omega and The Reserve Officers Association. He retired from the Appomattox County Public Schools in 1998, where he was teaching Electricity/Electronics at the high school. Henry served as the EC of Lynchburg for a number of years and is currently AEC for Bedford County. He has served the community through ARES for floods, ice storms, Y2K, and most recently, Katrina. He is a Volunteer Examiner, teaches classes for new hams, classes in preparedness, especially the "Go-Kit", hospital communications, and helps the "elder hams" install equipment in retirement communities. Let's see. The number is important because it's how we keep track of messages. The precedence is important because it tells us which messages need to be handled first. The handling instructions are very helpful in deliveries. The station of origin lets us trace a message and advise the sender. The check checks, check? It's a check on the number of words in the text to be sure we get it right. The place of origin helps us route a reply, and the time and date tell us when a message started (and how long it's been in the system). The name, address, and telephone number of the addressee are certain necessary for delivery to the right person. The exact text is essential, too; it's the purpose of the message. The recipient will want to know who sent the message - so the signature should be correct as well. Hmmm. In short (as good messages should be), all of a radiogram is important and should be handled error free. We communicate, and we do it well. If we do have a SET, it is my wish that that there will be a minimum of planning at the section level and that most of the details (emergency scenarios, types and numbers of served agencies, etc.) will be determined at the local and district ARES levels. We will have one or more HF section nets (phone, digital, CW) operating during SET to help tie the various local/district groups together, although linked repeaters, Winlink 2000, Echolink/IRLP, etc., should also be used where appropriate by ARES leaders and SET participants. K5GLS (LA SEC) and WA5LQZ (LA ASM) will be contacting our DECs and ECs in the near future about SET. Michigan

BPL is making yet another venture into Michigan. International Broadband Electric Communications, Inc. (IBEC) posted a public notice in July that it intends to apply for loans under the Rural Broadband Access Loan and Loan Guarantee Program administered by the Rural Electric Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. They propose to offer service in the following Michigan counties: Berrien, Cass, Kalamazoo, Lenawee, Monroe, St. Joseph and Van Buren. According to the ARRL Web page for BPL, http://p1k.arrl.org/~ehare/bpl/ex2.html, IBEC is the same company that has installed systems in both Lovingston and Arrington, Virginia. The Arrington system currently has a number of pending unresolved interference complaints against it. There are several BPL systems in service around the US that do not present interference problems for radio amateurs. It will serve us all well for diligence and perseverance as these systems begin implementation. Effective measures for BPL system providers to prevent interference have been demonstrated and can be utilized in these future BPL installations. Careful monitoring of these new systems by local and regional radio clubs will be critical to insure that interference free systems are placed in service in our communities. Our large cadre of amateur radio clubs in Michigan can be an effective voice in insuring that our valuable frequency resource remains unencumbered. Communicating you concerns to your community officials and stressing the importance amateur radio plays in emergencies will help maintain that vigilance. Our July reports from out EC/ROs and NTS officials show the contribution ARES/RACES and the NTS made to the citizens of Michigan during the month of July stands at a total of 8424 operator-hours. The federal government allows us to report volunteer time at the rate \$18.11/hour. Based upon those figures, we radio amateurs have contributed time valued at \$152,561 for July. In many cases, these volunteer hours assist in-kind for financial grant applications for emergency radio equipment. We do report these figures to each of our state Emergency Managers. Details of these reports are on the Michigan ARPSC and NTS web pages. Each EC/RO's report and every OES, ORS and NM report helps the standing of radio amateurs across the state. My personal thanks to those who diligently report monthly, it ALL helps. SET planning – If you are an EC/RO and have not started detailing your local scenario, please get with your DEC and complete the planning process. Remember, our state-wide guidelines call for you to experience a complete failure of your area repeaters as part of the scenario. Alternative communications will be needed following the first hour of your SET. Everyone is encouraged to coordinate planning efforts with their DEC and adjacent county ECs. A major communications outage will likely force us to call upon mutual aid agreements and SET is the time to test them. Michigan seems to have the leap on ARES/RACES training efforts, and many Sections of the U. S. are playing "catch-up". Our thanks for the diligent efforts from everyone in pursuing the challenges our public service "customers" have asked of us for assisting them under the terms of NIMS and ICS requirements. Radio clubs can now submit a "club profile" for publication on the arrl-mi website. Examples can be found at http://arrl-mi.org/? q=node/14. It is named "ARRL RI SECTION" so there's no doubt that we've done this as a service to our ARRL members in Rhode Island. W1EOF's design and support work has entirely been generously donated but unavoidable costs such as domain registration and hosting is paid by my RI ARRL budget and offered as a service to its members. Non members of ARRL and Amateurs from outside RI are most welcome to take part in our forums, news sections, links, downloads, etc. An ARRL membership number will never be required in the registration process. I'd simply like to remind all users that ARRL members through their dues have enabled the website to be

here. For those who decide to join ARRL and share our cost, a prominent ARRL logo on the main page will identify how to access a membership application. You may submit it on-line or if you prefer, a printable application will be available for you to mail. As I said, membership will never be required to join the fun but without ARRL members paying the bill, we wouldn't have this website at all. The forum titled "DXing with Bob" is my little contribution. It is intended as a place for anyone to share DX stories and comments. It is not a pulpit for me to bore you with speeches or fish stories about DX. You don't even have to be a DXer to jump in and post something. The annual local RIFMRS Flea Market and Auction will take place at the Forestdale VFW Post on Saturday, September 16. Flea tables are available from k1kyi@arrl.net. Rain or shine, activity starts as soon as people arrive, usually shortly after 7AM. Coffee, donuts and hot dogs will be sold at reasonable prices. Auction action usually takes place about noon. This is the only fundraiser that the owners of popular repeaters such as 146.76, 146.94, 223.76, 443.850 and 447.425 have to support and repair the repeaters so many of you use. As regular repeater folks know, the Scituate 146.76 repeater had been off the air with antenna problems for some time and only recently reappeared using a temporary antenna. More on this is included in the RIFMRS report below. This repeater group, contrary to popular belief, has never been associated in any way with any club. Quoting excerpts from a larger summary report supplied by Pete, AA1PL, RIFMRS Board member, "After considerable debate and unsuccessful searching for an alternate site, it was decided to stay at the current site, although access to the antennas is still a major problem. We recently hired a bucket truck and temporarily installed a new antenna for 76 at the 60 foot level, much lower than the original height. Although the repeater is back on the air, we realize that the coverage is diminished somewhat. Our immediate plans are to install new antennas and feedlines for both 146.76 and 447.425 at the top of the tower and to have a dual band antenna at the 60 foot level as a backup. This involves hiring a professional tower company and/or a crane service. In addition, we are likely going to be relocating the 146.94and the 223.76 repeaters from Lincoln to Cumberland very soon, which will also involve tower work. We would also like to replace the 146.94 repeater with newer equipment since the existing repeater is quite old. All of these projects are expensive and require lots of time from our volunteers. We deeply appreciate any and all financial support from any who are able to contribute and we thank everyone for their patience. Please don't forget our newest repeater, AA1PL/R on 443.850 (PL 141.3) in Exeter, RI which has great coverage of southern RI, but is also workable from many northern RI and southeastern MA locations. It is linked into the 444.350 W1ACT repeater in Fall River and it will be linked into our 447.425 repeater in Scituate once it returns to service." Thanks to news reporting efforts of Allen Baton, W1AAB, we wish to inform you of the passing of KA1OTO, Martha Whatley of Warwick. Martha was XYL of Mert Whatley, W11T (KA10TP) for forty two years. She became a Silent Key on July 22nd. News was relayed on to ARRL and will appear in QST's Silent Key column. We all wish you our sincere sympathies, Mert. I also wish to report news of the loss of a personal friend and a great friend of CW. A truly golden fist and wonderful gentleman, Jack McElwain, W5SVZ of Dallas, TX passed away on August 8th at the age of 79. He was on his roof, working on a dipole when he was stricken. Most members operated from home and sent messages using form 213-ICS. Voice and packet modes were used on VHF/UHF and voice traffic was passed on HF, 75 meters, 3.983 MHz. Kitsap County ARES started the month by providing service communications to the huge Rotary auction on Bainbridge Island followed by supporting the Kingston 4th of July parade. Near the end of the month, support was also provided to the Tour de Kitsap bicycle tour. The month ended with the EOC-to-EOC drill where they tested a new installation in Hansville and its ability to communicate with various area commands as well as the ability to communicate with Jefferson and Clallam counties. They sadly report that Dr. Stephen Gates, W7SG became a silent key. Steve was 54. District 3 Duane, WB7ROZ reports District 3 held its quarterly meeting in Montesano. The Mason County team had a great time at the Mason County Fair. They sent and received radiograms, had some OSOs with the Special Event Station, and found some bunnies during the bunny hunts. The Thurston County team participated in the Tumwater 4th of July Parade, coordinated the Olympia Lakefair Parade and participated in the statewide EOC drill In District 4, Marc, KD7RYY reports that in Cowlitz County Connie KB7AYY attended the LEPC meeting where she learned about JWARN, a modeling program for tabletop exercises. In preparation for the Cowlitz County Fair, Judi KD7GZR, contacted the National Weather Service in Portland to see if they could provide informational handouts. They sent a package that contained a weather radio, rain gauge and a number of handouts. In Clark County the team leaders and assistants met to discuss the July exercise and plan for the September and October meetings. The July 17th exercise went very well with Teams at the Camas EOC, a Red Cross Shelter, the new Vancouver police East Precinct, the VA, the new Ridgefield/LaCenter Fire station EOC, the Clark County EOC, and the Red Cross Headquarters. Each station sent and received messages via the 440 and 220 repeaters as well as simplex and packet radio. 43 members participated. They participated in the EOC to EOC on July 29th from both the Clark County and Camas EOC's. District 5, Mark, W7BBO reports they supported the Vashon Island Strawberry Festival, FEMA Search Dog Certifications, City of Lakewood Festival, Pierce County Sheriff evidence search, EOC-EOC drill and a Pierce County Sheriff search and rescue mission District 6, Kirk, N7UK reports a monthly meeting with the North Bend team at Valley Camp to have a combined Field Day review. For the EOC drill this month they did a combined Ham/CERT exercise to test the effectiveness of their plans to use FRS radios to facilitate communications between CERT teams and for contacting Hams to relay messages back to Net Control and the EOC. While the exercise went well it was abundantly clear that FRS is definitely lacking in providing the sort of support we were expecting. They are looking into how we might incorporate GMRS radios with their higher power and also doing a more concerted training effort with the CERT teams to get their technician license. July 26, 2006 - Federal legislation - It's time to take a look at how the Nevada congressional delegation has done with respect to bills that involve Amateur radio. Most of the details on the bills themselves and the

actions of the Nevada representatives are available via the "Pending Federal Legislation" button in the NV section website http://nv.arrl.org. The short answer to what they did is, not much. On August 16, 2005, your humble editor wrote all five representatives asking them to identify their position on the bills in question. Sen. Harry Reid was the only one who acknowledged the letter, though he didn't really answer the question. Nearly a year later, the other four have yet to be heard from. It is recommended that all radio Amateurs in Nevada consider these facts. Apparently S-2686 has been ordered to be reported out of committee "with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably." It looks like the Senate committee has reported their own bill out instead of doing anything with HR-5252. If so, and if the Senate passes S-2686, the issue will have to go to a joint committee for resolution. HR-5252 carried Congressional direction to the FCC to measure and carefully consider the interference potential of BPL. Apparently three Senate committee hearings have been held. A quick look at the Senate version of the bill suggests that the direction to the FCC vis-a-vis BPL has been deleted. Note that Nevada Senator Ensign is on the Senate committee that held the hearings. -30-

I feel fortunate to have worked Chuck when he showed up unexpectedly on Bouvet Island as 3YOC in January 2001. I also had the privilege to meet Chuck as featured speaker at the Dayton Hamvention DX Dinner later that year. I am currently looking for a Public Information Coordinator to join the ARRL-SC team! Our previous PIC was Mike Duff KG4SLH, who won the prestigious McGan Silver Antenna Award for excellence in Public Relations and presenting Amateur Radio in a positive light to the media and the public at large. Virginia Section Mangers Report- Covering July of 2006

As I continue to cross the Commonwealth of Virginia, visiting clubs and Hamfest, I am impressed with the quality of leadership I encounter. I also have a deep sense of appreciation for the level of dedication of those that serve. Even with some groups that are small in number, they are not lacking in commitment and service.

One group of about 12 hams in Stafford County joined together and had a decision reversed to impose a \$7,500.00 application fee on the construction of ham towers. They also used the opportunity to enlighten the community about the vital role of Amateur Radio in times of communications crisis. We have PRB-1 in place at the national level and our state has its version of this preemption law. In spite of these laws there continues to be those seeking ways to make the presence of antennas difficult for the Amateur Radio community. We need to maintain our vigilance in order to provide for the emergency needs of our communities and to enjoy the hobby that means so much to all of us.

The hard work of the ARRL and local ham in Manassas Virginia have focused attention and brought results on the issue of BPL. BPL has continued to created interference to the local Amateur Radio community in Manassas. Currently moves have been made to insure that the FCC follows legislative mandates in protecting all radio services from this type of interference problems.

The ARES® registration forms have undergone some major revisions and are intended to capture additional vital information from those that serve. These new online forms are designed to glean contact information, training and courses completed, SET involvement, experience in actual activations, specialized skills, etc. The information submitted on these forms will be passed to DECs and ECs for their home area. In addition to the local records, a copy will be maintained at the Section level.

There is some expressed opposition to a database that is maintained beyond the local level. Reasons offered are sincere but not always valid. One is that "as an EC or DEC, I don't need any help in keeping my records." This reason assumes that Sectional leadership doesn't trust the record keeping ability of local leadership. This is not the case. The reason for record keeping at the Sectional level is to provide mutual support to units large or small in widespread and massive disasters. Even in the largest and most active districts there is not enough Amateur Radio resources to provide for a long-term massive disaster. If an EC or DEC is out-of-service due to the disaster or other circumstances and this person is the only one with the records of local contacts, those coming in from the outside have lost a great resource. We have districts in the Hurricane vulnerable areas of the east coast with thirteen, twelve and five active ARES® members. (These numbers are not counties but districts) In any of these small membership districts, it is possible that all the ARES® appointees may all be out-of-pocket during disaster. It is vital that we have a strong system of mutual support from nearby districts and across the Section to assist one another in times of major events. It is all-important that vital contact information be made available to those coming in to assist.

In recent time an EC became a "silent key" and on his monthly reports he had listed 14 members for his local ARES® unit. At his death, his ARES® records were also lost. A year later ARES® leadership was still trying to find these members. If we would have keep a Sectional dababase this would not have been a problem.

Another reason offered as an objection is the issue of privacy. Most of the information being asked for is a matter of public record. If we know a call sign, we can find the mailing address. If the person doesn't have an unlisted phone we can secure a phone number. Many email addresses can be located online, most of the other items are things that hams frequently discuss or brag about on the air, such as type of equipment or training they have completed such as ICS, NIMS and ARRL Emergency Communications Courses, EC-001, 002, and 003. These forms will not ask you for bank information, Social Security number, Age, weight, etc. In times of disaster we don't have time to research information on those that we might need to contact. A few ECs and some DECs see their unit information as their own personal property and we don't even have the calls of those registered in their unit. All records regardless of the level they are maintained are the property of the ARRL and ARES® if that information has been gather under the umbrella of ARES®.

Others are concerned that the roster might be given to some other communications group. I would hate to be the person to do that and leave myself open to liability for violation of the actions of the ARRL on the ARES® trademark board ruling of July 2004. These rosters do not belong to any of the field/service organization or me but are the property of the ARRL. The only exception to this roster ruling is if an ARES® unit has been registered with their County or City Emergency Management as the local RACES unit. These people wear two hats and switch when required. They can supply a roster to the EM, but they must maintain two rosters, even if the same information is on both rosters. One of these remains the property of the ARRL and ARES®.

We are approaching the peak of the hurricane season, lets do all that we can to prepare and serve. Please register at http://aresva.org/aresva/ares_member_form.html or click on the "Join" button at the top of the Virginia ARES® website http://aresva.org/aresva.html. Even if you filled out the form a couple of months ago, please reregister; the new form has been modified.

Hi Everyone, There is a lot to cover in this allotted 120 lines so I will get right to the points. TRAINING All ARES and NTS members must obtain ARECC Level 1 certification and ICS-100. 2) ICS-200, 700 & 800 will be necessary for those who wish to deploy out of their counties. 3)RACES folks may need ICS-100, 200,700 & 800 if their county desires to be NIMS compliant. This training certification is necessary in order to heighten the state of readiness of Amateur communicators and increase the level of professionalism of Field Volunteers so as to meet more effectively the needs of the served agencies. All training requirements must be met by January 1, 2007 for all ARES members and appointees of record as of 7/22/06. OES, EC, DEC, and HF Net Managers need higher levels of training. Level one ARECC EMCOMM training can be done in a variety of ways: Online with a mentor and completion of exercises (the most in-depth way) or registered classroom setting with Certified Instructor, for \$45. Buy the book,

about \$20, and study it, think about the exercises and do some of them but receive no feedback, then take the exam for \$10. Buy books in a group to save some shipping costs, study the material and complete the exercises in a local classroom or on a local repeater, provide group feedback, then take the exam. Some groups hold a one-day question and exercise session and then offer the exam. Borrow or share a book to study, listen to others discussing the material on local repeaters is another option. Whatever way you choose, it will cost \$10 to take the exam. You will get from the course what you put into it. Everyone reviewing the material and taking the exam will learn something. Currently Okeechobee ARES is conducting EMCOM Level 1 class on the Okeechobee repeater on Monday, Wednesday and Friday 7:00 till....3 to 4 sections per night. ICS-100 will take between 2 and 3 hours of your time. The DHS server is very prompt and even with a 26.4K dial up I completed the course in less than 3 hours. If you have an ARRL appointment remember that you need to report on your activities. ARES appointees and OOs should report monthly, others at least quarterly. When reporting net activities and meetings include only those ARES related if you are an EC or OES. All appointments will expire on 9/30/06 unless I receive an e-mail from you indicating that you wish to continue to serve. ARIZONA SECTION NEWS August 2006 EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS It's been 2 months now since we rolled out the Arizona ARES web based registration system. When I asked Jim Hoff to develop this tool, I had no idea how slick it would be. We now collect information that can be used by EMCOMM planners when asked to respond to an emergency. The information we collect tells planners

what your personal capabilities are, what gear you can bring, what training you have had, and more importantly, how we can contact you. At Williams earlier this month, I had a chance to meet with many folks who had questions about the site, why we ask for so much information, how are we going to use it all. Here is a real life example of how this information could be used. We have an evacuation, and you are dispatched to a point behind a road block. You pull up, the officer explains this is a restricted area; you WILL turn around and go back. He's got the badge, the gun, and at that moment, he's heard it all. You try to explain, but in the end, you can't get past. BUT, it could go like this..... You are dispatched, and in the EOC, a description of your vehicle is given to the Sheriff' officer present. He relays through dispatch to allow the gray 4x4 License Number 123XYZ to pass. You roll up on the check point, tell the officer your assignment, he checks the plate, and you are on your way. As you can see, the tool gives us options to make your response easier. The tool also allows us to develop new and stronger relationships. We can show statistics to emergency planners that may make it easier to get grants. This is a huge step forward. I can't wait!! Arizona is leading the Nation in this effort. We ARE the cutting edge. Thanks to each and everyone of you for your commitment and support. Rick - W7STS ps....if you see Jim Hoff, N7XXX.....shake his hand, he's put a lot of hours into this project. AMATEUR RADIO PLATES Ted Downing W7KEY (AZ State Representative for Tucson) made the big announcement at the State Convention at Williams, the Arizona Ham radio license plates have been approved. John Lanza KC7IM has been working on this for 12 years. John would like to thank the following individuals for there help and assistance: Ted Downing, W7KEY, Ingo Radicke, WA7UM, Past Chairman for ADOT for his contacts in the DMV and Office of Attorney General's office and Doug Pelley, WB7TUJ, for his artistic capabilities in designing out new plate. With out these individuals it would not have come about. Now for the part that everybody has been waiting. The cost of the plate for the time being will be \$25 per year because it will take a legislative action to reduce the cost. This will be taken up in the next session of the new legislators after the November elections. What the new cost will be, I have to be fair and tell you I don't know. Nobody knows this because it has not been addressed to the State legislators. It may be no cost or it may be like the College License plates, except \$8 goes to the State and \$17 goes to ARCA we just don't know at this time. But, rest a sure Mr. Ted Downing, Ingo Radicke and myself have been and are working on it." At 10:00 am, we will hold the ARRL Forum, which is a gathering of National, Division and Section leadership to give you updates on current and future happenings. At 10:45 am, we will host Harold Kramer, WJ1B, the Chief Operating Officer from the ARRL Headquarters as our keynote speaker. Harold will talk about the League's response to Katrina and preparations for future major disasters. At 11:30 am, Doug Lindsey, KB3HER, our SEC will hold a practicum on digital/Winlink operations. From 12:30 pm until 2:00 pm, Bill Neeriemer, W3STG, will hold a session on the NIMS ICS-100 course and from 2:00 pm until 3:30 pm will have a session on NIMS ICS-700. Both of these courses will review the information you will need to be able to go on-line and complete the test to receive the certifications. Most Emergency Management Offices will need their Amateur Radio volunteers to have these certificates by the end of the year. On Sunday, Bill will run the courses from 9:00 am until 10:30 am for ICS-100 and 10:30 am until 12:00 noon for ICS-700. From 12:00 noon until 1:00 pm, Doug will repeat his digital/Winlink practicum. For those who are interested in becoming amateur radio operators or wish to upgrade their licenses, there will also be an amateur radio test session administered by the Laurel Amateur Radio Club VEC on Sunday morning at 9:00 am. Bill Dobson, N3WD will be checking QSL cards for ARRL WAS, ARRL 5BWAS, ARRL VUCC, ARRL DXCC and 3905CCN awards from 9:00 am until 12:00 noon on Saturday and by appointment on Sunday. Proceeds from FARFest support the Foundation for Amateur Radio's Scholarship Program. For more information, look at . CARA Hamfest: On October 1st, the Columbia Amateur Radio Association will host their CARAfest2006, an amateur radio and technology festival, at the Howard County Fairgrounds. Free amateur radio licensing examination testing will also be available. For more information, look at . ECHOLINK, September 15: The Section-wide Echolink net meets at 8 pm every third Friday of the month. Many repeater operators are linking their repeaters to the John Creel, WB3GXW server, (*WASH_DC* node 6154) so that their regular repeater users can check in via RF. Learning to work with an Echolink connection will be good practice for using it in emergency communications. LEGISLATION Amateur Radio legislation will again be introduced in the Maryland General Assembly in January, 2007. The bills will be the same as in 2006. Homeowners associations formed after the effective date will be prohibited from restricting Amateur Radio antennas. Existing HOAs will be prohibited from enacting antenna restrictions after the effective date. Condos and coops are not affected. PRB-1 is incorporated into the Maryland Code by reference. As you know, antenna restrictions over the past 25 years have seriously injured Amateur Radio to the degree that since April 2003, we have lost 30,000 nationwide. For more information, go to the Baltimore Amateur Radio Club Legislative Affairs website, . The House and Senate committees that will conduct hearings on this legislation need to be educated on the issue before the session starts. (We learned after the 2006 session that most of them prefer this.) A half-hour meeting is sufficient, but it must be requested by a constituent. Legislators are much more responsive to constituents than to anyone else. Someone from the MDC State Government Liaison Team will accompany you to handle as much of the presentation as you wish and answer questions. For this project to succeed, we need a constituent from each of the districts represented by a committee member to request the appointment. Mooney, Norman R. Stone, Jr. Here's what to do: (1)Find out who represents you by going to and entering your address. (2) If you're represented by one of the legislators listed above, click on their name to get the phone number, call and ask if they're running for re-election (unless you know). If they are running, request an appointment to discuss "Radio Communications – Regulation of Amateur Radio Equipment – Limitations," SB 75 in the 2006 regular session. That's all there is to it, but it's crucially important. If the legislator's scheduler asks to hold the meeting after the general election, agree, but try to get a specific date and time, or at least a date (soon) when you can get a date and time. If the scheduler tells you that someone else is already scheduled on that topic, ask who it is, "so we can visit your office together." Then, coordinate with the other amateur; you might offer to serve as backup. Either way, notify Dave Prestel, the MDC SGL, via as soon as you complete this call to ensure that someone will be available to accompany you. Dave can provide copies of the entire presentation and guidance on how to handle it. A few committee members may lose their elections. The MDC SGL Team will monitor the situation, identify the replacements, and repeat the process described above, on a much smaller scale. Two things NOT to do: Do not discuss the election or any topic other than the Amateur Radio bills. (See "It Seems to Us," in August OST for the rationale.) Don't wait until after the election to initiate contact with your legislators. There is less than three weeks between the election and Thanksgiving, an extremely busy time for most politicians. They're more interested in your opinions before the election. Being early is more prudent. Experienced legislators have told us two things, emphatically: We have a strong case; and success in the 2007 session depends on educating each individual committee member before the session starts. The success of this vital legislation is up to you. FINAL THOUGHTS: Please remember to check my Section Manager's web page often. The URL is . - What does the SET have to do with the NTS? Oh, you mean, how's the annual Simulated Emergency Test connected to the National Traffic System. That's easy. The SET weekend, this year October 7 –8, will test the capabilities of our emergency-ready equipment, our emergency-ready networks, and our emergency-ready traffic handlers. As our state plan documents, we will establish at least two statewide traffic nets - the Wisconsin ARES/RACES Net (Net Manager: N9VAO) and a special session of the Badger Emergency Net (Net Manager: KE9VU). Local ARES nets will have a liaison station to at least one of these section nets and will convey traffic to and from them. The regular NTS routing will be in place from the BEN to WIN, Ninth Region (maybe there'll be a daytime session), Central Area, etc. So what should we do about it? Send traffic! Prepare messages before the event with test precedences (testroutine, test-priority, test-welfare) for destinations throughout the state. EC's should send messages with specific data (See your 2006 EC Report form) to the DECs and others. Send some to other ECs in the state, too. Request support from neighboring counties. All participants should send at least a few messages. Start the text of each message with the words, "TEST MESSAGE." This year's test will concern a simulated bioterrorism event. Messages from served agencies would be great. Messages describing implementation of activation plans would be in order, too. So would messages about activations that aren't functioning smoothly. We are trying to exercise the traffic system to see what works well and what needs work. Without plenty of traffic, we won't know. I'll be there on October 7. LOUISIANA SECTION NEWS – AUGUST 2006 Amateur radio operators from around the state participated in a "mass casualty" exercise on August 3. The drill originated at Bayne-Jones Army Community Hospital (BJACH) at Fort Polk. WA5LQZ reports that Fort Polk officials were quite impressed with the capabilities of amateur radio and showed particular interest in the Winlink 2000 email system. Hams in Baton Rouge established a temporary emergency communications center at the Baton Rouge General Medical Center Mid City (BRGMC) with simultaneous VHF phone, UHF phone, and VHF APRS capability. N5KIP reports that the drill was a great learning experience and successfully demonstrated to hospital management the potential value of amateur radio in the event of a

communications emergency. Among the hams participating in this event were WB5JZP, WB5JZQ, N5NVP, KE5DJA, WA5LQZ, KD5KNZ, K5EOA, N5KIP, N5IB, WD5CMA, N5EPI, K5GWR, N5KXF, KE5ICJ, and N5ULA. Entergy will have a Broadband over Power Line (BPL) "demo" in Baton Rouge starting around October 1. Fortunately, Entergy has been discussing this situation with club officers in the Baton Rouge ARC for several weeks and promises to maintain a dialogue with the hams as things develop further. In addition, Entergy is planning to hire an independent firm to make measurements both before and after the BPL activation. Hams from the BRARC are also planning to gather field data to share with Entergy officials. Based on my conversations with two Entergy engineers, I am cautiously optimistic that no long-term harmful interference will be generated by BPL anywhere on Entergy's system. To check on BPL in your local area, type in your zip code (such as 70809) at http://www.bpldatabase.org/ The LA Section Simulated Emergency Test (SET) will be Saturday, October 28, between approximately 8 and 11 am. Detailed scenarios are now being developed by our DECs and ECs. Depending upon propagation, the LA ARES Emergency Net will be on 3873 or 7285 kHz to handle test priority/test emergency written and tactical traffic. The NTS Fifth Region Net on 7280 kHz will provide an outlet for any test welfare/routine written traffic, plus we will try to have one or more NTS liaison stations available on the emergency net frequency to assist with such traffic. For non-voice traffic, PACTOR stations should monitor 3630.0/7080.0 kHz mark (center frequencies 3629.9/7079.9) at 15 and 45 minutes past the hour; CW stations should monitor 3711/7111 kHz on the hour and 30 minutes past the hour. If you would like a copy via email of the 2006 SET guidelines prepared by K5GLS, please let me know. College bound hams are encouraged to apply for the LA Memorial Scholarship, which is administered by the ARRL Foundation. President Bush made a stop at Flint's Bishop airport to personally make the presentation to Greg on September 8th. Grace Ranger, Emergency Manager for Genesee County nominated Greg for the award, "...to not only recognize Greg for all the hard work he does, but also for all of our amateur radio operators. They are very much unsung

heroes". We met some more success in the halls of Lansing during the past three weeks. ARRL Member Tony, N8VR called to our attention that amateur radio's reputation was miscast on a web page hosted by the Michigan Public Service Commission. Your SM agreed, and a letter was sent to the MPSC Chairman expressing our concerns. I was extremely careful to not be accusatory or inflammatory, but to factually present our concerns and offer possible solutions. I was pleased to receive a reply that agreed with those conclusions. A portion of that text follows: "...We appreciate your bringing these concerns to our attention. The Commission prides itself on presenting what is often highly technical information in a simple and informative manner. We agree that this material should be replaced with language that has less emphasis on legal remedies and more clearly acknowledges the primary roll the Federal Communications Commission has in addressing these types of concerns, as well as informal solutions available at the local level...". I expect those corrections will take a few weeks to get posted, but I have offered the League's assistance in preparing a more suitable text. Further, recognition of the worth and value of the communications we can provide is being actively encouraged within the Michigan Homeland Security/Emergency Management Division. The "reason" for the failure is immaterial can be determined by local option, the real "need" is to deal with alternate options and maintain communications. For another year the ARRL is a national coalition member of the National Preparedness Month program sponsored by the government's Ready Campaign held each September. The program, a national public service advertising campaign, was started in 2003 to educate and empower Americans to prepare for, and respond to, emergencies. The web site at www.ready.gov/ contains information on emergency preparedness for not only homeowners but senior citizens and those with special needs. And, September 16th has been designated as Amateur Radio Public Awareness Day to draw attention to the emergency communications capabilities the amateur radio service possesses. We all know that emergencies can occur at any time and that we all need to be prepared should such a situation occur. Amateur radio has been recognized by many organizations and agencies for its response to disasters. Yet, we still have some local agencies that have not realized that we are trained volunteers who can help. The Ready Campaign is another tool to make those agencies aware that we are there to help. Please remember that we can only offer our services when asked, hopefully we will be. Also, continue to take advantage of the ARRL Emcomm courses and those offered by FEMA and the Red Cross. The phase "Trained Volunteer" is taking on a more important meaning. For the second year in a row the New Jersey State OEM is taking part in the Annual ARRL SET which will be held on October 7th and be statewide. They are bringing in other agencies that support OEM functions to test their communication response. Although the RACES program is part of the State OEM SEC K2SO and I encourage our ARES members to help where and when needed. I know the process works as I used the ARRL VEC to renew two club licenses I'm trustee for as well as my own vanity call. By the way, the new fee for renewing vanity calls is \$20.80. If you have a vanity call issued in 1996 like mine but sure to renew early in the 90 day period as the FCC expects a large volume from those of us who took part in the initial 1996 grant process. Chris Campbell, W2JCC reminded me that those NJ hams applying for amateur radio license plates can only get them for motor vehicles as the MVC does not issue plates for motorcycles and has no intention to for the near future. Just a reminder, application in formation and hints for getting your amateur radio license plate is on the NNJ website.

So mark your calendars and be sure to watch!—K1SFA PIC Connecticut now has some new digital communication capabilities, through the work of Dana - KB1AEV, Paul - N1TUP, Rod - N1FNE, and Chuck, AB1CR and with the support of Bruce - N1XG and the PVRA. We now have a Winlink 2000 hub for Connecticut. What does this mean? It means that we now have the capability to use Winlink communications between stations in Connecticut, even during an Internet failure. It also puts us on a course to connect our hub with others, via RF, so that Internet failure does not reduce our capabilities. Our served agencies are repeatedly telling us that they need digital communications, so we need to practice with these new technologies whenever we can. K1EIC used Winlink 2000 to e-mail me the other day when her Internet Service Provider had failed. This is an excellent way to stay up to speed on using the system (but you don't have to wait for a real Internet failure!) Through the existing FBB/Flexnet packet system and the new Winlink 2000 packet capabilities, we are now able to provide this communications from most locations in the state of Connecticut. The Packet Quick Start guide at http://www.ctares.org will guide you through the use of the existing packet system. Information on using Winlink 2000 can be found at http://www.winlink.org. The free airmail software package is the quickest and easiest way to get into the Winlink 2000 system. To connect you need to access a TelPac node (Telnet to packet gateway) which serves as a gateway between your station and the Winlink 2000 hub. Call signs and frequencies of current TelPac nodes are listed below. The AB1CR-10 TelPac node covers much of the state, so please try it if there is not a local TelPac node. Thanks to Bruce - N1XG and the PVRA, the Connecticut Winlink 2000 hub (also known as a PMBO) is located in a hardened facility with battery backup and automatic generator support, about 10 miles east of Hartford. There is sufficient fuel to run quite a few days without resupply and due to the nature of the commercial 2-way equipment there, the site is high on the list for fuel re-supply. I look forward to working with you Dave! 2006 SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST The ARRL Simulated Emergency Test is a nationwide exercise in emergency communications, administered by the ARRL field organization. The SET weekend gives communicators the opportunity to focus on the emergencycommunications capability within your community while interacting with NTS nets. This year's North Carolina Section SET will be held on October 28 from 8am to 12noon. The test scenario will be announced later by our Section Emergency Coordinator, Bernie Nobles, WA4MOK. Your local area may choose to hold an SET anytime during the fall season, just make sure your report reaches ARRL headquarters by January 31, 2007. WITHER PUBLIC SERVICE? During a bike ride a few weeks ago I talked with an MS Society volunteer who asked why ham radio was needed on the route when Nextel coverage was so good. The question got me thinking about my younger days when spring and summer weekends were booked solid with walk-a-thons, bike rides and other special events. Today, our local club works only a handful of public service events each year. It's the inevitable result of the proliferation of cell phones. Served agencies just don't need us as much anymore. Considering that there are fewer of us around to work these events, it's probably a good thing. Small events in urban areas can be managed quite well with cell phones and none of us want to show up for an event and have nothing to do. But there are still many events when our services are valuable and a few where hams are so critical that the event couldn't safely proceed without us. How do we best match our capability to the agency's needs? Here are some of my thoughts on our unique capabilities: Coverage: Commercial carriers can't afford to build out cellular coverage in sparsely populated areas. Remember the MS volunteer with his Nextel? He missed numerous calls that weekend when his Nextel coverage WASN'T "so good". Ham radio provides coverage everywhere, and during a disaster we can do it without any fixed infrastructure. Dispatch Radio: I work for an electric utility and whenever there's a major outage the first step in our recovery plans is to open a telephone conference bridge. We then appoint a moderator who manages the agenda. Having key personnel gathered in a virtual "meeting" allows everyone to hear the same information at the same time and the moderator makes sure the meeting proceeds in an orderly fashion.

Sounds like a ham radio net doesn't it? The point-to-point nature of most cell phone calls makes it difficult for an event director to use cell phones to get an overall picture of how the event is progressing. And when that director is talking a call on their cell phone from one person, they miss calls from others. The chaos is manageable for a small walk-a-thon, but not when you've got 2,000 cyclists and 1,000 volunteers spread over 100 miles of Carolina countryside. Public safety agencies, power companies and other critical infrastructure entities still rely on 2-way dispatch radio systems as the primary communications method for their critical functions. Our served agencies can't afford to provide these networks for themselves, so they rely on ham radio. Technology: Ham radio can offer a served agency not just voice dispatch radio, but also vehicle location services (APRS), mobile data services (Packet Radio), and amateur television. We can also provide telephone interconnect (phone patch) in places where cellular networks don't have coverage. "....to provide a pool of trained radio operators.": These words describe on of the purposes of Amateur Radio in the Communications Act of 1934. When a served agency asks for assistance from amateur radio, they get not only our technology but also US. Solving challenging communications problems is what we're all about. In our role as dedicated communicators, we aren't as likely to miss key information shared on the net because we were busy doing other things. We're more likely to convey accurate information over the radio because of our experience and training. Served agencies also get a group of experienced, disciplined volunteers who know how to work together as team and can even provide other services related to their communications role. Several hams in our club are also Emergency Medical Technicians. We can drive supply trucks and poop-out vehicles. We can help staff a rest stop. Sometimes we can help make decisions about the event because we've been monitoring the net and know more about what's going on than the directors. So what do we get out of it?: The FCC allows us to use vast portions of the radio spectrum and it's mostly because of our ability to provide service to the public in times of need or distress. Public service events help justify our existence with the FCC and other government entities. These events promote our image and visibility with the public. They serve as a great training exercise for the next disaster. Public service events are also a lot of fun! Contact your local club for the events in your area. Section Managers Report for August 2006 As Section Manger, I was busy in the early days of August visiting radio club meetings and hamfest. I attended the Roanoke Hamfest on August 5th and participated in a forum along with other cabinet members. On August 11th I was the guest of the Lynchburg ARC followed by meeting with the OCWA on August 12th. In late August the Section begin to brace for the impact of tropical storm Ernesto. Early forecast models had the storm passing through the eastern section of the state with the center of circulation projected to pass near the state capital of Richmond Virginia. All Amateur Radio interest in the projected storm path began early to prepare and those in areas outside the corridor of impact did some rechecking of their "Go Kits". Hams in central and western Virginia also began to think in terms of ARESMAT assistance if required. Some of the specific preparations and responses to this heavy rainmaker is as follows: Hampton-Earlier in the month they conducted their first ever shelter drill where Hampton opened all three hurricane shelters. Amateur Radio had an outstanding turnout with 10 people responding. Emergency Management was extremely pleased that we had such a turn out in the middle of the business day. They also installed (2m/70CM) in the Buckroe Fire Station for CERT use. Newport News: Amateurs made preparations for the arrival of tropical storm Ernesto. The storm impacted the area on September 1st so details will follow in the September reports. The ARES unit had a meeting with the Newport News Sheriff's Department to discuss the role of Amateur Radio operators in support of the Project Lifesaver, a program which used radio direction finding equipment to locate missing Alzheimer's patients. Gloucester/Mathews Counties-A/EC and RACES RO Joe, K4JJS attended a meeting at Gloucester County Social Services to discuss shelter activations and policies. The county envisions enhancing the five shelter teams with CERTS members and Amateur Radio operators. The county is planning to sponsor an Technician licensing class in late October or early November with Joe, K4JJS as primary instructor. This is being done to help bolster the ranks of available operators to support the county EMCOMM requirements. Joe Safranek, K4JJS also attended a shelter walk-through meeting prior to the arrival of TS Ernesto. Representatives from emergency management, school system maintenance, Red Cross, sheriff's department, social services etc. toured the three primary shelters and were briefed on the results of a recently conducted emergency power survey. Amateur Radio was given assigned space in the shelter with access to emergency power. Skywarn nets throughout the Virginia Section were placed in the standby mode prior to the arrival of TS Ernesto. The storm didn't arrive until September so the response to the heavy rainfall, evacuations, high winds, flooding and power outages will be reported next month. The After Action Reports from the impact area showed an ARES system that was willing, ready and able to meet the emergency communications requirements for this event. A number of ARES members from District 14 participated in a Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP) on Tuesday August 15th. This was an exercise that was designed to simulate a catastrophic regional incident. This training involved emergency management, the Carroll County Board of Supervisors, rescue, fire, police, FEMA, SAR, Red Cross, Twin County Regional Hospital, ARES/RACES etc. October 7th and 8th is the days designated for the nationwide Simulated Emergency Test (SET). Why not share your feelings about Eddy with his family? I think it would mean a lot to them. Since we can't all make it to the funeral parlor, this offers a way for you to pay your respects. Many thanks to GREG TILLMAN, N4VAD, for helping me with this mid-monthly summary. His message, regarding an important exercise which will be taking place here in GA on the 20th, follows: Greetings Everyone, The 165th Air National Guard Medical Unit of Savannah, Ga. has asked that Amateur Radio be incorporated to their drill September 20th, 2006. The main drill is scheduled for 72 hours, however they only asked for us to be there September 20th to demonstrate our abilities to upper echelon levels of the Government that day. The Drill will start around 0700 hours eastern local time. The drill is scheduled to last until approx. 1900 hrs local eastern time but we may be called to stand down prior to that. The Drill will incorporate having simulated moulaged patients that will be triaged, treated and transported by aircraft via C-130 from the disaster site. Without giving alot of the scenerio away there will be many mulitple emergencies taking place from Savannah. There will be no power, no cell phones, no internet from Savannah outward to three or four counties depending how big the scenerio gets. These emergencies will cover a vast scale of possibilites to come. So please join in we will need you. There will be a net called by Charles K4GK on 3.975 LSB and band conditions permitting 7.275 LSB. Both frequencies are used by Ga. ARES during an emergency. Even though conditions may not be good we still need to check our communications capabilities there as well. Check ins will be taken on the top of each hour as needed time permitting upon the amount of messages to be passed. EC's of each county can assign someone to call a local area net on VHF and have the number of check in's relayed via winlink or ssb to the Net Control Station. I can not stress enough the importance it is for all amateur class levels of operators to participate. No one is left out. We have been asked to pass various types of messages and traffic out of the disaster area being Savannah, Ga. area to Tift Co. ARES that will be at Henry Tift Airport in Tifton, Ga. and to Cobb Co. ARES for messages to get to Dobbins Airbase Joint Operations Center. Winlink will also be a part of this exercise. Anyone wishing to participate in the drill via winlink can send a message to n4pjr@winlink.org These checkins will be added to the count for this drill. If you do check in via winlink please indicate your location at home or work and your source of transmissions ie; internet or vhf packet into telpac or pactor to pmbo etc. I would like to encourage and invite anyone from their home, mobiles, EOC's to check into the net. This is a great opportunity for Ga. ARES to demonstrate our abilities to get the messages thru and continue our readiness if a true event occurred. Thanks to Greg Gross K4GR of Alabama Emergency Net Manager for their offer and willingness to be a participate in this drill as well. We Welcome Alabama and other out of state amateurs to the table in preparation for a large scale disaster. We are in need of all that are experienced or not to be apart of this drill as well. If conditions are not favorable in state then we would naturally turn to out of state stations that are very valuable during this type of emergency for relay

purposes. This is why the ARRL is called the Amateur Radio Relay League. Thru experience and drills is how we become effective in working together no matter who gets the credit. The list of is too long to mention and I don't want to leave anyone out. From DEC'S, EC'S, All ARES Members in and out of state, ARES-MAT Team, Public Health, EMA Directors and the Georgia Air National Guard. Hello Everyone, So far the tropics have been kind but we still have a few weeks of peak season to work through. Stay alert and if you are able, make your time and knowledge available to your local ARES group. Please contact your local ARES EC and participate in the ARRL SET (Simulated Emergency Test) scheduled for the weekend of 9/30 - 10/1 in this section. NIMS, FEMA, ARES, NTS, PSHR, ARRL, HSA, NFL, ARC – Alphabet Soup. When I entered the phrase of alphabet soup into Google I had over 5 million hits. Wikipedia states the term is used to describe an abundance of abbreviations or acronyms that goes back at least as far as Franklin D. Roosevelt's alphabet agencies of the New Deal. In the United States one of the most common targets of the term is the Federal Government because of the multitude of agencies, including the NSA, CIA, FBI, USSS, BATF, DEA and INS. The many sanctioning bodies of boxing - WBA, WBO, IBF, WBC, IBA, etc. are often referred to disparagingly as alphabet soup organizations. We can't escape it anywhere and it seems to be increasing. My use of the alphabet soup is not meant to confuse, only to abbreviate or to use common terms. TRAINING All ARES and NTS members must obtain ARECC Level 1 certification and ICS-100. 2) ICS-200, 700 & 800 will be necessary for those who wish to deploy out of their counties. 3) RACES personnel may need ICS-100, 200,700 & 800 if their county desires to be NIMS compliant. This training certification is necessary in order to heighten the state of readiness of Amateur communicators and increase the level of professionalism of Field Volunteers so as to meet more effectively the needs of the served agencies. All training requirements must be met by January 1, 2007 for all ARES members and appointees of record as of 7/22/06. Those joining ARES after 7/22/06 will have six (6) months to complete the training. OES, EC, DEC, and HF Net Managers need higher levels of training. This focus on training is not something new nor is it unique to the SFL section. In July of 2002, (before Frances, Jeanne, Wilma and Katrina) it was discussed at length in the ARRL Board of Directors meeting. The ARRL Volunteer Resources Committee, appointed by the ARRL president, had the following comments in their reports of July 2002

professionalism than we do at present. Amateur Radio must earn and maintain increased credibility with served agencies, both nationally and at the local level. The existing ARRL certification programs can help in this regard. Additionally, excellent training is available through FEMA, the Red Cross, and other served agencies. Such courses aren't designed for exclusive Amateur Radio audiences, but present an opportunity for ARES/NTS volunteers to expand their emergency preparedness horizons. Amateur Radio emergency communications volunteers must be more actively involved in a variety of training experiences throughout the year. Amateur Radio should exhibit a higher level of readiness than is presently the case. This may be accomplished, at least in part, by encouraging SMs, in collaboration with their SECs and STMs, to study, on a continuing basis, the training needs of their Sections and the effectiveness of training programs in place. Amateur Radio should exhibit a higher level of professionalism than is presently the case. This may be satisfied, at least in part, by adhering to the following program: * SECs and STMs earn Level 1, 2, and 3 certification as soon as possible * DECs and NMs earn at least Level 1 and 2 certification as soon as possible * ECs and OES appointees earn at least Level 1 certification as soon as possible * SECs and STMs strongly encourage all ARES and NTS members to earn Level 1 certification in order to prepare them for possible future disasters and in order to prepare them to become future leadership officials. Homeland Security states the following: All first responders, all federal, state, territorial, tribal, private sector and non-governmental personnel at the entry, first line supervisor, middle management, general staff and command level of emergency management operations must complete Incident Command System—100 level training. NIMS compliance is a prerequisite to obtaining any federal preparedness assistance (defined by Secretary Ridge as "grants or contracts that contribute to building preparedness and response capabilities"). If your group or your local served agency is applying for grants they will be asking the ARES EC and the RACES officer about our training as responders. IMPORTANT – Please pass this information to all appointees who do not, but should, receive these e-mails. If you have an ARRL appointment remember that you need to report on your activities. ARES appointees and OOs should report monthly, others at least quarterly. When reporting net activities and meetings include only those ARES related if you are an EC or OES. All appointments will expire on 9/30/06 unless I receive an e-mail from you indicating that you wish to continue to serve. I have signed up for another 2-year term beginning 10/01/06 and I am asking appointees to do the same. People continue to be drawn to the site. I am energized by the response we have had to the site in just the short time it's been live. I do need to say, we need more hams in the system. When I look at the summary tools available to me, I see we have 100 hams signed up in Maricopa County. When you consider there are more than 60 entities which would like to be served by Amateur Radio, we just flatly don't have enough registered hams to fill the needs we have. And, if I only consider the needs of Maricopa County Emergency Management, we need probably 200 more than we have registered in the event of a MAJOR disaster. To meet the needs of all the agencies we probably need somewhere around 500 hams just in Maricopa County. From the WSBN, the WIN (Wisconsin Intrastate Net) rep would take the traffic to WIN where a Ninth Region rep would take the message to 9RN. From 9RN, the message would go to the Central Area Net (CAN) and from there to the Eastern Area Net (EAN) and then to the appropriate MA section net. If a message for Green Bay starts in California, it will be routed from PAN to CAN to 9RN. A 9RN rep will bring it to Late WIN. If it can't be handled to the destination on WIN/L, it should be taken by an SSB rep to the BWN or BEN. If it can't be passed there, it should be taken to the next section net, the WSBN. From the WSBN, to the WNN, WSSN, and WIN/E. This way, as many potential handlers as possible hear the listing. So what's the connection? See it? It's the liaison stations. LOUISIANA SECTION NEWS – SEPTEMBER 2006 The FCC released its long-awaited Report and Order in the so-called "omnibus" Amateur Radio proceeding, WT Docket 04-140, a few days before I prepared this monthly report. According to the ARRL, the FCC adopted nearly all of the changes it had put forth in its 2004 Notice of Proposed Rulemaking in the proceeding. This R&O does not include

action on the FCC's proposal to eliminate the Morse code exam for all license classes. An R&O in that proceeding, WT Docket 05-235, is pending. The League is requesting members' input concerning the FCC's Report and Order on WT Docket 04-140 via email by October 31. Among its various provisions, the R&O significantly expands the phone subbands on 80 meters. The complete text is available as a PDF file on the FCC Web site and a summary is available on the League Web site. The ARRL is specifically seeking member guidance on how the changes will affect current operating activities on 80, 40, and 15 meters. The band charts at http://www.arrl.org/announce/regulatory/wt04-140/faq.html are very handy in understanding the frequency and mode privileges by license class that will become effective 30 days after the R&O is published in the Federal Register. As mentioned in last month's report, the LA Section Simulated Emergency Test (SET) will be Saturday, October 28, between approximately 8 and 11 am. Depending upon propagation, the LA ARES Emergency Net will be on 3873 or 7285 kHz to handle test priority/test emergency written and tactical traffic. The NTS Fifth Region Net on 7280 kHz will provide an outlet for any test welfare/routine written traffic, plus we will try to have one or more NTS liaison stations available on the emergency net frequency to assist with such traffic. For non-voice traffic, PACTOR stations should monitor 3630.0/7080.0 kHz mark (center frequencies 3629.9/7079.9) at 15 and 45 minutes past the hour; CW stations should monitor 3711/7111 kHz on the hour and 30 minutes past the hour. Sample test messages for SET and other drills are included in the latest LA Section Net Newsletter at http://www.laarrl.org/netnews.html Please encourage college-bound hams in your local club to apply for the LA Memorial Scholarship, which is administered by the ARRL Foundation. Mentoring is absolutely critical to newcomers and it is incumbent upon each of us to see that every radio amateur who is newly licensed has someone to personally assist them in getting on the air. Let us all pitch in to insure a bright future in ham radio for all newcomers. The Simulated Emergency Test is now behind us and reports are being complied by our Emergency Coordinators and Net Managers. The initial comments have included favorable remarks about the statewide scenario requirement to "fail all repeaters" for a 4 hour window. This put the onus upon everyone to use alternate modes for local as well as regional communications. I appreciate the effort everyone put into this exercise and it clearly shows the desire of all involved to continually improve the quality of the communications services we provide to our served agencies. Our SEC Marty N8MG will be getting reminders to all DECs and ECs regarding the early completion of SET activity reports, and ECs should not overlook reporting their net activity for the SET. Again, thank you all. The release by the FCC of WT-Docket 04-140 - the so-called "Omnibus" rule changes affecting the Amateur Radio Service bears some serious review by all radio amateurs. While there appears to be some minor text conflicts, the overall impact of the changes may significantly affect some familiar net frequencies as well as other operating situations. Please take the time to review the docket and as ARRL Director Jim Weaver K8JE has suggested, forward your comments by email to bandplan@www.arrl.org . All e-mails will be read and considered, but individual responses will not be possible due to the message volume expected. The deadline for your comments to be submitted is October 31. I am pleased to report to you that our Section's NIMS compliance efforts are working effectively and the results are outstanding. Most all RACES key staffers have now met those training commitments outlined in Homeland Secretary Tom Ridge's letter to all state governors from September 8, 2004. ARES personnel have been working diligently to assist in meeting the training requirements needed for RACES authorization as well. WE all can certainly be pleased that Michigan ARES/RACES members have been diligent in meeting those commitments. Does your local net report its activities? 

Please take the time to read the news story and submit any comments you may have as this Docket will do much to change band plans and types of modes allowed within them. The Report and Order becomes effective 30 days after publication in the Federal Register. However, a publication date has yet to be set. The ARRL is specifically seeking member guidance on how the changes will affect current operating activities on 80, 40 and 15 meters (see the current ARRL band plans, http://www.arrl.org/FandES/field/regulations/bandplan.html, and an ARRL FAQ, http://www.arrl.org/announce/regulatory/wt04-140/faq.html, which includes a chart showing the band changes). Comments may be submitted by e-mail to bandplan@www.arrl.org. All emails will be read and considered, but individual responses will not be possible due to the message volume expected. The deadline for comments is October 31. NNNN If you have not read the summary, it is IMPERATIVE that you read it and make comment if you feel the need. Because of the impact this R&O will have on public service and digital communications, I know I will be commenting. And speaking of public service, ARES members and others interested, don't forget CT's annual Simulated Emergency Test takes place this year on October 28. SEC Brian, K1BRF has appointed a very capable committee who has been working for hours planning this event so that our experience is a worthwhile and real learning experience. As in the past, a serious effort is being planned so watch for details from your ARES leadership. Please participate! You do not have to be experienced; you just need to be willing to learn and grow in your knowledge of radio communications as it relates to public service. Oscar Fuller/ KB1LQV made a presentation at the Greater Norwalk ARC covering his volunteer work during the aftermath of hurricane Katrina. Oscar was one of six Amateur operators from Connecticut who drove to the disaster area and operated radio nets, providing the only communications available to assist survivors and responders. Oscar urged more hams to prepare themselves for possible duty in future crises by taking levels 1 and 2 of the AREC program. Bill W1WJB and John W1JMA are teaching a technician licensing class to police, and fire department personnel at the Ridgefield Fire Training Center this month and throughout November. Bill has indicated that "This course is especially adapted to concentrate on Ham Radio's practical uses for personal communications, and for assisting In emergency communications. This course has been designed to be very PRACTICAL . . . "Bill also coordinated a ham radio demo at the Ridgefield Fire Dept at their annual open house last week. R-Com, the Ridgefield ARES Communications Group will be a part of the new FEMA-DHS sponsored "Fire Corps" organization, an innovative program of harvesting citizen interest in assisting local fire departments in various ways---such as ham radio communications. Amateurs were invited to participate by talking to the group which included children of all ages. The demo was a resounding success! Bill reports: "We have 19 at this point. Mostly Fire Police, with one PhD professor from WestConn, a hospital equipment technical expert from St Vincents, and a retired airline 747 captain. In all cases their primary interest is in emergency communications. Great work Bill—we need more demos like this!— K1EIC Toy, K1WYQ, GNARC president writes the following which should be of interest: I guess I have earned bragging rights for being the first Ham Radio Operator in the nation that was fortunate to be included in the first ever Communication Leader's (COML) course sponsored by the Dept of Homeland Security at the Fairfield Fire Training School from September 25 th – 29 th. This course is to be modified and subsequently taught throughout the country. The course was dynamic and loaded with good stuff that was drawn from the National Wildfire Program that was adapted for Homeland Security. We even had the venerable Tim Walker/ W1GIG who gave an excellent talk on radio spectrum and included a video from the ARRL that was narrated by Walter Cronkite. The attendees for this course were mostly law enforcement and fire officers along with dispatch personnel. The course highlighted past problems with interagency communication and what is presently being done to overcome this problem. Some expensive communication equipment was effectively demonstrated by the military and a neighboring law enforcement agency. The emphasis was on interoperability. All along the program the course instructors mentioned the existence of ham operators and how we are useful communications

personnel. GNARC had as their guest Speaker Richard L Fournier, Area 1 Coordinator for the State of Connecticut Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security Emergency Planning & Preparedness Division. I will be writing Mr. Fournier a letter of thanks.

Rhode Island

Greetings Fellow Rhode Islanders: It was nice to see such a nice turn out at the annual '76 Auction and Flea Market. I apologize for not being able to stay longer than I did but I know it was a fun time for all and very necessary to support RIFMRS. More on RIFMRS later in this report. The annual Simulated Emergency Test, better known as SET took place on Saturday, October 7 from 9AM until early afternoon. Our Section Emergency Coordinator, KE1AB provided this report: Working with RI EMA the SET scenario was a category 3 hurricane striking the southwest corner of RI, named Hurricane Veronica. In keeping with several side "Archie comic" remarks we referred to it throughout the SET as Operation Jughead in keeping with the comic book characters. The SET required all stations to be on 100% emergency power. This year, RI ARES through RI EMA, requested the participation of local community EOCs to participate with their ham radio stations and approximately 12 RI EOCs checked in plus two in CT and one in MA. Rob Macedo, KD1CY represented Eastern MA SEC and NWS Taunton. RI SATERN with their EOC and Providence EMA and RI SKYWARN all participated. Bringing all these different EMComm groups and local EOCs into the annual SET was something that has not been done before in RI in a very long time and we are very grateful to them for their participation. The drill consisted of the usual problems associated with a hurricane, and changes in the drill were incorporated by the addition of nine surprise Situation Injects and roll playing by several EOCs and participants. This made for some very interesting problems for the NCS operator and RI EMA with a single operator. With the dropping of the primary repeater station to simulate loss of the station, the ability of EOC and operators to respond to NCS was diminished, and greatly taxed the equipment being utilized. It added interest and accurately simulated the problems that take place in a real emergency. Overall, the experiences and understanding of the problems participants have expressed in their reports to the SEC have been tremendous. The SET After Action Report will be finished shortly and will be reviewed on our bi-monthly ARES NET on October 16th. From this report, everyone can plan to make improvement

in their station's operating needs and improve their skills. Sean added, "If I were to summarize the SET, it showed that EOCs being self insufficient with equipment able to communicate directly with the RI EMA located in the center of RI were better off. Due to the physical size of RI, this is very do-able with proper antennas." Over fifty ARES members and support personnel took part in this year's SET. Some things were tried again and we found HF dropped out early and was not of very much use. Due to operators being tied up handling SET problems, we did not pass as much NTS traffic. We under utilized our digital capabilities with the BBS and NTS-D, but we'll plan on improving that for the next SET. It was a great success and we look forward to improving our operation next year. Thank again to all who contributed to this effort. In a different Emcomm exercise, RI SATERN (Salvation Army Team Emergency Radio Network) participated in the PEMA (Providence Emergency Management Agency) emergency drill on Sunday, October 1. The scenario for this exercise was to portray simulated mass casualties as a result of a simulated single suicide bomber attack. AA1VU, SATERN Operations Officer reported that the SATERN organization EOC is strategically located near the city of Providence and their goal is to serve the people of Providence and the RI Salvation Army units as well. SATERN radio volunteers have been working with RIPTA (Rhode Island Public Transportation Authority) buses, with dozens of hospitals and as "shadows" for drill organizers. SATERN's mission is to provide portable and reliable communications during high-stress events in the inner city. In total, there were seventeen licensed amateur radio volunteers active in the PEMA exercise, including several members of RI ARES and Skywarn. The event began in the early morning and wrapped up at noon. During the exercise, four 2 meter and 440 MHz repeaters were used, as back-up to the primary simplex operation. The W1AQ club 2 meter repeater was chosen as the primary channel for all tactical traffic and the KA1RCI UHF repeater was a valuable second channel, to avoid any close frequency interference. It was reported that UHF frequencies demonstrated better signal strength from RIPTA aluminum buses than VHF repeaters. One of the goals of the PEMA exercise was to determine how effective simplex communication was in the environment of the test. There were several other lessons learned from this exercise. Among the lessons were that a) various Amateur Radio emergency groups can work together seamlessly and effectively for the public welfare, b) simplex operation is an effective communication mode in downtown Providence and c) a little bit of radio planning can help prevent communication black-outs, i.e., if several groups are working in close proximity, they should be on different amateur bands to reduce overloading each other's receiver stages. The popular 146.76 Scituate repeater is back on the air with its antenna high in the air. Useful coverage is back to normal and possibly greater. The 223.76 repeater was moved from Lincoln to Scituate. The 146.94 repeater which had been in Lincoln for decades has been moved to its new site in Cumberland and is now on the air with lower power and a temporary antenna. In an attempt to reduce interference from northern repeaters, the repeater is transmitting a PL of 141.3, so if you punch that into your radio, you should be able to prevent unwanted signals on .94. The new machine sounds great and within a week, should be serving a much wider footprint. Thanks to everyone who supported the recent RIFMRS flea market and auction in Forestdale. Your financial support was quickly put to very good use. Special thanks to AA1PL, N1JOY, K1KYI, W1HQV, KD1HA and WA1POX for their work on these three repeaters. The FCC has finally released its new rulemaking on a broad range of issues in what is being called the "Omnibus" bill. A summary of this Report and Order or R&O may be read on the ARRL website at http://www.arrl.org/?artid=6864. This summary also contains a link to the full 45 page text of the bill for those who need more bedtime reading material. Items in the bill will not take effect until 30 days after the R&O appears in the Federal Register. Best estimate is that the provisions will become law well before the end of 2006. The Omnibus bill contains a great many changes and I VERY STRONGLY encourage all to read the summary and become familiar with the changes being made. I am not given enough space to list the entire R&O here in my report but if anyone reading this wants a copy and cannot access the Internet listing, please contact me at w1yrc@arrl.org or 401-333-2129 and I'd be happy to send you a paper copy by mail or by e mail. In closing this month's report, I want to encourage all ARRL members, family and friends to exercise their privilege and duty as a US citizen and be sure to vote on Election Day, Tuesday November 7. The September fire season was tough on many in our state. Lots of smoke and ash to deal with, not to mention high temps and winds that came along with them. These freqs are part of the old Maritime bands that were at one time exclusively CW for communications with ships at sea. They were guarded by those massive shore stations like KPH, KFS, WLO, NPD etc. This is a special grant issued by FCC to the ARRL, who has licensed some stations with beacon priviliges to provide information on propagation within this frequency range for possible issue as a new band for Amateur Radio. If you are interested, look up the 600 Meter Research Group on the Internet and read the info contained there. A good converter for that range or a receiver capable of good sensitivity around 500 KHZ will be needed. None of the signals heard at this station have been strong, but down in the noise, as the present power limit is 25 watts EIRP. A larger antenna or long wire is helpful also. There is a link to the complete text with the changes that will occur to the FCC rules on the ARRL website. I will also post something on the Oregon Section website within the next day or two. The CW nets are concerned about some of the frequency adjustments in the report and order for phone and CW. If you have concerns, there is an email link on the ARRL website to express those concerns. There are changes to the band plan, to RACES and VE testing that we need to be aware of. This is NOT the change in the Morse code requirements that many are waiting for. Rick Durst, K1YKZ is the Portland General Electric Amateur Radio Liaison. He is working on plans for the Portland General Electric's Annual Outage Drill that will be held on October 24 from 8am – 11am. He would like to find other amateur radio operators who work for the various Gas, Electric or Water utilities. If you know of any, please let Rick know at k1ykz@ados.net. I attended the Section Manager's workshop at the ARRL at the end of September. I learned a lot and will be sending information out to the section leadership to be dissimenated as needed. SEPTEMBER NORTH CAROLINA SECTION NEWS FCC REVISES BAND PLANS, PLUS OTHER CHANGES The FCC's newly released WT Docket 04-140 brings significant changes. The FCC is expanding the phone sub-bands on 75m and 40m and will allow Novice and Tech Plus licensees to use the General portion of the CW sub-bands on 80, 40, 15, and 10m. Amateur amplifiers will no longer be required to exclude the 10m and 12m bands. There are other changes, so check out www.arrl.org for the details. The new rules will be effective in the next couple months. NOAA WEATHER RADIOS IN SCHOOLS PROJECT The federal government is working to distribute 80,000 NOAA Public Alert Radios to public schools throughout the nation. The radios are designed to signal different types of alerts, such as weather emergencies, child abductions, chemical accidents and acts of terrorism. Some schools might need help setting up the radios and getting them registered. In keeping with our obligation to provide the nation with a pool of "trained operators, technicians, and electronics experts", the ARRL is encouraging radio amateurs to assist your local Citizen Corp Council in this effort. If your club or ARES group would like to assist Citizen Corps in this project, please contact your local Citizen Corps Council to offer assistance. Where there isn't a Council, contact local emergency management. Contacts should not be made directly to local schools. Your local Citizen Corps or Emergency Management folks should contact the local school district superintendent's office to ensure a coordinated plan. Assistance to schools will be provided at the request of, and in coordination with, the school district. ARES NATIONAL DATABASE I attended a Section Manager's workshop at ARRL headquarters in September. It was a wonderful experience and I even got to work a half dozen of you from W1AW on 3923kHz! We've posted my notes from the workshop on www.ncarrl.org . ARRL COO Harold Kramer, WJ1B, told us that the ARRL is using money from a government grant to create a national ARES member database. We'll be able to store all our ARES member information in the database including

training and certification records. This should ease the administrative load on our EC's and make it easier to share ARES members across geographic lines in a disaster. The database is currently being tested and will be made available to EC's soon. 2006 SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST Here's another reminder about the 2006 ARRL Simulated Emergency Test! It's not too late to schedule your local drill. This year's North Carolina Section SET will be held on October 28 from 8am to 12noon on the Tarheel Emergency Net. Don't forget to check in! Your local area may hold an SET anytime during the fall season; just make sure your report reaches ARRL headquarters by January 31, 2007. Stations participating should try to send any appropriate traffic - perhaps after action reports, etc. - via the National Traffic System. Not only will it improve our traffic statistics, using NTS during the SET is important for getting as many levels of our Section NTS involved in the SET process. The Simulated Emergency Test is a great opportunity for some publicity! We're hoping to have a bill introduced in the 2007 session of the state legislature that will permit antennas to be erected without zoning restrictions. Positive media, such as SET training, promotes a favorable image. Involve your local ARRL Public Information Officer and have them do a press release! Be sure to include in your release that the Tar Heel Emergency Net (THEN) has been meeting on-the-air continuously since 1949 - that's 57 years of EMCOMM training! Plus be sure to add any local and regional ARES nets in your area, so the public has the image that hams are ever vigilant and prepared. HAMFESTS? Is your club having a hamfest? Get ARRL affiliation! You don't even need to have an affiliated club to have an ARRL affiliated hamfest. You get ARRL door prizes and literature and your hamfest info gets published in OST and on the ARRL web site. Report and Order to amend Part 97 of the Commission's Rules Governing the Amateur Radio Service. ARRL President Joel Harrison W5ZN wrote a letter to the Commission on October 3rd, urging them to release their Report and Order. Joel reminded the FCC that the oldest of the petitions that made up the proceeding was over 5 years old, making the Report and Order long overdue! The FCC adopted the document on October 4th, and released the Omnibus Report and Order on October 10th, a week after Joel's letter was dated. In it, the FCC adopted nearly all of the proposed changes in the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking released back in 2004. The FCC report and order can be found here: http://hraunfoss.fcc.gov/edocs_public/attachmatch/FCC-06-149A1.doc . The full ARRL News Story can be found here: http://www.arrl.org/news/stories/2006/10/11/100/?nc=1 ARRL President Joel Harrison, W5ZN, expressed the ARRL's gratitude to the FCC Commissioners in a letter dated October 11: "On behalf of the ARRL and the Commission's licensees in the Amateur Radio Service I want to express appreciation for your release yesterday of the Report and Order in WT Docket 04-140 (FCC 06-149) amending Part 97 of the Commission's Rules. The Commission's action in clearing this pending proceeding will assist the Amateur Radio Service in meeting its objectives, particularly with regard to providing emergency and public service communications." The changes will go into effect 30 days after the R&O is published in the Federal Register. This date is not known as of yet. The ARRL is requesting member input regarding the proceeding, particularly how the changes will affect current operating activities on 80, 40 and 15 meters. Currently, the ARRL is working on a plan to move 80 meter CW nets down to the CW only portion of the band, as well as finding spots for QRP calling, PSK and other digital modes. The problem turned out to be a piece of equipment in his own shack. ========= TRAINING REQUIREMENTS FOR ARES MEMBERS We have been talking about training requirements for several months. I have heard comments such as: It is a way for the ARRL to make money, I have an Extra Class license and have been working in a shelter for over 10 hurricane seasons, I regularly participate in SETs and contests and walkathons, I know what it is all about and I do not need to pay to take more training, I am an Amateur operator and not a paid professional. None of these comments are valid. If you are going to be a disaster responder you must meet federal requirements. The word amateur denotes love of something and non-payment for services; it does not indicate lack of professional conduct and training. The following comments are clarification from John Fleming at the state EOC regarding training for ARES members and ARES leadership: Here are the requirements for amateur radio operators to belong to the Florida State Emergency Response Team (FLSERT). These requirements are in compliance with the requirements of the Department of Homeland Security and of the Federal Emergency Management Agency and apply to all potential disaster responders, volunteer and professional. The listing below identifies the various categories of potential responders as they apply to amateur radio. ARES membership is preferred and recommended but is not an absolute requirement. We also have added the EMCOMM training of the American Radio Relay League. This is not in the DHS/FEMA guidelines but is a League recommendation and one that is being applied in nearly all states in the Country. Any person not meeting these requirements will not be eligible for deployment, participation, reimbursement, liability protection, etc. Operators that will be deployed locally only or operating at home stations: ARRL EC-001 Level 1, NIMS IS 100 and NIMS IS 700. Operators likely to be deployed away from their County, ARRL or ARES Officials at the local level (AEC, EC, RACES Officer), Gateway Station Operators, Local EOC Station Operators or Liaisions: The above plus: ARRL EC-002 Level 2 and NIMS IS 200. ARRL or ARES Leadership at the District Level, Deployed Operators with Management or Supervisory Assignments, State or Federal EOC Liaisions: The above plus: ARRL EC-003 Level 3, Revision 2, Plus, in FY 07, ICS 300. ARRL or ARES Leadership at the Section, Division or National Level, State or National ESF-2 Representatives: As above, plus: FEMA IS 800.A National Response Plan, plus, in FY 07, ICS 400. Information on FEMA/ICS courses is at: http://training.fema.gov/EMIWeb/IS/crslist.asp The background on the EMCOMM courses is at: http://www2.arrl.org/cce/courses.html In addition to the listed NIMS courses, there are a number of other programs that would benefit the amateur radio response to disasters on the FEMA websites. County agencies can do what they want for local volunteers but they are facing the same requirements as the state and if a local agency is not compliant, it will detrimentally affect their funding so I suspect that all Florida Counties will soon be in compliance. Of particular interest is the NIMS FAQ's page at: http://www.fema.gov/txt/emergency/nims/5_common_faqs.txt. Note especially the first question, repeated here: Who has to take NIMS and ICS training? All federal, state, local, tribal, private sector and non-governmental personnel with a direct role in emergency management and response must be NIMS and ICS trained. This includes all emergency services related disciplines such as EMS, hospitals, public health, fire service, law enforcement, public works/utilities, skilled support personnel, and other emergency management response, support and volunteer personnel, as follows: Entry Level - FEMA IS-700 and ICS-100. First Line, Single Resource, Field Supervisors - IS-700, ICS-100 and ICS-200. Middle Management: Strike Team Leaders, Division Supervisors, EOC Staff, etc. -IS-700, IS-800 NRP, ICS-100, ICS-200 and in FY07, ICS-300. Command and General Staff; Area,

Emergency and EOC Managers - IS-700, IS-800, ICS-100, ICS-200 and in FY07, ICS-300 and ICS-400. In a letter describing the NIMS system written by DHS to the Governor's of the 50 States: In order to receive FY 2006 preparedness funding, the minimum FY 2005 compliance requirements described above must be met. Applicants will be required to certify as part of their FY 2006 grant applications that they have met the FY 2005 NIMS requirements. To the extent that full implementation is not possible during FY 2005, Federal preparedness assistance must be leveraged to complete NIMS implementation by FY 2006. By FY 2007, Federal preparedness assistance will be conditioned by full compliance with the NIMS. Stay safe and stay on the air. 73, Sherri, W4STB

Congratulations!! ** SKYWARN Recognition Day is December 2 The 8th annual SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD) special event will take place Saturday, December 2, 2006. SKYWARN Recognition Day is an event co-sponsored by the National Weather Service and the American Radio Relay League, and it is the National Weather Service's way of saying "thank you" to Amateur Radio operators for their commitment to helping keep their communities safe. During the 24hour special event, amateur radio operators will visit their local National Weather Service (NWS) office, set up Amateur Radio stations, and work as a team to contact other hams across the world. "Ham radio operators volunteering as storm spotters are an extremely valuable asset to National Weather Service operations since they are cross-trained in both communications and severe storm recognition", says Scott Mentzer (N***OE), organizer of the event and Meteorologist-In-Charge at the NWS office in Goodland, Kansas. In typical warning operations, it is the direct communication between mobile spotters and the local NWS office which provides vital ground truth information. Spotter reports of hail size, wind damage and surface-based rotation in real time greatly assists the radar warning operator since that information can be correlated with Doppler radar displays. The result can range anywhere from a more strongly-worded statement to convey a greater sense of urgency, or the issuance of a tornado warning a few minutes earlier than would otherwise have been possible. While National Weather Service offices utilize the real-time reporting of severe weather events to assist in warning operations, hurricanes and tropical storms have shown us that ham radio operators are equally important during the recovery phase of natural disasters. There are countless stories where ham radio worked in tandem with more conventional technology to relay emergency traffic. Details of the Event: SKYWARN Recognition Day will be held from on December 2, 2006, from 0000 UTC to 2400 UTC. The object is for all radio amateur stations to exchange QSO information with as many National Weather Service Stations as possible on 80, 40, 20, 15, 10, 6, and 2 meter bands plus the 70 centimeter band. Contacts via repeaters are permitted. Everyone can learn something new. Whether you're a technician, general, or extra, there's always a trick in message handling or a technique in being an NCS that might be new to you. So what's a good source for learning about these important aspects of Ham radio? The adage, "One learns to do by doing," is applicable here. Doing a bit of traffic handling on local ARES nets, listening or participating in the Badger Weather Net, Badger Emergency Net or the Wisconsin Sideband Net, or checking in to the Wisconsin Novice Net, Wisconsin Slow Speed Net, or either session of the Wisconsin Intrastate Net would be great practice. There are also some good resources off the air. The ARRL web site has a lot of practical help - especially in the Public Service Communications Manual, the National Traffic System Methods and Practices, and an interesting pdf entitled "Traffic Handling and Amateur Radio." These are all readily accessible just by searching "traffic handling" on ARRL's web page. Another good source is the Wisconsin page of the ARRL web site. If you scroll down the page, you'll see a number of links to traffic-handling topics - sending traffic, being net control, etc. Try one. Your EC can get a copy of a

The winners in each state in the Great Lakes Division will be judges and a Great Lakes Division winner announced. The rules for a newsletter contest are simple. The first rule in the PR book is to make sure our people know what is going on. Our newsletters can do that job very well, if we care. The contest serves to improve the quality of our Section's newsletters and to

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improve communications with our club members. A.) An eligible newsletter must be regularly published
at least four (4) times per year by a Michigan Amateur Radio organization. After winning first place,
that winner will not be eligible for the next five (5) years. Although past winners are still encouraged to
keep us on their mailing list. B.) Each organization submitting a newsletter for the contest must enter at
least two (2) issues starting with January 1, 2006 for judging. All Amateur organizations that have
regularly been sending newsletters to the Michigan Section Manager are encouraged to add to your
sending list Dan Romanchik KB6NU the Michigan ACC, at kb6nu@arrl.net who will be the Chairman
of this contest. Deadline for entries is November 30, 2006, and all entries must be in the hands of the
Michigan ACC KB6NU by that date. Dan will confirm the receipt of all entries, so if you do not receive
a confirmation you will have time for follow-up. C.) Electronic (web based) produced newsletters may
also enter. However, they must represent their printed newsletter in all formats. For example, if photos

amateurs, in the Public Relations/Media industry will do the judging. They will be judging on style
(15%), content (35%), service to members (35%), and clarity of presentation (15%). Style means
newsletter design of all pages. Content means amount of useful information contained in the newsletter.
Service to members means amount of information using individual member's names. Clarity of
presentation means readability of the newsletter including accuracy of English grammar. D.) No entries
can be returned, but a complete list of judges points will be published on the Michigan website. All

Greetings Fellow Rhode Islanders: Got all your outdoor antenna work completed yet? Well, you should get to it or you'll be freezing your fingers trying to wrap your #14 Flexweave around an end insulator. Of course, an old timer friend of mine reminded me recently that the prime season for stringing up wire antennas is growing near. Both he and I have experience hanging wires in trees during howling winds, freezing temperatures and blizzards. They always seem to work much better than antennas strung up in 75 degree, sunny June weather. I'm very pleased to report that with the help of my terrific friends, my new log periodic is up on top of the tower, performing like a champ. It surely outperforms the former DX chaser, a thirty year old tribander with shorted traps. Stations actually reply now when I call them. New dipoles for 80, 40 and 30 and a monopole for 160 are going up soon and will get my stations back to all band status. Next project is RTTY. In my October report, I mentioned that FCC had published its Report & Order in WT Docket 04-140, known as the Omnibus bill because it covered so many items within the document. You should become familiar with the bill by reading the article by N1RL, starting on page 39 in December QST. The League was quick to point out some errors and unintended consequences to the FCC's proposed actions. The extremely generous expansion of the 75 meter phone band down to 3.600 MHz may have inadvertently introduced unrelated problems. Another of the large scale issues that this omnibus bill addresses is the refarming of Novice frequencies that was proposed

years ago. There are many other areas of concern. Read all about it in OST, on page 39 through 41 and Dave Sumner's editorial on page 9. In general, many changes to FCC rules are positive changes that will enhance our enjoyment of Amateur radio. I must also draw your attention to the fact that many items wrapped into this Omnibus bill are specific changes requested over the years by the ARRL. They weren't holiday gifts from the friendly candy company. It is essential to remember that these changes including the new frequency allocations ARE NOT LAW just yet. They are not rules for us to follow until FCC says they are. But, unless FCC changes what they've published, they will become law very soon. In the CO WW DX Contest held on October 28-29, I heard some participants operating well outside of existing bands, apparently thinking that the new bands identified in the R&O Omnibus bill had been enacted as law. BREAKING NEWS, released as I was preparing this report: The Omnibus R&O was just published in the Federal Register, starting on page 66460 of Vol. 71, No 220. This means that enactment of these changes shall take place at 12:01 EST on Friday December 15, 2006, precisely thirty days after its release in the Federal Register. You may read the entire unabridged text at http://a257.g.akamaitech.net/7/257/2422/01jan20061800/edocket.access.gpo.gov/2006/pdf/E6-19189.pdf and ARRL's full summary at http://www.arrl.org/news/stories/2006/11/15/100/?nc=1. It is worthy to note that despite the many rumors, assumptions, blogs and heated discussions on repeaters, probably throughout the country, suggesting that it was a done deal, slam dunk, sure thing, etc., the Omnibus bill does not include action on the Commission's proposal to eliminate the Morse code requirement for all license classes. A Report and Order in that proceeding, WT Docket 05-235, is still pending, and the ARRL will announce when the Commission releases it. Technicians must still pass Element 1, a five word per minute code test to enjoy limited HF privileges. So, don't quit studying that code. After all, we're only talking about five words per minute. December 2nd is SKYWARN Recognition Day. Amateurs at National Weather Service Stations will be active on several bands and exchange reports with participants in their on air activity. Each WX station will issue special QSL cards. Full details including bands of operation, exchanges, certificate info, etc are on page 66 of December QST and www.hamradio.noaa.gov. Finally, the political mail and phone calls have stopped and relative calm and quiet has returned to our homes. In addition to the more widely reported elections, many new state representatives, senatorial, mayoral, etc level candidates were elected throughout RI. Please let me know if you know whether any new public officials in your city or town are licensed Amateurs. Please drop a line to me at w1yrc@arrl.org if you have any information concerning candidates. It is very important for your ARRL leadership team to know if hams are holding office within our RI government. We would like to see the day when federal legislation such as PRB-1 is codified in our state as it has been in many states so far, twenty three I believe. I cannot emphasize strongly enough that until this federal bill is embraced by the local government officials who we must deal with when we want to erect a tower, it cannot work for us. In practice, your local zoning board doesn't care what Washington thinks it ought to do. Decisions involving your or my tower installation are decided by local politicians or their appointees. You should review the presentation prepared by our Vice Director, Mike Raisbeck which is available on the ARRL website, http://remote.arrl.org/FandES/field/regulations/legislative_talk.ppt . You should consider using it in your club or town if it would facilitate any current process. I am aware of only one Amateur who was a candidate for elected office in our recent elections. John Clarke, W1DBR was a candidate for State Senator in Assembly District 9 which is the West Warwick area. John ran a good race but was defeated by incumbent Stephen Laves. We wish to sincerely thank John for his effort and willingness to serve fellow RI citizens in a public office. How about you? Do you know anyone that would be interested in possibly running for an elected position in Rhode Island in the future? How about yourself? Public office could be something to consider at some time in the future. Once again, we wish to thank John and hope that he will continue to seek an elected position in the future. Blackstone Valley ARC joined the Amateur Radio Lighthouse Society in September with the goal of activating some of the many lighthouses along the RI coast line. It immediately generated plenty of interest in the club. On Saturday, November 11th, members of the club drove down and set up a portable station at Point Judith Light and enjoyed a beautiful day activating Lighthouse # 625. They made close to 100 contacts and had a great time. From the fun they had in putting on this program, it's

certain that the club will activate more lighthouses in the future. Members taking part were: W1AUT, W1HK, KB1KKF plus xyl, WB1P, NB1U, AA1VU, WN1X and WA1ZDY. Good luck in the upcoming SS and DX contests. We're approximately at the bottom of sunspot cycle 23 and must deal with that handicap. The good news is that everyone competing must deal with the same propagation conditions that you face. The playing field is level. In October we had a lot happen. Here are some of the highlights. Saturday October 7 was the annual SET which stands for Simulated Emergency Test. The timing could not have been better because the next weekend instead of a simulated Hurricane we had a real earthquake. SET is an ARES or ARRL sponsored event. ARRL is not only affiliated with Citizen Corp and RACES but also has Memorandums of Agreement with many other groups. In addition there are local agreements. The League has formal Memoranda of Understanding aka MOUs, with Federal Emergency Management Agency, National Weather Service, Red Cross, Salvation Army, National Communications System, and Associated Public Safety Communications Officers. This year the Hawaii SET was primarily run by Hawaii State RACES. It was a simulated Hurricane. RACES is a radio communication service, conducted by volunteer licensed amateurs, designed to provide emergency communications to local or state civil-preparedness agencies. It is important to note that RACES operation is authorized by emergency management officials only. This operation is strictly limited to official civil-preparedness activity in the event of an emergency-communications situation. October 13, 14 & 15 was Pacificon in San Ramon, CA. Your SM was there representing you. There are a good discussion about setting up the various emergency response programs among the seven Section Managers and other officials. Cooperation and assistance from out of the section was one main topic. The result is a Golden Guardian drill November 15th at noon our time. The earthquake happened just as the conference was finishing. There was immediate interest by all the leadership officials. Our infrastructure is set up so that even though one person is not available it still works. Good Job! On Sunday Morning October 15 there was a large earthquake off the Kona side of the Big Island. It was felt in all the islands including Kauai. There was damage but no causalities especially on Maui and West Hawaii. Oahu lost all power for many hours primarily due to protection circuit malfunction. The Big Island lost power but it was restored quickly. My first notice was by phone from Harvey Motomura, AH6JA, the East Hawaii DEC who was on Oahu. There were several other phone calls to my Cell phone. The best information came from the ASM on Kauai, Jerry Hill;

KH6HU. This is typical since Jerry is out of the area and his power and phones never went down. The ASM and DEC Kevin Bogan, AH6QO finally called in however he was busy running the HF emergency net from CD. Also at the CD center was EC Ron Hashiro, AH6RH As a result of the wake up call ARES ID badges are being made now. The Big Island group is updating their emergency response plan. It should be presented to Hawaii County CD ASAP. It will be available for use as a model. Contrary to what other areas of the country may experience and operate regarding differing amateur radio organizations -- we believe in joint operation, ARES, RACES, SKYWARN, VOAD, SATERN, Health-Comm., etc -- we become one operation, one team to our emergency management partners. We help each other out and work together. That's the only way to operate. We are isolated in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. The Director of State CD has been very supportive of this partnership, and we greatly appreciate the opportunity to integrate into their operations. Here are summary statistics of Sunday's operations at State CD RACES/ARES. 1- Activity started at 7:10 am. 2- KH6HPZ Net started at SCD at about 7:35 am. 3- A total of 55 messages exchanged. Two were formal messages. 4- Net secured at 5:20 pm. Ron Hashiro, AH6RH Monday October 16. The next night, there was an intense electrical storm in East Hawaii. There were several reports of equipment damage. According to some people it was the worst lightning storm they had ever experienced. There was also other heavy weather throughout the month including a storm that caused a landslide on the Pali Highway and closed the Oahu cross island Wilson tunnel for many hours. Traffic was a mess. Saturday October 21st was the Hawaii Island International Hamfest in Waimea. Almost 100 people signed in. Next year it will be held on the Second Saturday, as usual. The reason for the change was a conflict with Pacificon but the change caused a conflict here with the Iron Man in Kona. Toward the end of the Hamfest we had a short debrief about the earthquake and we gave a Certificate of affiliation to the Kohala Hamakua Radio Club. Of course we had a testing session. During the last weeks in October & early November BIARC members finally completed the tie in of Mauna Loa and Kulani repeaters. We are looking forward to expanding the system to South Point, Hawaiian Ocean View Estates and the 146.94 machine on Haleakala, There have been many FCC rule changes however they are not yet in effect as of November 10, 2006. WT Docket 04-140 adapted October 4 and released October 10 does not appear in the Federal Register yet. The rules become effective 30 days after they appear. Briefly FCC will: expand the phone sub bands on 75 and 40 meter, permit auxiliary stations to transmit on part of the 2 meter band, permit the use of spread spectrum on 222 to 225 MHz, allow amateurs to retransmit communications from the ISS, allow licensees to designate a specific Amateur Radio club to receive their call in memoriam, permit Alaskan more flexibility in emergency communications, delete the requirement for a public announcement for VE testing and several other changes. This year's Honolulu Marathon will be held on Sunday 10, December 2006. The race starts at 0500 hours, Race participants start from Ala Moana Park on Ala Moana Blvd, go through Downtown Honolulu, through Waikiki, out towards Hawaii Kai and back to Kapiolani Park for the Finish Line. On behalf of the Honolulu Marathon Association, we are asking for volunteers to provide radio communications for the Start-Line, Aid Stations along the race course, for the Finish-Line area support, Support Vans as well as other areas as needed. The communication coverage we provide begins around 0400 hours and goes into the afternoon up until about 1500 hours. The following positions are needed: NCS – 3 each Start-Line / Technical Race Director's Radio Communicator – 3 each Time Clock Coordinator's Radio Communicator - 1 each Aid Station Communicators – 14 each Support Van Communicators – 7 each If you have time to share and would like to volunteer Sunday or if you know of anyone who may be interested in helping out, please contact Greg to sign-up. You may reach him by email: honul@juno.com or you can call his cell phone at 808-224-4662 - please leave a message with a call-back phone number. Virginia Section Managers Report For October 2006 October has been a time of accelerated change for hams across the nation and in the Virginia Section. The American Red Cross has come out with a new policy concerning background checks for volunteers and there own employees. The FCC has acted on the Omnibus R & O. This ruling appears to be in need of some "fine tuning". We all are eager to begin to enjoy using these new voice frequencies after 12:01 EST on 12/15/2006. We are also beginning to see a steady influx of Simulated Emergency Test reports flowing in. We have one more major SET to take place. This will involve many of the counties across the 40 county area served by the Blacksburg National Weather Service office. ARES continues to record steady growth as we approach the 1100 member mark. Many of our membership have yet to complete their ARES registration online form. This form is also to be used for changes of contact information, training courses, SET participation etc. If you have completed the form, you may make changes by going back and entering you call and just the information that has changed. The registration form is found at http://www.aresva.org/aresva/ares member info form.html. We are also rapidly approaching the 400th anniversary (2007) for the establishment of the first English colony in Virginia. We are planning special event stations across the Section during this yearlong celebration. Due to the fact, that national statements from the American Red Cross (ARC) have been confusing and have created misunderstanding and many decisions of nor-compliance, I decided to check with service area ARC. I have a confirmation from our ARC Chapter Solutions person (Diane Green) that the "exception clause" listed in the example below applies to Amateur Radio under ARES. "Additionally, the American Red Cross often works side by side with partner organizations. Example: A church in a disaster prone area may partner with the American Red Cross to serve as a shelter for local residents during a disaster. If the church members are supervised by their own leadership, the church would set their own standards for volunteer screening and background checks. However, if the church members go through Red Cross training and offer to work under the supervision and management of Red Cross supervisors in a Red Cross shelter, they will be asked to register as a volunteer and submit for a Red Cross background check." My understanding of the statement above is that we are considered as a "partner organization" and if we are working as an ARES unit as opposed to an American Red Cross volunteer we are not required to undergo this background check. For many years hams have had strong feelings about going into a disaster area to serve under ARES as a communications volunteer then be ask to fill out a second registration as a Red Cross volunteer. This recent policy reinforces the need to have a national credentialing and background check. This has been provided for in the new Communications Act for the 21st century. Without "First Responders" ID, organizations active in disaster may be subject to any number of background checks required for assisting various organizations. This will cut into the number of available volunteers for many organizations. I have submitted and received my background check for the ARC. I will not attempt to force others to make that same decision. A number of the Virginia Section and ARES leadership have communicated an unwillingness to comply. Several of these have held security clearances that required much more in-depth investigations but feel for various reasons a lack of interest in this background check by Red Cross. The pending Simulated Emergency Test for the Blacksburg NWS forecast area (40 counties) is scheduled for December 9th, beginning at 8:00 am EST. Weather bulletins will be given on the night before (December 8th, form 9-10pm) on the 12 designated Skywarn Repeaters. These can be found at http://www.wx4rnk.org/. This scenario is of a major winter storm similar to a couple that was experienced in this area in the 90's. To the east of the Blue Ridge, counties will experience a major ice storm. Currently we have over 50 hams signed up to participate. Many agencies are also participating in this exercise. Hams to the east of the coverage area are encouraged to participate; we will be looking for support from non- affected areas. No materials will be moved. This is a communications exercise.
